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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Cate House is a large Colonial style home. Built in 1815, it remains in excellent condition toady. Of special note is the half with its curved door and stairway. The grounds are neatly trimmed and surrounded by a stone wall.

The Cate-Adams House, like many of the Colonial Homes of the Maine coastal

regions is marked by the absence of a front porch. This is partly due to the extremely mild summers and the dark winters, requiring maximum light in the stair hall entry. The Cate-Adams House captures a unique and delightful stair hall lighting effect in the use of the frontispiece doorway with the overhead fanlight in the form of an arch eliptical in shape, glazed and filled with a wooden slab fan.

This home was built in the days when Castine was an important shipping center.

Maritime traditions continue much alive within the walls of the Cate-Adams House, for this is the president domicile of the Executive Officer for the Maine Maritime Academy.

The Cate House or Adams House was built in 1815 for Thomas and Jane Russell Adams. Their granddaughter, Mrs. Anna Dole, was brought up here. It was in this house that on May 19, 1873, she married Sanford Dole, who became the first and only president of Hawaii in 1893. Lat Dole became the first Governor of Hawaii. Dole was a relation of James Dole, the Hawaiian pineapple baron. Harriet Beecher Stowe spent some months at the house at one time.								

Homes such as the Cate House were built when Castine was one of the wealthiest towns of its size in Maine.

Thomas Adams was born at Pembroke, New Hampshire, July 3, 1783. He died in Roxbury, Massachusetts, December 1847. He married May 23, 1815, to Miss Jane Russell of St. Andrews, New Brunswick. His active business life was passed at Castine and he was a Representative to the General Court of Massachusetts as well as a selectman for the town. Jane Elizabeth Cate (Born April 11, 1817 and died 1891) was the daughter of Thomas and Jane Russell Adams. After her marriage to Charles Cate, January 12, 1839, she continued to live in her girlhood home, the fine old place at the corner of Court and Pleasant Streets. It was her daughter, Anna, who married the Hon. Sanford B. Dole. Mrs. Cate spent her remaining years in Castine raising not only her own family, but later the six children of her brother when they became too far advanced for the inefficient schools of Honolulu.
