Thomas Hart was surveyor who in 1831 surveyed new city limits, formed city into square, with courthouse in the center. In 1852 surveyed new county line. He was Ky. legislator in 1849. 20. Significance <u>Constructed in a center-passage plan, this building like the Staley House (Ck-270), has an original ell, which incorporates two chambers into an L-shaped plan. The interior detailing is of the Federal period and includes three fine gougework mantels.
