All details are Greek Revival in style. The contiguous family cemetery is enclosed by a unique post end rail fence composed of limestone sections. Built around 1820, the first owner of Oakwood was Alpheus Lewis, who ran a distillery on Big Stoner Creek, which produce A. Lewis and Sons liquour.
