DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Nelson's Grocery is a free-standing, 2-story, 40 by 70-foot frame structure without attic or basement. The foundation is granite, currently needing repair to correct sagging of the walls. The roof has a 2-foot slope and was covered with composition material in the summer of 1976. Accentuating the roofline is a projecting cornice supported by two sizes of carved brackets which are attached to a frieze. The walls, sheathed in metal stamped to simulate stone blocks, are opened up on the second story by wooden-sash, double-hung, 1 and 2 over 1 windows with cornice head casings.

Two bays of plate glass on the first-floor facade (north) and a double window on the east elevation are supported in a framework of paneled bases, carved posts, and bracketed cornice. Two additional facade bays were sealed in the early 1940s when the corresponding portion of the store interior was converted to a 4-room apartment. Stained-glass transoms are still in place in all the bays but are covered by sheets of plywood. The recessed corner entrance features double doors flanked by single plate-glass windows on paneled bases. Spanning the diagonal above the four openings is a series of six windows (two rectangular ones between pairs with arched heads), providing visual emphasis to the facade.

In the tradition of the general store, the sales area on the first floor has been operated as a single large unit stocked with mixed merchandise, rather than being separated into different departments. The west side of the interior was diminished for a depth of 20 feet when the apartment was put in. In the rear of the building is a locker plant (also installed in the 1940s) which local residents rented before the use of home freezers was widespread, but which is no longer utilized. The second floor is a single unfinished space, now vacant but intended originally for the storage of large items such as furniture.

Built into the rear (south) elevation of the structure is a pre-1901 former general store moved to the site to serve as a warehouse. The 30 by 40-foot frame building is covered with brick-patterned asbestos siding and has a gabled roof. The wood-shingled apex of the latter rises as a pediment above a false front topped by a bracketed cornice. On the interior a straight-flight open stairway leads to the second floor of the main building. In the rear yard is a small gabled-roof smokehouse completely sheathed in stamped and corrugated metal. The store property occupies the southwest corner of the intersection at the west end of Christine's block-long business district, directly across Main Street from the Old Post Office, a contemporary of Nelson's Grocery and also a nomination to the National Register of Historic Places.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

8 SIGNIFICANCE

Nelson's Grocery, an institution in the business life of Christine for over 70 years, belongs to a rapidly disappearing architectural and commercial genre which once promoted the growth of small towns throughout North Dakota. The location of the store, lots 10, 11, and 12 of block 8, City of Christine, was originally owned by Edgar L. and Julia E. Gray. The Grays in 1896 deeded the property to John B. Bisbee, who is remembered locally as the owner at one time of the quarter section of land on which Christine was built. In 1900, Bisbee conveyed the future store site to John S. Johnson and Dr. Lewis U. Iverson, both of whom owned a large number of vacant lots in the town they are credited with laying out.

Austin Johnsgaard purchased lots 11 and 12, block 8, from Johnson and Dr. Iverson in 1901, and three years later he obtained lot 10 from Johnson. Presumably shortly thereafter, or ca. 1905, Peter Fredeen, a local contractor, erected a general store on the three lots, and Johnsgaard opened for business with his partner, Aslag Benson. Prior to 1901, the two men had taken over another general store a block east on Main Street (lots 11 and 12, block 7), and the building was subsequently relocated to the site of the new store for use as a warehouse. Johnsgaard eventually ran the second store alone for a time until his four sons grew up, after which they joined their father intermittently in its operation. The last Johnsgaard son to be in the business was Ortley, who built the apartment now occupied by the present owners of the store, Hilbert and Haldis Nelson. In 1949, Ortley Johnsgaard and his wife, LuVerne, sold the property to the Nelsons, who have managed the store continuously to the present time.

In earlier years, reflecting the practice of the times, the line of merchandise carried in the store was extensive, including furniture, but it now consists chiefly of groceries and some items of clothing and hardware. Accordingly, the name of the establishment has been modified in popular usage from general store to grocery. The approaching retirement of the owners and the recent opening of a supermarket in the new Christine mini-mall place the future of the business, as well as the period structure which has always housed it, in doubt.
