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Describe the present and original (If known) physical appearance

This two-story house has been converted to a law office and abstractor's office. It is an appealing vernacular example of the Italianate Style. Among the Italianate features are the boxlike shape, hipped roof, stacked porches, brackets at the corners and over the second story porch columns, transomed doors and long, 2/2 windows. The slender fluted columns feature around their capitals bull's-eye bosses and dentils that correspond with those of the cornice.

The Wilson House is located a block away from the Bloomfield Square Historic District and the Davis County Courthouse, also listed on the National Register. It apparently was built by 1884, the first year it was assessed; a photograph of the town taken in 1892 shows the house. The area is mixed newer residential and commercial, and the corner lot of the Wilson House is on a heavily traveled roadway.

Despite the change from dwelling to office, the building retains many interior features and few structural changes. A focal point is the cherry staircase which has slender turned brackets and carved risers. The present owners have attempted to retain as much of the original as possible. They removed a rear window and rear door, but covered the space with clapboard to match the original. They replaced the crumbling sandstone foundation, the front chimney (original location), added a railing to the first story porch (although none shows in a 1904 picture), and adjusted the entry steps from the center to align with the front door. Inside, one large opening between two rooms was made smaller to accommodate a door. Near the stairs a short wall was removed and another added to the rear to create an office. The basement was paneled and made into usable space. On both floors, room arrangement is unchanged, having the stairs along the north wall, two rooms along the south and a smaller room behind the stairs. A one-story rear appendage probably originally housed the kitchen, although the presence of a stained glass transom over the large south window (perhaps added later) suggests other or later use for the room.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The property passed through several hands before Asa Wilson bought the lot in 1864. the year after he arrived in Bloomfield. He owned 203 acres of farmland and also property in town. Wilson also owned and apparently operated the Wilson House, a hotel originally known as the American and built in 1853 (extant on Bloomfield Square).

Wilson died at the age of 73 in December of 1884, the suspected year of construction for this house. He left behind his second wife and two very young children, and the property remained in the family until around the turn of the century.
