#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Hamilton Baptist Church and Pastorium includes a late nineteenth century church and an early twentieth century pastorium on approximately one and one-half blocks of land in a residential neighborhood adjacent to downtown Hamilton. Hamilton is the county seat of Harris County, a rural county on Georgia's western boundary just north of Columbus.

The church, built in 1890, stands near the center of virtually an entire city block. It is a relatively large wood-framed structure, sheathed in weatherboard, with a gable The structure rests on a brick and fieldstone foundation. The front facade features two corner towers with gablet roofs flanking the main, shed-roofed entrance. From the north tower rises a modern steeple which recently replaced the original polygonal spire. Gables and gablets are ornamented with a variety of Eastlake-style woodwork. A cross-shaped stained glass window in a circular surround is centrally located in the main gable. The double front doors, with their lancet panels, are original. The sides of the church feature tall, narrow, pointed-arched windows filled with translucent panes of clear glass. The rear of the church, which originally consisted of service rooms flanking a back porch with steps, is now fully enclosed. The interior of the church retains its original layout and spatial proportions. It is subdivided into an entrance vestibule with flanking service rooms, the sanctuary, and rear service rooms. interior features include plaster walls, windows, doors and doorways, floorboards (now covered with carpet), pews, altar enframement, and restored ceiling brackets. tongue-and-groove wainscoting has been replaced in the sanctuary, and the sanctuary's original tongue-and-groove ceiling has been covered with sheetrock; some original wainscoting and ceiling remain in the front and rear service rooms. A two-story wood-framed weatherboarded annex has been added in two stages (1948 and 1968) to the southwest rear corner of the church.

The pastorium, built in 1916, is located across Clay Street, to the rear and to one side of the church. It is a one-story wood-framed late Victorian-style house with Colonial or Neoclassical design influences. The exterior features a broad hip roof with gablets, weatherboarded walls, front and side bay windows, and a columned front porch. The interior is asymmetrically arranged and features spacious original rooms with relatively high ceilings, plaster walls, simple wood surrounds around doorways and windows, simple fireplace mantels and cast-iron fireplace screens, and horizontally paneled doors. The south front room has been refinished in modern paneling, and several rooms have been added to the rear of the house.

The church and pastorium occupy approximately one and a half city blocks in a residential neighborhood adjacent to Hamilton's small central business district. This land is generally level, with a moderate slope toward the west behind the pastorium. The grounds around the church and pastorium are informally landscaped with lawn, shrubbery, trees (some of which are historic), and gravel driveways and walks. There are no outbuildings associated with either structure.

Boundaries for the nominated property coincide with the current legal description of the church property. This property represents historic acreage associated with the church and its pastorium.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

In terms of architecture, the Hamilton Baptist Church and Pastorium is significant because it constitutes a typical but well preserved turn-of-the-century small-town religious The physical relationship between the church and pastorium reflects the historic institutional relationship between the congregation and the pastor. Although common in Georgia towns, this relationship is especially well illustrated here. The church itself is a landmark building in Hamilton and Harris County. It is one of the largest and most impressive single historic structures in this rural part of the state. The building is a good example of carpenter-style Victorian Gothic architecture in Georgia, and it features exceptional Eastlake-style woodwork on its exterior. Although added to and altered, the church retains an essential degree of historic architectural integrity in terms of its overall design, details, and materials. The pastorium is likewise a good example of common late Victorian residential architecture. Its overall form, exterior detailing, interior arrangement, and interior finishes and details represent a type or style of house that is found throughout Georgia. Like the church, the pastorium has been added to and altered, but the front half of the house, which constitutes the historic portion of the structure, is largely intact on both the exterior and interior.

In terms of <u>religion</u>, the Hamilton Baptist Church and Pastorium is significant for representing the history of the Hamilton Baptist Church, one of the oldest churches in Harris County. The church was founded in 1829, when this part of the state was first being settled, and it has maintained a strong presence in the area for more than a century and a half. The present church and pastorium reflect dramatic growth in membership and the prosperity of the congregation that characterized the church's late nineteenth century history. This period of vigor was also highlighted by the founding of the Pine Mountain Baptist Association in 1889 under the leadership of the Hamilton Baptist Church. The Baptists have always been among Georgia's most powerful and popular faiths, especially during the nineteenth century when the state's frontiers were settled, so it is appropriate that a major Baptist church represent the history of religion in this part of the state.

The above areas of significance support eligibility under National Register Criteria A and C. The architectural significance of this historic religious complex, the extraordinary architectural qualities of the church, the representative architectural qualities of the pastorium, and the historic significance of this major rural Baptist church all justify the eligibility of this religious property.
