Summary Paragraph

The Emile Cohn House at 536 South Jackson Street in Brookhaven, MS, is a one-and-a-half-story frame house in the Beaux Arts style of architecture. The house faces east on South Jackson Street and is directly to the north of a sister twin house. The houses are identical and have been historically known as the Cohn Houses. (See Photo #1) The sister house is not listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The Cohn Houses are located in a residential neighborhood along a tree-lined street with other older homes similar in size.

The house is set back from South Jackson Street in a landscaped yard which includes a concrete sidewalk and designed planting beds with traditional landscape plantings. Like its "twin" directly beside it to the south, the house and yard are integral to the character of the late 19th and early 20th century substantial Brookhaven neighborhood. (See Photos #2 & 3)

Narrative Description

The front façade of 536 South Jackson faces east. Dormer windows dominate its steeply pitched deck-on-hip roof of composite asphalt shingles. There is a pedimented dormer with pilasters and a dentiled cornice which wraps around the façade. The main roof cornice features modillions, dentils, and swags. (See Photo #4) There are two original roof slope chimneys and one non-slope roof chimney added to the rear addition.

There is a partial width, hip roofed, front porch with a portico extension at its center. The porch is supported by six garlanded Ionic, fluted columns. The portico has a roofline balustrade of boxed newel posts with urn finials and turned balusters creating a false balcony for the front dormer. (See Photo #5) The roof deck has a matching balustrade. The building is sided with wood clapboard with paneled corner pilasters. The porch floor, ceiling, and front steps are wood. The porch ceiling is bead board.

The windows on the north, south, and east (front) façade, are one-over-one double hung sash with original shutters. Dormer windows, with the exception of the one on the rear façade which is six-over-six, are eight-over-eight double hung sash. Two full height one-over-two double hung sash windows are on the porch and contain original shutters. (See Photo #6)

There is a Palladian window to the right of the porch created by a large one-over-over window with a stained glass, half-round "lunette" above. Two smaller one-over-one windows flank the large one-over-one centered window. There is another stained glass lunette on the porch wall to the right of the two full-height one-over-two windows. (See Photo #7)

The windows and doors on the porch have heavy moldings. The arched opening leading to the entry has Ionic pilasters on each side. The partially enclosed entry has heavy paneling and the entry door is double-leafed full-glazed with a transom. (See Photo #8)

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On the south elevation, there is one one-over-one window with original shutters and a projecting bay. The bay contains two one-over-one double hung sash windows with original shutters. (See Photo #9) Four one-over-one windows with original shutters continue to the new rear addition. The dormer contains two eight-over-eight windows. (See Photo #10)

A new rear addition to the west (rear) façade was begun in 1996 and completed in 2009. The addition was added to the original kitchen and is not visible from the road. The back wall of the original kitchen was removed, a den area added, and a wall of four-pane vertical windows which compliment the building and are in keeping with the architecture of the house was added. Four Ionic columns which match those on the front façade are used as support on a brick foundation for the addition. A working fireplace was added and is not visible from the road. (See Photo #11) On the north elevation of the addition are two sets of French doors which stylistically match the new windows and a set of windows which match the French doors. (See Photo #12)

On the first floor of the west façade are three original stained glass one-over-one windows. Also, there is a small addition which is covered with modern wood siding. This small addition is not visible from the road. The second floor contains one six-over-six window. (See Photo #13)

On the north façade, four one-over-one double hung windows are extant with original shutters. The dormer contains two eight-over-eight windows which match the dormers on the east and south facades. (See Photo #14)

The foundation is brick piers with lattice used as screening between piers. Located on the rear of the lot on the north side is a small detached covered carport. It is not original to the property and is non-contributing. (See Photo #15)

The interior of the house has a large foyer. Stairs, over a paneled wall, original to the house, leading to the second floor are to the left of the entry. (See Historic Photo, Figure 1 and Photo #16) The dining room is directly ahead and accessible through large pocket doors. A parlor used as a living room is accessible to the right of the entry through another set of large pocket doors. (See Photo #17) All walls are plaster and have been re-plastered where needed and painted. All interior doors have transoms and original hardware. (See Photo #18)

The dining room contains three one-over-one original stained glass windows. There is a transomed door leading to a bedroom on the north side of the room. All doors in the house have two vertical and three horizontal panels. (See Photo #19) The brick/tiled fireplace is original. (See Photo #20)

The bedroom off the dining room, to the north, contains a brick fireplace with no tile surround. (See Photo #21) There is a small bathroom and a closet, both added around 1967, off the bedroom which are in need of repair. The bathroom has newer but dilapidated fixtures. These two areas will soon be updated in keeping with the architecture of the house. On the south side of the dining room is a fireplace with original tile surround and a door leading to the original kitchen.

Remodeling of the kitchen and the den addition was begun in 1996 and finished in 2009. The exterior wall was removed to make room for a den area. A fireplace and wall of windows were added. (See Photo #22) Wood from the original floor was used for the island countertop. (See Photo #23) The ceiling of the original kitchen was opened and open air beams installed which allow one to see the joists of the second floor. (See Photo #24)

All of the floors are heart pine and in the original areas of the house are inlaid with a darker geometric wood pattern (See Photo #25). Hardware on doors and windows is original. (See Photo #26) There are six original fireplaces with brick and tile surrounds located throughout the house and one new fireplace located in the new rear addition. All ceilings are 15 1/2' tall on the first floor and 10 feet on the second floor.

Beyond the dining room, to the south, is a second bedroom with original lighting and a fireplace with tile surround. The wood floor has an inlaid geometric pattern. (See Photo #27)

Off of the bedroom and adjoining a front study is an original bathroom with historic fixtures. (See Photo #28) The bathroom is located in the projecting bay. Original closets on each side of the bay provide storage.

The study contains two full length one-over-two windows as seen from the front façade. An original fireplace with tile surround is extant as well as wooden inlaid floors. Doors are transomed with original hardware. (See Photo #29)

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Three bedrooms are located upstairs accessible by the stairs in the foyer. A small landing midway up the stairs contains a stained-glass lunette, visible from the front façade. (See Photo #30) At the top of the stairs is another landing. Three transomed doors lead to each of the three upstairs rooms. (See Photo #31 & #32)

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This is one of two twin houses referred to as the "Cohn Houses." The house at 536 S. Jackson Street was built in 1903. The houses first appear on the 1910 Sanborn Fire Insurance maps.ⁱ

Criteria Considerations (explanation, if necessary)

Statement of Significance Summary Paragraph (Provide a summary paragraph that includes level of significance and applicable criteria.)

The Emile Cohn House is significant under Criterion C. It is locally significant as a fine example of Beaux Arts Classicism architecture and like its companion house next door at 544 South Jackson Street, known historically as one of a twin set of Cohn Houses, named for one of its early owners.ⁱⁱ The house has had few modifications, none being visible from the sides or front façade. The Palladian window and use of garland on the fluted columns is in the style of Robert Adam, a well-known English architect.ⁱⁱⁱ

Narrative Statement of Significance (Provide at least one paragraph for each area of significance.)

The subject house at 536 South Jackson was built for Emile Cohn. Emile married Bertile Wilson in 1901 and soon thereafter built the Cohn house. Bertile had a brother named Solon and a sister named Natalie. Solon originally owned the twin sister house at 544 South Jackson Street.^{iv}

There were three Cohn brothers, the third being Louis. In 1883, the three brothers formed a partnership in the mercantile business in Monticello, MS. In 1893, they moved the business to Brookhaven. In 1894, David married Natalie. The Cohn

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brothers were also charter members of the Jewish Synagogue. They stayed in business many years, eventually limiting their activities to farming and a rental business.^v

Natalie Cohn died of cancer, leaving David Cohn to care for their children at 544 South Jackson Street. He later became sick and asked Ms. Greaves, his bookkeeper, to move into the house to care for his two children, Marion and Daphne. Ms. Greaves and her young son moved into the house around 1950. David died and eventually the last Cohn owner, Marion Cohn, sold the house to Ms. Greaves. Ms. Greaves and her two children lived in the house until eventually her daughter Claudia inherited the house. It was eventually sold to the current owner.^{vi}

Emile Cohn, at 536 South Jackson, had two girls, Amelia and Dorthea. As the last living relative, Dorthea gave the house to Ms. Greaves. Ms. Greaves gave the house to her son who sold it to the present owner, John Roberts.^{vii}

Several original pieces of furniture remain in the dining room. They are a buffet, a round dining table, and a cabinet. (See Historic Photo, Figure 2)

The Beaux Arts style of architecture popular during the late 19th and early 20th centuries employs slightly overscaled details, bold sculptural supporting consoles, rich deep cornices, swags and sculptural enrichments. It is an eclectic form of Neoclassicism combining classical architecture from ancient Greece and Rome with Renaissance ideas. It is characterized by order, symmetry, formal design, grandiosity, and elaborate ornamentation.^{viii}

The twin Cohn Houses are the most notable residential examples of this style of architecture in Brookhaven. There are other examples of Beaux Arts residences outside of Brookhaven. The Captain F. L. Bailey House in Pascagoula (NR, 1988) is a two-story house with paired full-height colossal Ionic columns supporting a central pedimented entrance. The Bomer House, 2315 Cherry Street, Vicksburg (NR, 2003), designed by local architect William Stanton for a lumberman, is another example with more eclectic styling.

The Beaux Art style is most commonly used for public buildings such as museums, railway stations, libraries, banks, courthouses and government buildings. The best example of this style in Mississippi is the New Capitol in Jackson (1903). In Brookhaven, the United States Post Office has some elements of Beaux Arts architecture; however, the Old City Hall (1901) is the best example. Other notable buildings in the style in Mississippi include Meridian City Hall and Ricks Memorial Library in Yazoo City.^{ix}

The Emile Cohn House embodies the Beaux Arts style of architecture with its rich use of balustrades, pilasters, swags and garland. Garland is used heavily, surrounding the cornices and also the tops of the fluted Ionic columns. Original wood siding, shutters, and windows contribute to the building's significance. The interior has been immaculately preserved complete with original hardware, plaster walls, original lighting where it existed, heart pine inlaid patterned floors, original bathroom fixtures, and two sets of large pocket doors. All six original fireplaces and tile surrounds are extant. Original stained glass windows are extant in the dining room, living room, and front porch.

Although the house has been altered slightly by the addition of a small bath, small closet, and den addition on the rear, these are not visible from the front façade and are in keeping with the architecture of the house.

Two other sets of twin houses exist on South Jackson Street. One such set is the A.E. Morton, Jr. House located at 610 South Jackson Street and the Robert D. Morton House located at 613 South Jackson Street. Both are listed on the National Register of Historic Places and were designed by George F. Barber, architect and architectural plan-book author of the late 19th and early 20th centuries.^x




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
