Description

The Roosevelt School is a rectilinear, flat-roofed, onestory Spanish-Pueblo Revival Style building with a full basement. It has a reinforced concrete skeleton, and the walls are a creamcolored cement stucco over adobe bricks with a continuous parapet. Vigas protrude from the upper walls. The building faces south and has a symmetrical facade with two sets of grouped windows flanking a double-door entry. A large concrete porch with flanking concrete steps paralleling the facade fronts the entry. Set within a complex of other school buildings and facing partially on a playground and partially on the corner of a narrow tree-lined residential street, the four-classroom building has recently been restored to serve as both a school and community library. The property is in excellent condition with the recent alterations, two additions with entries at the rear of the building, minimally affecting the historic appearance of the building.

Similar to standard plans drawn by the architectural staff of the New Mexico WPA for other four-room schools, the building's four classrooms are arranged in a linear plan along its south side. A corridor connects the classrooms with bathrooms, storage spaces and other small rooms lining it to the north. The mechanical room, marked by a chimney, protrudes to the north. The basement, with spaces later converted to classrooms and now the location of both the community and school complex libraries, extends the length of the building. Recently added concrete stairs offer access near the north and south ends of the building. Although the school has a reinforced concrete frame, typical of larger WPA schools in New Mexico, the walls consist of locally made adobe bricks, and the flat roof is supported by hand-hewn vigas cut in the nearby Santa Fe National Forest.

Relatively modest in specific features and decorative elements, the building has a large front porch. Consisting of a pair of wide, ten-step stairs that parallel the building and converge on a large concrete platform, the porch is lined with a stepped cement stucco wall. The double wood doors have nine lights and a transom. Flanking the entry are two grouped windows

consisting of four 6/6 double-hung windows. Similar sets of grouped windows appear on the side walls of the building and in wells for windows illuminating the basement.

During 1994-95, the community of Bernalillo undertook a restoration of the building, beginning with the basement. Seeking to retain the historic character of the building but to adapt it to current requirements, the architect made two additions to the rear of the building that would permit public access to the community library now located in the basement as well as conform to ADA requirements. Both of those additions are denoted by the use of a stucco cement coating lighter than the original portions of the building and contemporary metal-framed double glass doors. Not apparent when looking at the building's facade, neither addition detracts from the property's historic integrity.

### Statement of Significance

The Roosevelt School, begun as a Federal Emergency Relief Administration (FERA) project in 1934 and completed by the WPA in 1935, was the first modern public school constructed in Bernalillo. Made possible by the federal government's efforts to stimulate the nation's depressed economy through a massive public works program, the school is a good example of how the New Deal's public works projects affected the social history of a local community by creating much-needed jobs. In the case of Roosevelt School the project also resulted in the improvement of the community's educational facilities. The building is eligible under Criterion A for its close association with the town's education and social history. Roosevelt School is also eligible under Criterion C as an example of the plans, methods of construction, materials and workmanship New Deal projects employed in carrying out hundreds of school construction projects in New Mexico.

Prior to the construction of the Roosevelt School, few children in Bernalillo attended public schools, studying instead at the parochial schools operated by the Christian Brothers and Sisters of Loretto. Even when Sandoval County began to support public education, it contracted with the religious orders, relying on them to provide schooling for the majority of the community's children. The town's only true public school with lay teachers prior to 1935 consisted of a three-room rented building that local people disparagingly referred to as "escuelita 1-2-3," denoting its small size. With the onset of the Depression and the New Deal's efforts to stimulate the economy through public works projects, the New Mexico FERA funded a school project in Bernalillo. Designed in part to create local jobs in a community whose only industry was a sawmill which had laid off many employees and to provide the town with a modern public school, the project began in 1934.

Using a plan most likely provided by the state's FERA (by 1935, the WPA) architectural staff, local workers made adobe bricks and hewed ponderosa logs hauled from the Jemez Mountains thirty miles away and donated to the county by the Santa Fe National Forest. Although employing a reinforced concrete frame, the building was constructed in the Spanish-Pueblo Revival Style. The style, which was also becoming popular for larger public buildings, was often favored by the state's New Deal architects for school projects in rural areas and small towns where many WPA workers were already familiar with the local vernacular building practices from which the style partially derived. The total cost of the project was \$14,300, with \$3,500 for materials supplied by the county board of education.

When it was completed in 1935, the school was the first modern educational facility in Bernalillo. Its large grouped windows providing natural light, indoor plumbing, ventilation, heating system, and fire safety features such as outward-swinging double doors began to attract more of the community's children, and soon the phrase "escuelita 1-2-3" disappeared. Ida Aragon, who began teaching at the school in 1942, recalls how modern the

school felt and that the project was "very important to the people of Bernalillo because it helped to create jobs in a hardpressed community."

In 1948, following a court ruling which prohibited religious-run schools from receiving state public education monies, Bernalillo found itself faced with providing education to a greater number of students. In 1949, the basement rooms at Roosevelt School were converted to serve as the community's high school, a role the building served until 1956 when a new high school was opened. As the community's independent school district, created in 1951, grew during the next thirty years, a new elementary school and portable classrooms gradually replaced the older building.

As the structure aged it was deemed unsafe, abandoned, and considered for demolition. Aware of its significance as the Bernalillo's historic WPA-era public school, the community sought and received state funds to restore the building. The first phase of the restoration, an unusual effort to use the basement as a combination community and elementary school library, has been completed. Subsequent plans call for the classrooms on the main floor to be restored for use as community meeting rooms. The architect hopes to retain the blackboards and salvageable fixtures in one of the restored rooms to recall the building's historic use as a school.
