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## **Summary**

The Luber School is a single-story, one room structure constructed c.1930 in Plain/Traditional style.

#### Elaboration

The Luber School is a single-story, one room structure. The plan is rectangular and consists of a continuous stone foundation supporting stone walls covered by a hipped metal roof. The rafters are exposed underneath the eaves in traditional Craftsman style.

The southern elevation features a central hipped projecting porch supported by two large square stone columns based upon a concrete floor. A double leaf paneled door provides access to the interior.

The eastern elevation is fenestrated by a continuous bank of six nine-over-nine double-hung windows centrally arranged.

The northern elevation features a stone stoop with access from two sides. Ornamentation consists of large stone posts and connecting rails. Entry is provided by a single paneled door. The two windows for this elevation are small, square fixed single pane and are symmetrically placed high in the wall just under the eaves. The western elevation is blank with the exception of one other interior chimney.

There are two site features at this location. The remains of a well shelter is located approximately thirty paces from the northeast corner of the building. The shelter is stone and square in plan. A concrete floor supports four large stone columns and a half wall. No roof remains.

Three sides of the school yard are enclosed by a low (about two feet) rock wall.

The only marker for the school exhibits the initials JMB. The structure now serves as a community center for the Luber area.

#### Luber School

Stone County has traditionally been one of the most isolated and economically depressed of Arkansas's counties, due in no small part to the extremely mountainous topography. Nevertheless, despite the woefully inadequate transportation access to the outside world, Stone County enjoyed steady and stable economic growth in the first decades of the 20th Century through a subsistence agricultural economy concentrated on the small-scale production and marketing of cotton, corn, wheat, and livestock, and to a lesser extent, the growth of the timber industry. By the 1930's, the intensive agricultural methods employed on the region's thin soil had exacted its toll; sheet and gully erosion, the result of generations of poor farming practices, had badly scarred the hilly regions of the Ozarks, and the soil conservation programs of the New Deal were called in to address the issue.

The tiny community of Luber, to the south of the county seat of Mountain View, erected its new school in 1930, before the full effects of the 1929 Stock Market Crash had made themselves felt in the Ozarks. The new school was established to serve the scattered farm families of the south-central portion of the county. The drought of 1931 would eventually deal the final blow to the fragile economy of Stone County.

The Luber School, constructed during the period covered by the historic context *The Evolution of the Public School System in the Arkansas Ozarks*, 1920-1940, is a representative example of a small stone school building constructed for a rural school district. Its use during this as a local school building clearly identifies it with this historic context and with this property type. It is significant locally under Criterion A through its direct associations with the history of the evolution of the public school system in the Ozark Mountain region of the state during this period.


