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This house, while having been altered through the years, still retains a sufficient amount of its original fabric that it should be recognized and retained. We are therefore including it for its architectural significance, for its association with the exploration and settlement of the Bergen County area, and for its remaining historic fabric. As such, it is included in the Thematic Nomination to the National Register of Historic Places for the Early Stone Houses of Bergen County, New Jersey.

Howard I. Durie feels that Frederick Cadmus built the original section (the wing?) c. 1750. He served as a roadmaster in 1779-80. A loyalist judgement was entered against him on January 30, 1784 and the farm was rented. It came again into the posession of the Cadmus family by 1786 when Frederick's son Abraham had one-half of the original farm. He married Catharine Gerritsg/Van Wagenen and they had a daughter, Sarah, on March 24, 1785. Abraham died March 15, 1801 and Sarah and her husband, Abraham Delamater, inherited the property. Sarah died in 1860, leaving the house and 45 acres to her son Isaac Delamater. He died September 18, 1865 and the farm was sold to Frederick Van Riper. David A. Hopkins of Jersey City bought the property on October 15, 1872 and he lived there until his death in 1890. His family sold the property in 1896. Jin Fuey Moy, a Chinese doctor, owned the property from 1901 to 1905, when he sold it to J. Boyce Smith who greatly enlarged the house and added the porches and portcochere.
