Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The original Brookings Carnegie Library building was designed by G. C. Miller of Chicago, Illinois. The resulting design was a $1\frac{1}{2}$ story rectangular brick structure with stucco and frame panels under the roof. (The building was built by J. H. Robert in 1915.) A medium hip-roof covered in red tiles overhangs the structure.

The main entrance is enclosed in the projecting frontispiece topped by a half-timbered gable. There is a four pane arched window between the eaves and the tiled canopy below. The remaining windows are three sash with mullion, topped by a three sash transom and brick sills. The brick used in construction has a vermiculated texture and was laid in a stretcher bond pattern. The horizontally laid brick extends to within four feet of the top of the building, where a row of vertically laid brick was used to underscore the stucco panels.

With its triple transomed window panels, wide eaves, and stucco and timber facings, the Brookings Community Cultural Center is a fine example of early twentieth century Chicago-influenced design. Despite the Tudor suggestions in the front gable, the building falls within the Prairie style tradition in American architecture. Alterations (installation of flourescent lighting, addition of storm windows) to the original exterior appearance have been minimal, and have not altered the original fabric of the structure.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Brookings Community Cultural Center, formerly the Carnegie Public Library, is a fine example of Prairie style-inspired architecture in this part of the state. This style reached its epitome under Frank Lloyd Wright, and was intended to combine natural materials in a manner in harmony with the natural environment. The low sloping hip-roof with a wide overhang and red tile produces a strong, sheltering effect. The earth materials and colors of the brick, stucco, and wood, as well as the horizontal stress of sill lines of the windows suggest a harmony with the environment.

The construction of the library building was accomplished through considerable persistent effort by local citizens. In 1907 residents in Brookings were unsuccessful in their attempt to secure a building grant from Andrew Carnegie for the construction of a public library. The Brookings Free Library Association was formed in 1911 to collect money and books, which were first stored in City Hall. In 1913 the citizens of Brookings voted a one-mill levy to support the library. Thus the library was tax supported, and the city secured a grant from the Carnegie Foundation for \$10,000. J. H. Robert was low bidder at \$9,890 and by February 18, 1915, the building was completed.

Through the years the book collection, both adult's and children's, fitted nicely into the upstairs room. The basement was used as meeting rooms for women's groups, Sunday schools and Kindergarten classes.

As the Carnegie Public Library, the building was a source of information easily accessible to the public. In March, 1973, a mail order service was offered to rural patrons. In September, 1973, an outreach program to the handicapped was instituted. The building's location near two schools made its resources easily accessible to children and teachers.

The Carnegie Public Library was converted to the Community Cultural Center in 1976, when a new library was built. The Cultural Center holds classes and exhibits of literature for the community and is carefully preserving the integrity of the building and the traditions of the old Carnegie Public Library.
