DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The rectangular Main Post Office at Somersworth, New Hampshire occupies a small 1/4 acre lot at the intersection of Elm and Fore Streets. It is essentially a one-story structure with a mezzanine. However, due to the steep slope upon which it sits, the basement is afforded full height windows in the rear.

The center entrance Georgian Revival structure features a red brick exterior of Flemish bond coursing with white marble band wall, sill window casings, and trim. The building is capped by a hipped slate roof with three marble dormers and 6/6 double hung arched windows centered above the main entrance.

The front entry is defined by a richly detailed marble pediment supported by two fluted Ionic pilasters. The indented fan window above the pediment is repeated in the two flanking window bays. Each of these bays consist of a 15/20 double hung window with 2/4 double hung side lights. The marble window casings carry the line of entrance pediment as a base for the fan windows above. These, in turn, are encased in brick with distinctive marble keystones. The marble cornice features a brick parapet accented by carved marble balustrades beneath the three dormer windows.

On either side of the entrance fans are two 10/15 double hung windows each with a five (5) pane fixed glass transom. These serve as the window standard on the remaining sides of the building. They are enhanced with decorative marble plaques above in front with plain face marble plaques on the rear and sides.

The lobby is centered around the front entrance doors. The original wood vestibule has been replaced with a glass and metal panel construction. Once completely open, the room is now divided into a service area and lock box lobby by a full height glass panel and gypsum board partition. The floor is an orange rectangular quarry tile with the original white marble wainscotting. The ceiling is plaster with a simple moulded plaster cornice at the original wall areas. The windows feature carved wood casings with white marble sills. Typical of most Post Offices, fluorescent lighting has replaced the earlier incandescent fixtures and the hardwood floors have been replaced with stone tile. The marble staircase leads to the basement area where the original light fixtures of gold leaf on white frosted globes are still in place.

The building appears to be in excellent condition with the parking and walk areas well maintained.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Main Post Office at Somersworth is an excellent example of McAdoo's 1915 classification "C" category for federal buildings. Although the interior plan is close to being standard for post offices of this time period, the exterior is a somewhat unique example of Georgian Revival architecture as designed by James A. Wetmore, Supervising Architect for the U. S. Treasury.

It was designed and constructed through a Congressional amendment of Rogers-Elliot Public Buildings Act of 1926. It was part of an increased building program that grew in response to the depression (more than three times the number of Post Offices were constructed during this decade of 1930-1940 than were constructed during the previous fifty years).

Taken on historical context, the Somersworth Post Office expressed the desire of the government to have a presence in the smaller communities, to encourage growth and development of new businesses.

The expansion of the local woolen mills and extension of rail lines along with the Post Office construction lead to improved transportation, communication, and better access to jobs and services.

Today, the Somersworth Post Office stands alone. A shopping mall has encroached on the abutting land to the South. A newly constructed library and savings bank occupy the Eastern border and a 1950's bank structure is to the West.

Given its satisfying building proportions; its role in the history of Somersworth; and its place in Post Office development throughout the country, its nomination to the National Register will serve to recognize this significant artifact. It is indeed "an impressive compendium of the most notable characteristics of James Wetmore's design and detailing with especial importance because its original features are unaltered." 1




