Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

7. Description

Basically, a farmhouse with elements of the classical vocabulary added to the entry facade, this wood-frame, clapboard-covered structure is considered locally to have had originally only a single story and to have been modified subsequently to produce its present two-story form. Joints in corner trim at the second floor level and the flush siding which surrounds the entry do suggest an earlier one-story dogtrot now enclosed and provided with sophisticated frontispiece and capped with a second floor. However, various campaigns of modification by the present owner brought to light no conclusive evidence.

As it presently stands, the building consists of a two-story transverse block with portico in front and with a one-story, longitudinal wing projecting to the rear. This wing includes a kitchen and service spaces and once had porches projecting to both sides. The porch to the west has been enclosed to serve as a greenhouse and has several lean-to additions.

The main feature of the two-story block is the portico consisting of four attenuated columns with extraordinarily wide intercolumnations. At the second floor a cantilevered porch projects above the entry with jig-saw-cut millwork in a lyre pattern and rests visually on jig-sawn decorative brackets. Both the first and second floor doorways consist of classical elements very consciously applied, including pilasters and entablature below and a "Greek-ear" motif above. Doric pilasters also flank the fluch paneling at the first floor level.

On the interior a stairway with jig-sawn millwork ascends to the second floor from a central hall. Rooms in a double pile arrangement flank this hallway. Interior finishes are restrained throughout, consisting of simple wood base mouldings and door trim. The two front parlors do include marble mantles. The stair shows turned balusters and a heavy, square newel post.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

This residence, long owned by Pete Flora, lies just a short distance southeast of the area included in the Central Shuqualak Historic District already placed on the National Register of Historic Places. The Pete Flora store is a contributing property in this District.

Shuqualak was founded after the 1830 signing of the Treaty of Dancing Rabbit Creek. It soon attracted farmers into the area and by 1856 was reached by the tracks of the Mobile & Ohio Railroad.

This residence is a fine local example of a farmhouse of this era with certain pretentions to classical sophistication. The 16th Section land on which the structure is located was leased for 99 years in 1836. In 1859 the property was conveyed by John W. Coleman to Isaac W. Nicholson (Book L, p. 100) who probably erected the present structure.
