Kentucky's National Guard Facilities: 1931-1951 MPS

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Narrative Description

The former Russellville Armory (LO-R-67), located at 190 S. Winter Street, was completed in 1934, and was the first armory built in the city. The armory is located right off the town square in downtown Russellville, in a commercial/residential area of town. The armory is a two-story red brick building with a five-bay facade and an attached one-and-a-half-story drill hall at the rear. The front facade of the building is largely unadorned, except for limestone decoration around the front door and far right first-floor window, and around the far left and right second-story windows. All of the other windows have limestone sills. The windows are replacement nine-over-nine double-hung sash windows, but are very similar to the original windows, which had six-over-six double hung sashes. The double steel-and glass doors are replacements; the original double doors were wooden. A small parking lot is right in front of the building. Currently, the building is home to the Russellville Recreation Center, and is owned by the city. On the front of the building, a small plaque says the building was erected in 1932, but other documentation states that the building was completed in 1934.

The interior of the building has been modernized, with carpeting, new paint, and central air and heat. The room configurations are the same, and the original wooden drill hall floor has been stripped, but is intact. The original windows in the drill hall are largely intact with few exceptions. On the second floor, an open balcony overlooked the drill hall; this has been glassed-in. Some of the original interior wooden doors have been replaced with new ones, but some are still intact. The architect and builder of the armory are unknown; the blueprints and plans for the building are no longer at Facilities Division in Frankfort.

Narrative Statement of Significance

The former Russellville Armory (LO-R-67) is significant because of its association with the National Guard in Russellville, and for its importance to the city as a recreation and community center. The former armory meets National Register eligibility criterion A (historic association), and criterion C (type of construction). The property meets the registration requirements established for the armory property type because it possesses integrity of location and setting, materials, and design. The armory maintains integrity of location because it has not moved, and the setting (mixed commercial/residential) is the same as when the armory was built. The armory retains much of its original materials, and its design is the same. Besides serving as an armory, the community used the building for basketball games, community gatherings, fairs, and dances. The armory was used by the Guard until 1976, when a new facility was completed farther outside town. The building was then donated to the city, who renovated the facility for its current use as a recreation center.

The former Russellville Armory is a duplicate of the old Ravenna Armory, both built the same year and with the same design. The architect and builder of the two armories was most likely the same, however, since both buildings are no longer the property of the Commonwealth, blueprints could not

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be located. Overall, the historic Russellville Armory is in much better shape, both on the exterior and interior. The Ravenna Armory is not eligible for the National Register due to its many changes. At the Ravenna Armory, the windows have been replaced with different windows, the drill hall floor has been removed, and the original doors are gone. A single door has replaced the two double doors, and a small porch with latticework was put over the door. Many of the drill hall windows were filled in, due to the fact that they were broken while the building sat vacant. On the interior, the rooms have been changed around, and walls have been removed.

The National Guard has been in Russellville since 1902, when they were organized as Company M of the Third Kentucky Infantry. The company was demobilized in 1905, but revived in 1916 for service during World War I. The unit saw service on the Mexican border and in France during the war. After the war, the unit was once again demobilized, and then revived again in 1922, when it was federally recognized as Company M, 149th Infantry. The unit next saw active service in World War II where they spent time in Hawaii, Leyte, and the Phillippines. Members of the unit were in Manila when the war ended in August, 1945. After World War II, the unit was activated during the Bay of Pigs Crisis in 1961. Presently, the unit in Russellville is Detachment 1 of the 307th Maintenance Company, which has been there since May, 1995.

Verbal Boundary Description - The parcel designated by the Logan County PVA as tax map/parcel #R5-7-5.

Verbal Boundary Justification - The chosen boundary encompasses the lot historically associated with the Russellville Armory, including the land on which the building sits and the parking area out front, for a lot measuring 75 x 125 feet.
