

This bay contains the entry which has a simple surround with patera. The door is boarded at this time. | 19. History The Kentucky Street School was constructed in 1886-87. It was later named for the prominent Louisvillian, Victor Englehard. | | | |
| 20. Significance The Kentucky Street School is one of the last two Italianate schools remaining in the city. This building exhibits the typical stone banding between lintels | | | |

18. stone band decorates the facade on each floor and runs on a line below the lintel. The side bays contain two windows per floor in the same fenestration pattern. The facade is capped with a cornice with large modillions. A small pediment tops the center bay.

20 associated with residential Italianates in Louisville.

The structure was designed by D. X. Murphy, a local architect who succeeded the architect, Henry Whitestone. Whitestone was the major designer of the Italianate style in Louisville and Murphy's early work carried on that tradition.

10. Less than one acre. Small boiler room at rear of lot which is essential for heat supply. These two structures take up the larger portion of the lot with some yard space.
