#### **Architectural Description:**

The building is a three-story timber frame structure situated between Railroad Avenue, the old railroad grade, and First Street (Photo 1). The interior space is 10,500 square feet on three floors. The first floor is at street level on the north, south, and east sides, and the second floor is at railroad grade level on the west side. There is a concrete and stone retaining wall extending beyond the building supporting the grade. It appears that the building was constructed in phases, with the south half being the oldest. The building is now eight bays long, and three bays deep with a loading dock/porch on the east or street side, and two elevated loading doors on the west (Photo 2).

#### Setting

The Mill was built adjacent to the Railroad to provide ease of shipping the products. At one time there was a rail siding on a trestle adjacent to the Mill for their sole usage, and a railroad bridge crossing the Tygarts Valley River within a few feet of the Mill. The newly rehabilitated Elkins Depot is approximately100 yards north of the Mill. Both Railroad Avenue on the east and First Street on the south have asphalt surfaces with curbs and storm drains. Across the river to the south are commercial and industrial buildings including the old Elkins Power Plant building. To the west beyond the railroad grade, the former railroad yard is vacant. To the east across Railroad Avenue are residences and an old motel.

#### Exterior

The south portion was originally a four story rectangular structure built in 1902 (Figure 1). An addition before 1920 extended the building on the north side. A 1937 fire did enough damage that the fourth floor was removed. The current L shape was achieved by the removal of the southeast corner. The south portion has wooden German lap siding in fair condition on the east façade and poor condition on the west facade, with 6/6 or 6/1 regularly spaced windows. The L shaped loading dock/porch has a metal shed roof with a combination concrete and wooden floor. The concrete part is at ground level on the north, and the wooden part is several steps above ground level on the south due to a gentle North/South slope of the land.

In the early days of the Mill's operations there was a coal shed owned by John Davis and later Darden north of the mill (Map 1). The coal provided fuel to heat the boiler in the "iron clad" engine room, and generate power to the mill. The concrete floor remnants to the immediate north of the present building and the concrete railroad retaining wall may be the limited remains of a

warehouse (Map 2). By 1910 the Mill was powered by electricity (Map 3). The current "iron clad" north portion filled the space between the current and original wood siding south portion and the former warehouse (Map 3). This conclusion is evidenced by the slight angle of the north wall that would have been the side abutting the adjacent building. In further support of the conclusion is the patched corrugated metal siding on the first and second floor of the north face showing the angle of the former shed roof (Photo 3). The corrugated metal siding is original to the north portion (note on Map 2). This siding has been interrupted on the first floor street side by modern doors and windows. The roof line angle of the north portion does not exactly match the south roof line. The roll roofing now spans this small offset (noticeable on Photos 1 and 2).

#### Interior

The interior of the south portion is in good condition, particularly on the second and third floors. Here the flooring and some of the walls are tongue and grove. The stairways between floors may not be original. This is evidenced by the fact that the stairs partially block a window (Photo 4), and between the first and second floors the stairs have the first step located at the loading dock doors, partially obstructing easy movement. Since there is no evidence of original stairways in the south portion, they may have been in the southeast corner that was removed. There is an elevator shaft, but no elevator remains. The brick chimney here is recent. On the second floor a very large opening in its north wall leads from the south to the north portion. A partial wall separates them on the third floor. On the first floor the ceiling is lower than on the other floors, and there are fewer windows. The floor has various coverings. A toilet room on the east wall is just large enough for a toilet and one person. A modern apartment was established on the south end with rooms partitioned off and recent doors and windows (Photo 5). At one time there were windows on the west railroad yard side that were in dropped boxes. These have been enclosed or boarded up. The north portion once had a stairway against its north wall. The first floor has a recent gas furnace. On the second floor near the north end, two massive posts were removed and a cable was stretched across the opening to help support the third floor. The upper beam now sags, but only slightly.

Grain mills are notorious for fires due to dust combustion, and at least two fires, 1911 or 12, and 1937 (Figure 2 through 6) left their marks on the community and the interior of both halves of the

building. Surface (1/4 to1/2 inch deep) charring is visible on some of the interior beams; some have been replaced, and some recycled to other locations in the building. Pieces of original mill machinery are scattered throughout (Photos 6, 7, and 8), and machine mounts are present on walls and ceilings (Photo 9). These appear to be remnants of roller mill machinery. There is also a large industrial scale (Photo 10).

The Mill evidences change through time, which is to be expected in an industrial building responding to market forces. As milling technologies and local needs changed, so changed the building. Most of the changes occurred within the historic period, and do not constitute adverse impacts to the building's integrity. Modern alterations that include the apartment and recent commercial modifications are all easily reversible. The basic structure of the Mill is sound and worthy of rehabilitation.

#### Statement of Significance:

This property is significant under Criterion A for industry, Criterion B for its association with local business person Ralph Darden, and Criterion C for its industrial architecture. The period of significance spans the years between 1902 (the date of construction) and 1954, a period in which the building served Elkins and the surrounding area as a merchant grain mill and feed store.

#### Significance Under Criterion A:

The Elkins Milling Company (also known locally as Darden's Mill) hereinafter referred to as the Mill, is an important link in telling the story of the early history of Elkins and the surrounding area, its workers, and its economy. In 1901, the Elkins Milling Company purchased a lot for \$1,000 on the railroad yard of the West Virginia Central and Pittsburgh Railway Company from Henry Gassaway Davis (Figure 7), and built a mill that operated from 1902 until 1919 (Figures 8 through 11) when it was sold to local businessperson Ralph Darden and added to his holdings under the Darden Company, or DARCO, name (Photo 13). The Mill provided a service for central West Virginia farmers and shipped finished products all over the state and beyond. During peak production, many tons of grain came in, keeping workers busy around the clock. When the Mill was completed in 1902, a coal fired steam boiler and engine powered the Mill at a time when water power dominated the industry. The original steam engine was replaced by electric power by 1910—an early conversion to this source of power. The Mill also kept the adjacent railroad yard running at its peak. During the first half of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, the railroad yard was an expansive hub of activity for industry and transportation (Photo 12). Today, the railroad yard is vacant, save for the passenger depot and the Mill.

DARCO was profitable through most of the first half of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, as it was the sole supplier to the Atlantic and Pacific (A&P) Tea Company for its stores throughout the state. The company eventually discontinued production of flour at the Mill and increased production of buckwheat, corn, feeds and farm supplies (Map 4). In 1943 the property was sold to Samuel D. and Minnie Girard who leased it to Altman's Cash Feed Store (Map 5). Then in 1946 the Darden Company went bankrupt due to competition from the Southern States Company. By the mid-1960s Girard's son Joseph operated the Elkins Farm Supply in the Mill, until March of 1967, then sold the building to Ray and Evelyn Hill. After this date the building passed through many owners, serving as a warehouse for selling used furniture and recycled construction materials.

#### **Significance Under Criterion B:**

Mr. Ralph Darden is significant in regional history as a major employer, as a founding officer of the Elkins Milling Company, and as an investor in several other grain and milling related businesses in Randolph and Tucker Counties. Darden maintained his business office in Elkins on Davis Avenue, and his house in Elkins (421 Davis Avenue, built 1904, listed in the National Register of Historic Places as a contributing building to the Downtown Elkins Historic District) has been preserved and rehabilitated by the Elkins Historic Landmarks Commission. As an early business developer in Elkins, he may be considered one of the founders of the community, which sprang into existence with the coming of the railroad. Born in Hoskie, North Carolina on March 10, 1867, Darden spent his early years in Murfreesboro. Darden was an early resident of Elkins in 1890, at a time when the town numbered a dozen houses. He started out in the real-estate and insurance business, and by 1894 he had incorporated the Darden Company, also known as DARCO. During his lifetime, he served in many community leadership roles, including the Methodist Church, the Randolph County Board of Education, as a charter member of the Rotary Club, as one of the first directors of the Elkins YMCA, as president of the Chamber of Commerce, and as the first president of the Monongahela Valley Association. Additional credits include serving as an officer of the Elkins Fair Association (which exists today as the Forest Festival), as president of the Cash and Grocery, and as a member of the Board of Directors of the Davis Trust Company. Darden passed away on December 1, 1948 at the age of 81, and was buried in Maplewood Cemetery, the resting place of many of the early business and political leaders of Elkins.

#### **Significance Under Criterion C:**

The post and beam/timber frame construction that dominates the interior is one of the few remaining industrial buildings in the state. Elkins historian Robert Whetsell says he can find "no other commercial building or mill still in decent shape in the region with a similar history and wooden frame/post and beam construction." The Mill's architecture is outstanding, particularly the interior where the massive posts and beams built strong to carry many tons of grain and feed are exposed to view (Photo 11). The Mill is a large, timber framed, post and beam building with approximately 10,500 square feet on its three floors. A small apartment/office was intruded into the first floor south bay, which overlays the original materials in this area. In addition the first floor walls and ceiling were painted white and various floor coverings were used.

The interior of the older south half has a more finished appearance than the north half where the building is sheathed in corrugated metal that in some areas is exposed in the interior.

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The northernmost warehouse is no longer extant, and the space between it and the original Mill structure has changed from a shed roofed lean-to to its present form (Photo 14). Despite the changes, the building retains integrity of design and materials.

The second and third floors have tongue and groove flooring, and in some areas beaded tongue and groove walls and ceilings that reflect a golden glow in the natural lighting from the Mill's many windows. Such beauty in an historic industrial building deserves our attention and recognition. Historic preservation architect Mike Gioulis (2002) concluded that it is structurally sound.

#### **Statement of Significance Conclusion:**

Mills serve a social function by bringing together people who might not otherwise have an opportunity to communicate. Mills bring into town rural people, and there is interaction between farmers and industrial workers, buyers and sellers. This Mill served a multi-county area of the state, because it not only milled the farmer's produce, it also shipped it throughout the State.

The Mill is significant for its distinctive and beautiful architecture, its function as a steam then electric driven roller mill, its social history, its connection to Ralph Darden, and the fact that it is the only remaining industrial building on the historic railyard to survive into the present era.

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#### Verbal Boundary Description

The following is the wording taken from the DEED of purchase recorded in the Office of the Clerk of the County Commission of Randolph County, West Virginia, in Deed Book 482 at page 414:

Beginning at a point along western boundary of Railroad Avenue in said City and 63.5 feet distant from the center line of the railway of Western Maryland Railroad Company and 40 feet south of the S.E. corner of the Darden Coal House (now gone) and in a line with the eastern boundary of said coal house, thence south along the western boundary of Railroad Avenue 154.3 feet to a point; said point being the N.W. corner of Railroad Avenue and First Street, thence at right angles to first line and along the north boundary and First Street 68.2 feet to a point, last mentioned point being 33 feet from the center line of the said Railroad measured at right angles thereto and on the eastern side of said railroad, thence in a concentric circle in a northeasterly direction and parallel with said railroad center line and 33 feet distant therefore 159 feet to a point, thence along a line at right angles to railroad and in a easterly direction 30.5 feet to the place of beginning, and containing 7,150 square feet, more or less. Said real estate being commonly known as the Darden Mill Property location at the corner of First Street and Railroad Avenue.

#### **Boundary Justification**

The above wording is consistent with the historic boundary of the property purchased from the West Virginia Central and Pittsburgh Railroad by the Elkins Milling Company in 1901 (see Figure 7). The Mill is effectively contained within these boundaries by two city streets and the railroad yard.












#### FIRE OF UNDETERMINED OR-IGIN BREAKS OUT IN MILL-ING COMPANY PLANY

Chinese Recruiting Office Busy Under State Department's Nose; Fliers In Demand; Paid \$1500 a Month And Bonus For Victories; Government Buying Huge Quantity Of Butter, Eggs To Peg Price; Kennedy Gets Cash For Audit Despite Comptroller's Opposition.

WASHINGTON, September, 3. While the State Department is leaning over backward to avoid embroilment in the Far Eastern conflict, a recruiting office almost in the shadow of the White House is busily enlisting men to fight in the Chinese army. So far, about 200 American-born Chinese have signed up. Most of them are young members of Washington's miniature Chinatown, which has a population of around 5,000.

The secret recruiting office is in charge of George Moy, leading restaurateur and son of the late 'mayor' of Chinatown, Moy's place of business is known among his people as "city hall".

THE EMPLOYMENT SITUATION, or rather the idleness, at the Moundsville penifentiary has long been a serious problem. With existing federal laws prohibiting the transporation of prison-made goods in interstate commerce there is slight hope for the operation of factories in the prison which once made it a self-supporting institution. The only remedy, it would seem, is for the state to manufacture supplies which it now purchases on the open market.

THE UNITED STATES bought \$144.819-000 more than it sold in the first seven months of this year, the Department of Commerce reported yesterday. This unfavorable balance compared with a similar balance of \$24,214,000 for the same period a year ago. And in the face of these figures the national administration continous on its way of recriprocal trade treaties. It is in effect bartering away a 90 percent domestic market for a 10 percent foreign market. Abandonment of this nation's traditional protective tariff policy once more has proven a tragic filacy.

INSTEAD OF PROTECTING our home markets for American workmen, the administration insists on opening these markets to the products of foreign countries which are cheaply produced with cheap labor. And this all in the face of millions of unemployed workers in this country and millions of dollars of expenditures, for the relief of the unemployed.


