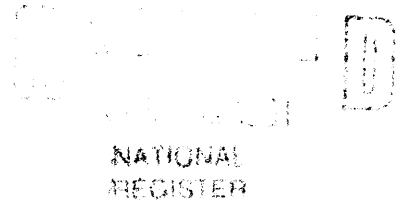

Describe present and historic physical appearance.

This three story brick building, measuring approximately 26'x65', with two story rear wing, is located at 110 N. Main, immediately north of the Brazelton House Hotel. It is rectangular in shape with the narrow end of the rectangle facing the street. The flat roof slopes gently to the rear. Presently painted white, the building features round arched windows with brick patterned hoodmolds at the second and third floor levels, and a bracketed wooden cornice. The street level has been altered, but retains the original configuration of a central recessed entry flanked by display windows, and a door at the right leading to a stairway.

The visual appearance of this building is quite similar to that of the Brazelton House next door, the Union Block, and the McCandless Building. All share the characteristics of the early Italianate commercial style that was popular in Mount Pleasant following the arrival of the railroad in 1856. However, the Budde-Singer Building was actually constructed in 1882. The original building on the site was constructed in 1856, at the same time as the hotel, and in the same style. In January 1882, the Budde Bakery Building (110 N. Main) burned. It was rebuilt almost immediately, and in the original early Italianate style. By 1882 this must have been considered old-fashioned.

Alterations include: painting the facade (by 1909), remodeling the storefront, replacement of original windows at second and third floor levels, and loss of iron balcony at second floor. The building retains sufficient integrity to be easily recognized as an early Italianate structure.

On the interior, the ceiling has been lowered on the first floor. The second floor has been divided into apartments and the ceiling lowered. The third floor was never finished as it was used for storage purposes, the function it serves today.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

This building is significant under Criterion C as an example of a Type II building in the early Italianate style that was popular in Mount Pleasant from 1855-c.1870, following the arrival of the railroad in 1856.

The Budde-Singer Building is an anomaly. Constructed in 1882, it reflects the early Italianate style that was popular when the original building on the site was built in 1856. Although no reason has been determined for this, it may have been a conscious effort to continue the style of the Brazelton House Hotel next door.

The Brazelton House Hotel (NRHP) was constructed in 1856 at the northeast corner of the Square in the popular new Italianate style, with round arched windows, brick patterned hoodmolds, and bracketed wooden cornice. This building apparently established a new design to be followed throughout the business district. Prior to this most of the brick buildings had featured stone lintel construction. In September 1857 the newspaper noted that five brick buildings had been constructed in the one block north of the Brazelton. Included in that five would have been the original building on this lot, constructed in 1856, at the same time and in the same style as the hotel next door. In its present form it features the round arched windows, brick hoodmolds, and bracketed wooden cornice that are characteristic of the earlier period.

Some documentation has been located linking William McCandless with the 1856 building on this lot. It is known that he was at least a part owner of the lot, and it might be a safe assumption that he was the builder. This has not been definitely determined. If he was the builder, it would be the earliest building attributed to him, and would provide a direct link with the Brazelton House Hotel as well. Research continues.

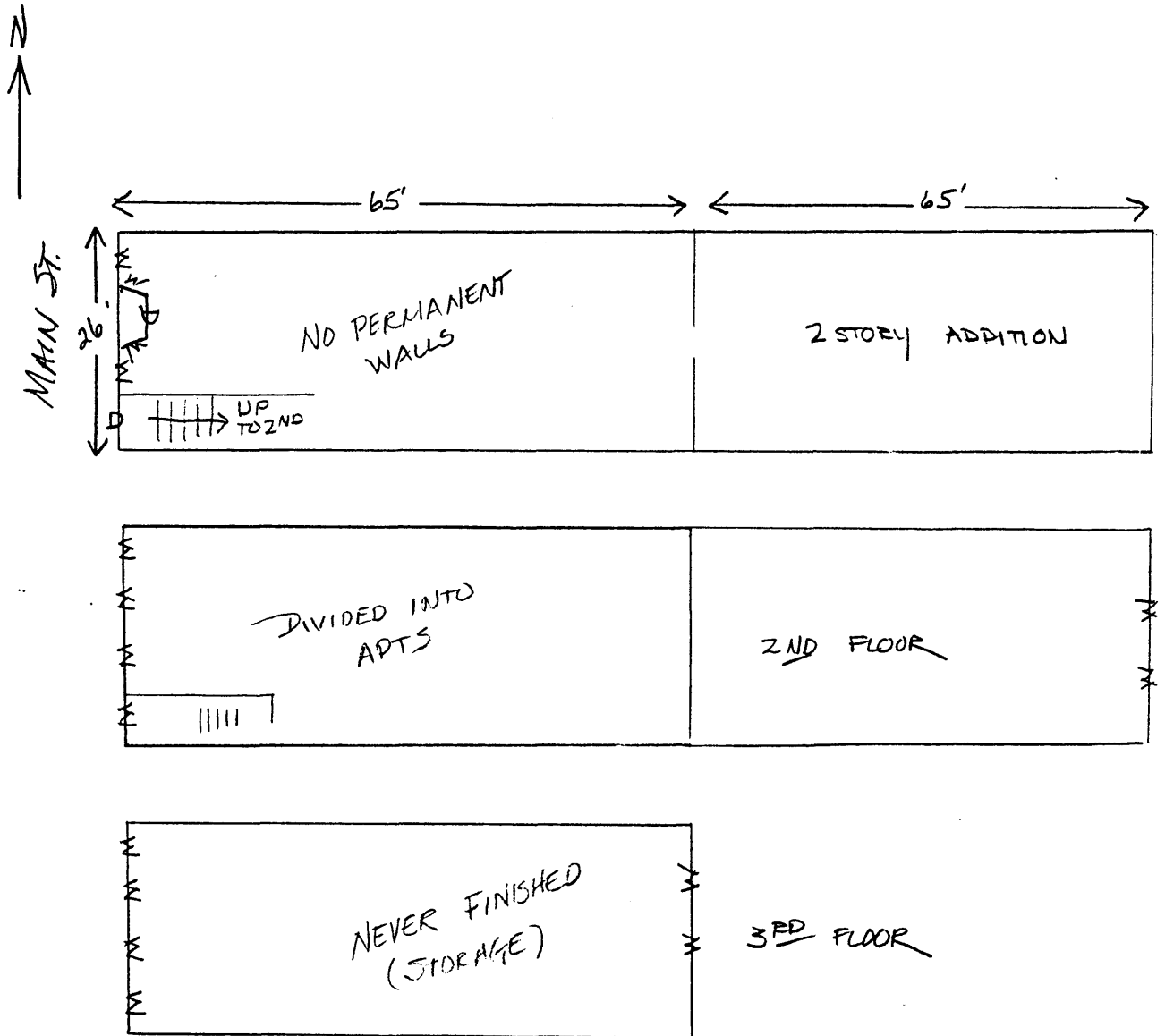

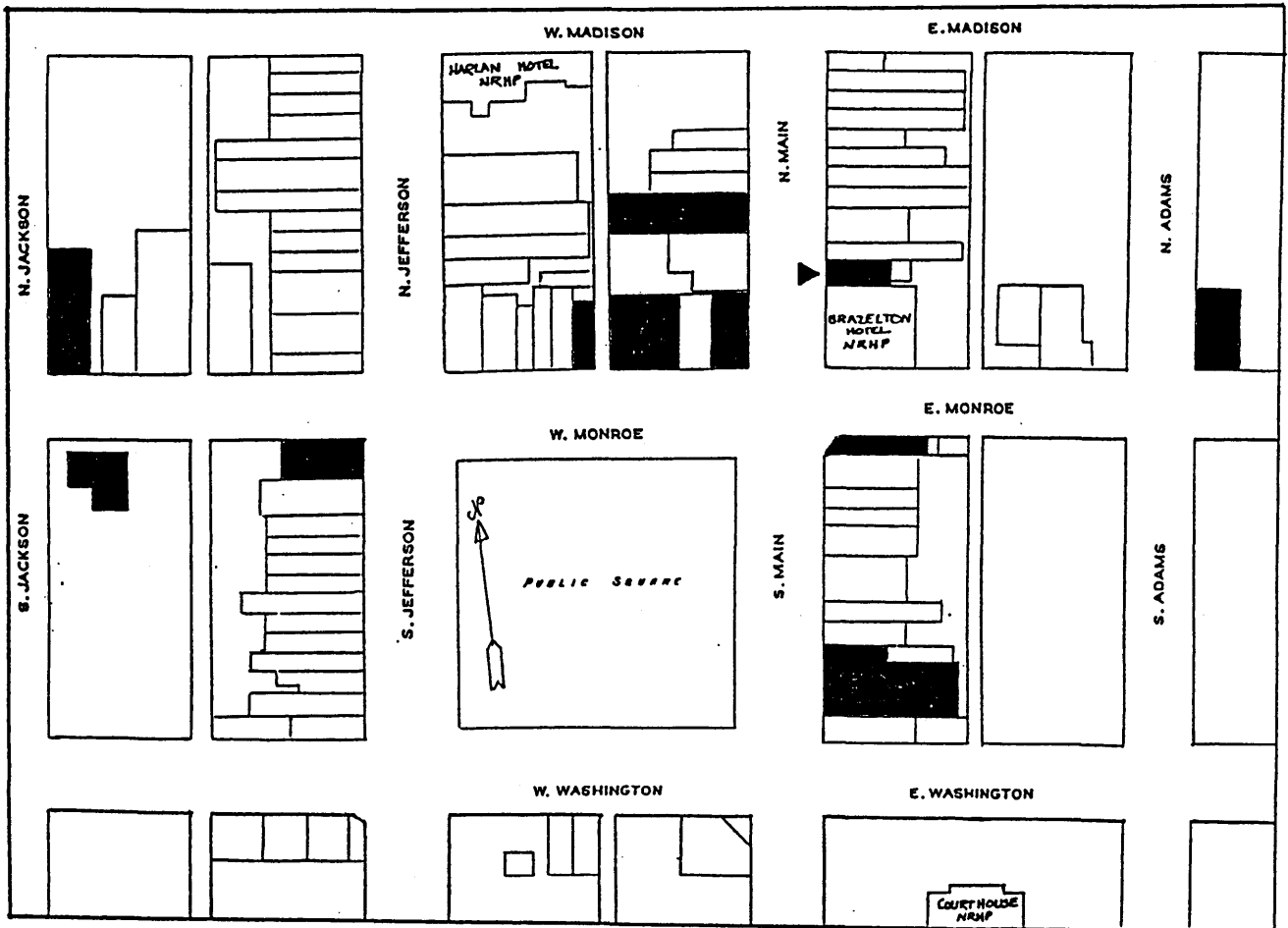
