STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

PFC Franklin Runyon Sousley, born and raised in Fleming County in the Appalachian foothills of Kentucky, was among four men who inadvertently participated in one of the chief American images of the Allied war effort during World War II. He was born in this rude cabin on September 19, 1925. No other building is more closely associated with the short life of Franklin Sousley than this cabin, his birthplace and early residence. Other houses in the area in which the family lived are either no longer existent or belong to other members of the family with whom they are Although the birthplace may not adequately associated locally. represent the achievements of prominent men in most areas of life, this cabin seems a fitting symbol of one who, from a modest and typical background, sprang into international fame almost fortuitously under the glaring spotlight of war. Sousley's personal heroism was made all the more poignant and striking by contrast to the ordinariness from which it arose.

Sousley was immortalized when Joe Rosenthal of the Associated Press photographed Sousley and several others raising the American flag at Mt. Suribachi during the capture of Iwo Jima in February, 1945. Iwo Jima was one of the more important battles in the Pacific Theatre because of the importance the Japanese had placed upon it as a base for their air fleet. After its capture it was used by American forces as a half-way house for American fighter planes to stage or land if damaged. It was also an important home base for the United States final assault on Japan.

The fighting on Iwo Jima was fierce; 6,800 men were killed on this small island. Franklin R. Sousley was among these young men who lost their lives; he was only nineteen when in March, 1945 he died in the fighting around Kitano Point, north of Mt. Suribachi.

Sousley's home was Fleming County, Kentucky, a rural, semimountainous region in northeastern Kentucky. The small rude cabin was his childhood home as he lived there with his parents (continued)

His childhood was much like that of until he was six years old. any rural farmboy. Sousley graduated from high school in 1943 and then like many of his contemporaries he left his rural home Sousley chose Dayton, Ohio where he for the industrial north. stayed for one year before returning to Fleming County. This pattern of migration was, and still is, characteristic of the young people of eastern Kentucky. Since there are few job opportunities in eastern Kentucky, young people leave for the industrial cities of the north where jobs are plentiful. Better job opportunities and family ties are two major inducements for those young people who Sousley then lived in Fleming County for a month or do return. so before he joined the Marine Corps.

Although of unknown (but probably considerable) age and not altogether typical of vernacular construction in the area, this building if preserved would be an appropriate recognition of the value of modest, as well as pretentious architecture.
