DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Governor Charles C. Stratton House was built ca. 1794 and has received only minor alterations probably in the middle of the 19th century.

- 1. Exterior - The exterior is red brick (Flemish bond front and common bond with glazed header courses every sixth course on other sides) and has been repointed in recent years. On the west front facade there are a brick water table and brick belt courses. The house is two-and-a-half stories. The cornice is of decorative wood parts with pierced fretwork and brackets on a wood base, over a flat brick cornice. The front doorway is also in the Federal Style with a broken pediment and fanlight arch on fluted pilasters. The floor to ceiling windows on the front are probably a mid-19th century renovation. Other windows are original frames and original 12/12 sash with delicately molded window sills. The roof is gable with asphalt roofing over wood shingles and has paired brick chimneys at either end. There are two Federal Style dormers on the west which are original but the two dormers on the rear east roof are modern additions. A porch extends the full length of the east rear facade and appears to be original with a raised brick floor.
- 2. Interior The plan is a center hall plan. In the hall is an arch with dentil motif in the Federal Style as well as an open stairway to the second floor. Front parlors flank the hall with a dining room and kitchen to the rear. The marble parlor mantles appear to be mid-19th century renovations. The second floor contains three bedrooms which contain original mantles with pierced fretwork in the Federal Style. The attic contains four rooms now used for storage.
- 3. Site The house is located on a rise set back some distance east of the highway. An unpaved driveway leads in from the highway to a parking area to the east rear of the house. There are small outbuildings to the east of the house.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This house was erected ca. 1794 by Doctor James Stratton. Here, his son, Governor Charles Creighton Stratton, was born, lived, and died. Governor Stratton was the first governor to be elected directly by the voters of New Jersey under the new State Constitution of 1844. Governor Stratton born here in 1796 was a member of the Legislature for four terms, a member of Congress 1837-1839 and 1841-1843, and a member of the State constitutional convention 1844. He died here on March 30, 1859.

The center hall plan with paired chimneys at either end of the house, dormers with decorative details, and classical doorways are features typical of late 18th century New Jersey domestic architecture in the Federal Style and follow the pattern set by more southerly examples, such as the William Corbit House, Odessa, Delaware, built c. 1773. The main doorway, cornice, and interior hallway arch are very fine examples of domestic woodwork.
