Description:

#### NARRATIVE:

The name "ERREA HOUSE" is applied to the property because the Errea family owned and occupied the house for about 75 years, up until 1992. The Errea House is a 1134 square foot one story house, with an attic that has one dormer, and a large porch or veranda on the east and north sides. It is located in the downtown area of Tehachapi on South Green Street, one block East of Curry Street (also known as State Route 202), and two blocks south of Tehachapi Blvd. (also known as business route I-58).

According to the Errea family, the house was constructed by a doctor in the first settlement, variously known as Williamsburg or Tehichipa, four miles west of present Tehachapi. (The area of this first settlement is now referred to as "Old Town".) The Erreas further stated that the house was moved from Tehichipa to its present location around the year 1900. The house was moved on log rollers.

The Erreas described the original house as having a kitchen, dining room, living room and two bedrooms. However, one had to go outside onto a covered porch on the west side to move between bedrooms. (This covered porch has since been enclosed.)

In 1952 Tehachapi experienced a 7.7 magnitude earthquake, at which time the long-unused water tank on the west side of the house collapsed and damaged the house. In repairing the damage, the Erreas enclosed the porch on the west side. The enclosed porch now runs from the kitchen to the bedroom at the opposite end of the house, making it possible to go from room to room without going outside. The only other known changes made by the Erreas was to replace the wooden drain board and old sink in the kitchen. This was accomplished in the early 1960s. The bathroom tub was removed, and a stall shower was installed. At some point the front door was moved from the east side to the north side, thereby changing entry into the house from the living room to the dining room.

The Erreas used the original dining room as their living room, and the original living room as a bedroom. It is not known whether this change was made by the Erreas, or by the former owner, Louis Vidaillet. Also, it is not known whether Vidaillet moved the house from old Tehichipa, or purchased it subsequent to its move.

### ARCHITECTURAL:

The Errea House is a one-story frame, sitting on a concrete foundation, with a wood tongue and groove floor over a large crawl space. The roof is a combination gable, hip and valley design. Composition roofing material covers wood shingles of undetermined age. The attic includes 2 inch x 5 inch rough-sawn rafters, and one inch x 12 inch sheathing, as well as remnants of knob and tube electric lines, and also an abandoned chimney. Square metal nails were used throughout. The 1355 sq. ft. roof coverage includes a porch with wood floor, turned posts, 2-rail/spindles, and dormer. Exterior doors are panel with surface mount box-like skeleton key locks, ship lap siding, one x six plane on door and window trim. These elements give the house a

Greek Revival look.

Four rooms, a kitchen, bath and enclosed porch make up the 1134 sq. ft. of interior floor space. Interior walls are high 1/4" mat board nailed on each side of a vertical one x twelve. 1/4 x 3 batting is placed over edge cracks. Interior ceilings utilize wood tongue and groove. All interior walls have four foot high wainscoting. Windows are double hung glazed four-pane type. Windows have pull compression locks on each side stile. Carpentry work over interior doors and cabinetry are of non-professional quality.

#### Statement of Significance

The Errea House is historically significant because it is the last remaining structure from the first settlement in the Tehachapi area. This first townsite was surveyed by James E. Williams. James Williams gave his name to the townsite in 1869, "Williamsburg". However, this name was temporary.

By 1872 the town included some houses, a hotel, blacksmith shop, stores and school, and was referred to as "Tehichipa" (see attached reproduction of an 1875 advertisement). The name Tehichipa came from the local Native Americans, who applied a similar name to their nearby community.

By 1873, gold bullion from the Cerro Gordo mine in the Owens Valley was being shipped through Tehichipa to the rail terminus at Tipton (in the San Joaquin Valley). By 1875, shipments went from Tehichipa to Caliente in the foothills of the Mountains. Other freighting activity through Tehichipa utilized 16-mule teams pulling three wagons. This activity helped the town to grow, as did an influx of settlers into the area.

The people of Tehichipa were looking forward to more growth with the coming of the railroad. A rail line was finally being built through the Tehachapis, utilizing the famous Tehachapi Loop to overcome the steep grade. However, when the railroad finally reached the Tehachapi Valley, Tehichipa was bypassed. Instead, the Southern Pacific Company surveyed a new townsite four miles east of Tehichipa. The Southern Pacific constructed a depot and named it "Tehachapi Summit".

Soon, Tehachapi Summit was competing with Tehichipa for the trade of the valley. Tehachapi Summit slowly grew as Tehichipa declined. Finally, businesses and residents literally moved their structures to the new railroad town of Tehachapi Summit. By 1887 the original Tehichipa was referred to as "Old Town", a name still applied to the area of old Tehichipa. There is no longer evidence of the existence of this town except for a Historical Monument in the area. This Monument reads "Old Town The oldest settlement in Tehachapi Valley known as 'Old Town' was established here during the 1860s. It was an important station on the road between Southern California and the San Joaquin Valley. The community began to decline when residents gradually removed to nearby Greenwich, later renamed Tehachapi, after completion of the Southern Pacific Railroad in 1876. Landmark #643 Plaque placed by California State Park Commission in cooperation with Kern County Historical Society El Tejon parlor #239 Native Daughters of the Golden West and Kern County Museum, July 27, 1958 ". The Errea House is the only surviving structure from the Tehichipa period.

It is believed, based upon the architecture and materials of construction, that the Errea House was built between 1870 and 1875. It is unlikely that it would have been built after 1876, since it is believed that there was no new construction in Tehichipa after the coming of the railroad. By June of 1878 there were six empty houses in the town. It is known that a Dr. McClanahan arrived in Tehichipa in October of 1873. By May of 1876 three doctors were ministering to the health needs of residents in the area. There is continuing research in an attempt to confirm that one of these doctors built the Errea House.

Many visitors to the Tehachapi Museum inquire about the old Tehichipa. Visitors are also interested in the role the Errea House played in both Tehichipa and Tehachapi. The Errea House, located directly across the street from the Museum, is the only link to this period and the only visible evidence of the first town, Tehichipa. The "Historic Downtown Tehachapi Walking Tour", items 1 through 11 (attached herewith), describes the surrounding houses of early Tehachapi.

It is assumed that the house had no electricity or plumbing at the time it was moved. Electricity and city water did not become available until about 1915. The locations of abandoned well and outhouse are visible and have been utilized in the present landscaping.

The yard of the Errea House, most of which is on the north side and faces Green Street, was always well kept. It included a grape vine, peach tree, red bud, holly, flowering quince and lilacs, all of which created an old-fashioned garden appearance. These plants and look are being maintained.


