The Bernice Civic Clubhouse (1938) is a one story frame building designed in the rustic manner. It is located amid live oaks in Oakhurst Park on the eastern edge of the small town of Bernice. Despite a few alterations, the building retains the bulk of its original character and hence can convey its historic role as the social center of Bernice.

The long, low building is sheathed in rough circular sawn boards. Across the front is a porch which has always been enclosed. It consists of clapboarded walls pierced by large, flat pointed arch openings. The roof is pierced by three gablets and features exposed rafters and a few angle braces. The chimney, located at the center of the rear elevation, is of ironstone. Ironstone is also used to accent the front steps. The porch ceiling features exposed rafters and the facade unfinished clapboards and three sets of French doors.

The interior retains its original rustic character. The floorplan, which survives largely intact, consisted of a large meeting room with two relatively small service spaces on the eastern end and a stage flanked by bathrooms on the western end. At the center of the long back wall is an ironstone fireplace. The fireplace has a mantel shelf with beveled blocks in the Craftsman manner. The ceiling, of unpainted boards, is spanned by non-structural beams. The unpainted board walls feature a beveled board wainscot. The meeting room also retains its original wooden floor.

The building has received the following alterations within the last fifty years:

- (1) The pointed arch openings have been screened and the last two bays on each end covered from the interior (see below).
- (2) In the late forties/early fifties a small room was created on each end of the porch via the insertion of a wall and covering the arched openings on the interior. On the eastern side, the facade wall was removed to make one big room from the porch space and one of the previously mentioned service areas.
- (3) The windows on the side and rear elevations have been replaced with metal windows.

#### Assessment of Integrity:

The Bernice Civic Clubhouse would be immediately recognizable to anyone from the historic period, despite the few changes noted above. The small rooms on each end of the porch are not that noticeable from an overall exterior view because the porch was never completely open. What is remarkable is that the building has not lost its original rustic character, especially the unpainted interior.

#### Non-contributing Element

Also located on the clubhouse property is a building known locally as the "Boy Scout Hut." Although probably fifty years old, it does not relate to the significance of the nominated resource, nor is it individually eligible. Hence, it is being considered a non-contributing element.

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The Bernice Civic Clubhouse is locally significant in the area of social history because it was the small town's social center. It served in this capacity from its construction in 1938 up to and past the fifty year cutoff.

The building was constructed by the Bernice Civic Club, a ladies organization, to replace a gazebo-like pavilion built by the club in 1907. In addition to being used for Civic Club activities, the building was the scene of most of Bernice's social events, there being no other available facilities in town other than private homes.

The first gala function held at the clubhouse was a Christmas Dance, December 26, 1938, with admission by invitation. The prices, as noted on a surviving invitation, were couples \$1.25, stags \$1.00, and spectators 50 cents. It is remembered as quite a grand affair, with an orchestra, formal attire and a roaring fire in the stone fireplace.

The Civic Clubhouse was very popular to rent for dances, especially with the youth of the community. During the historic period dances were forbidden at the high school on conservative religious grounds, the principal being a staunch Southern Baptist. The ladies of the Bernice Civic Club, however, were more liberal. Hence their clubhouse was the only place for teenagers to have dances, including proms and more impromptu affairs. In reference to the latter, people fondly recall spur of the moment scrambles to scrape together enough money to rent the building. The rental secured, they then borrowed a jukebox from a downtown restaurant. Some also recall hearing a sermon the next morning on the evils of dancing, and while the preacher never mentioned the clubhouse by name, the inference was clear. A less controversial high school function held at the clubhouse was an annual baccalaureate dinner for seniors and their families hosted by the Civic Club.

The clubhouse was rented for a wide variety of social functions besides dances, including birthday parties, bridal showers, family reunions, etc. -- in short, any function too large to be held at home. A particularly popular activity was the boxed supper -- a fundraiser where individuals would bring decorated boxes with a complete supper inside to be auctioned off.

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#### Note on Architect:

There are extant plans marked "A Civic Clubhouse for Bernice, Louisiana," J. W. Smith and Associates, Monroe, Louisiana. However, the building shown is in a formal neo-Georgian style. Whether J. W. Smith and Associates designed the existing Bernice Civic Clubhouse is unknown.
