### **Narrative Description**

Starbuck Park is located along Bear Creek Canyon Drive, already listed on National Register of Historic Places. Situated off State Highway 74, four miles above the town of Morrison, and adjacent to the town of Idledale. The park consists of 11.3 acres and was included in the Olmsted Brother's acquisition plan as part of the Bear Mountain Tract.

The entrance to the park is a dirt road which veers south from Highway 74, and is the original road through the Bear Creek Canyon and the park. Approximately seventy-five yards from the Highway 74 junction, one comes to the J.J.B Benedict designed well house, which today serves as a picnic shelter.

The well house was situated to utilize the natural terrain of the area and continues to do so even though Bear Creek Drive Canyon Drive was realigned by the C.C.C.'s in the 1930's as the result of a disastrous flood. Built prior to 1923 by the City of Denver, it is a rectangular, open stone structure with four supporting piers, a concrete floor and an asphalt shingled roof. It was constructed of native stone and timber, and designed to ensure harmony between the natural features and man-made elements.

Along the road, to the south, are flat areas along both sides of Bear Creek. These areas are used for fishing and picnicking. Giant cottonwood trees along the creek maintain a riparian ecosystem and offer shade for visitors. In these areas were located the two ponds, which were used as a fish hatchery by the City of Denver to provide fish for the rest of the early Denver Mountain Park System.

Continuing on the road, at the end of the park, one comes to the adjacent property on which is located the ruins of the Denver Motor Club building, built in the early 1920's.

The park continues to provide open space between private developments and serves as a quiet, secluded area for picnicking and fishing. Standing at the shelter house, looking down the park road, one can gain a sense of what the area was like in the 1920's.

#### **Narrative Statement of Significance**

Starbuck Park meets criterion A for its historical significance to Entertainment and Recreation, Community Planning and Development and Conservation. It also meets criterion C for Landscape Architecture and Architecture. Starbuck Park was included in Olmsted's original acquisition plan as part of the Bear Creek Tract formerly adopted and acquired by the Mountain Park Commission in 1916. The park meets the registration requirements as they are defined in the Multiple Property Documentation Form for the Denver mountain Parks.

This secluded natural park, considered one of the "picnic parks of the hills", offered a rest stop for visitors touring the Bear Creek Canyon loop, as well as water from the well house to drink and replenish early automobile radiators. Providing easy access to Bear Creek, a favorite fishing spot, amplifies its significance to Entertainment and Recreation.

The park is significant to Community Planning and Development for its association with the City Beautiful Movement in Denver as an extension of the merger of city planning into regional planning. The park provides vital open space separation between mountain communities.

This space provided between mountain communities also makes Starbuck park significant in Conservation as an important, early example of the concept of open space. In addition, the trout hatchery formerly located on the site is another early example of conserving natural resources. While destroyed by the nineteen-thirties floods, it was a fine example of very early efforts to manage natural resources for recreation.

As it provided fish for recreational fishing, in both Starbuck and other Denver Mountain Parks, Starbuck is significant to Recreation and Outdoor Recreation.

The park is significant to Architecture in that the well house was designed by J. J. B. Benedict and represents the fine craftsmanship and quality characteristic of rustic architecture using native materials in proper scale and avoiding undiluted hard lines and over sophistication.

Starbuck Park was named after John T. Starbuck, a prominent Jefferson County rancher who settled in Bear Creek Canyon in the early 1900's. As one of the first settlers in the area, he built a guest ranch on the present site of the town of Idledale. His former ranch, in addition to Starbuck Park, included portions of the present Red Rocks Park and several portions of the Denver Mountain Parks System. The community he founded was originally named Starbuck until changed to Idledale in 1933, following a flood along Bear Creek.

In the early twenties, the City and County of Denver was joined by the Denver Motor Club in making several permanent improvements to the public park and the area adjacent to it. The motor club's country home, a large stone building, located on a sixty-five acre tract was a major destination spot for early Denver motorists. A restaurant, dance hall and several cabins were available adjacent to the park. Several of the buildings and the bridge that crossed the creek were lost as a result of devastating floods and/or fires in the 1930's.

Starbuck Park was advertised as "--an idyllically secluded natural park consisting of large shade trees with ample space for picnics, ball games, streamside camping and other activities with plenty of tables, grills and the purest stream water available." A local restaurant, and a general store adjacent to the park continued to operate after the 1930's, providing plate lunches and services to visitors. The restaurant closed long ago, but John Starbuck's widow, Pearl, operated the store well into the 1970's.

The period of significance is arbitrarily ended at 1944 to meet the National Register's age criteria.

Verbal Boundary Description

Starbuck Park was deeded to the City and County of Denver in two distinct but adjoining parcels. See accompanying sketch map for specific point locations. Letters and numbers in parentheses have been added for clarity.

Parcel 1: Being in the southeast quarter of the N.E. 1/4 of Sec. 32, T. 4 South, Range 70 west of the 6th P.M. and being more particularly described as follows:


Beginning at a point in the center of Bear Creek, (1), from which point the N.E. corner of Section 32 bears N. 31 deg. 41 min. 30 sec. east, a distance of 1985.03 feet; (2) thence south 39 39 deg. 56 min. 30 sec. W., a distance of 65.00 feet to a point (3), on the southwesterly boundary of a proposed road; thence along said southwesterly boundary S. 50 deg. 03 min. 30 sec. east, a distance of 132.12 feet to a point of a curve (4); thence on said curve to the right having a radius of 158.14 feet a distance of 155.44 feet to a point of reverse curve (5); thence on said reverse curve to the left having a radius of 161.43 feet a distance of 107.96 feet to point of tangent (6); thence south 32 deg. 03 min. 30 sec. east along said tangent, a distance of 39.54 feet to point of curve (7); thence on said curve to the left having a radius of 418.69 feet, a distance of 101.94 feet to point of tangent; thence south 46 deg. 00 min. 30 sec. east along said tangent a distance of 278 feet to a point located in the center of Bear Creek (8); thence in a northerly and westerly direction along the center of Bear Creek, a distance of 826 feet more or less to place of beginning, being in all 1.83 acres, more or less, together with all water rights thereunto belonging.


Parcel 2: Being in the E 1/2 of the NE 1/4 of Section 32, Township 4 South, Range 70 west of the 6th P.M. and being more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at a point in the center of Bear Creek, (A), from which point the NE corner of Section 32, bears north 23 deg. 13 min. E., a distance of 2076.94 feet; thence north 48 deg. 565 min. E. a distance of 365.69 feet to a point (B): thence north 48 deg. 36 min. E. a distance of 226.73 feet to a point (C): thence south 77 deg. 04 min., East, a distance of 105.41 feet to a point (D), thence south 80 deg. 53 min. east, a distance of 93.17 feet to a point (E): thence south 80 deg. 53 min. east, a distance of 45.97 feet to a point (F), from which point the NE corner of section 32 bears N. 4 deg. 51 min. east a distance of 1547.6 feet: thence south 25 deg. 55 min. west, a distance of 247.11 feet to a point (G): thence south 01 deg. 54 min. west, a distance of 126.02 feet to a point (I): thence south 44 deg/29 min. west, a distance of 116.67 feet to a point (J): thence south 41 deg. 58 min. west, a distance of 146.98 feet to a point (K), (from which point the E 1/4 corner of section 32 bears south 40 deg. 13 min. east, a distance of 835.02 feet:) thence south 13 deg. 28 min. east, a distance of 229.95 feet to a point (L), which point is located on the center line of the Bear Creek Road: thence south 13 deg. 28 min. east, a distance of 83.0 feet to a point (M) located in the center of Bear Creek: thence in a northerly and westerly direction along the center of Bear Creek, a distance of 952 feet, more or less to place of beginning, in all 9.30 acres, more or less, saving and excepting therefrom State Primary Road No. 27, as now laid out on the ground. ### **Boundary Justification**

The boundaries encompass all the lands owned by the City and County of Denver called Starbuck Park.
