

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DESCRIPTION

Sited on a five acre parcel, with mature landscaping, the Sumers Lodge is a large two-story Rustic style, Page & Hill Company log kit house built for wealthy New York financier George Sumers and his family. Begun in 1935, and completed in 1937, the residence reflects the vision of the "Log Cabin Architect," Chilson Aldrich. Designed by Aldrich, in conjunction with his association with Page & Hill Company, manufacturer of log homes, Sumers Lodge conforms to the ideals set forth in Aldrich's 1928 book, *The Real Log Cabin*.

The well-maintained Sumers Lodge is in good condition, and the exterior retains a high degree of integrity in terms of location, design, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association. Since the 1970s, the setting has been compromised somewhat due to development occurring in the area. When first built, Sumers Lodge was surrounded by the approximately 1,200 acres then owned by George Sumers. The National Register listed Cardiff Coke Ovens (5GF461) and land later donated by Sumers for the Glenwood Airport fell within the 1,200 acres.

The Sumers owned the property until 1963 when it was sold to the Holy Ghost Fathers for use as a training center. The surrounding acreage was subsequently sold, subdivided and developed between 1978 and 1987. The parcel of land on which Sumers Lodge is located was purchased in 1987. In late 1995, it was sold to the current owners. Prior to the 1995 sale, most of the interior appointments, and all of the furniture, custom designed for the Sumers by acclaimed "Cowboy High Style" designer Thomas Molesworth were sold at auction.

The rear-facing L plan includes a finished basement and approximately 7,000 to 8,000 square feet of living area. The 12 inch thick walls of the finished basement are of irregularly coursed ashlar. The low pitched roof, with deep, open eaves is cross-gabled. The main ridge log, running east and west, is part of a system of common purlins supported by an interior "W" truss system. This truss system is visible in the lodge's open, two-story great room.

The walls and roof structure are of Douglas fir logs imported from British Columbia. The saddle notched wall logs were hand-hewn on the top and bottom resulting in heavy tongue-and-groove, while the extending, chisel point crowns were machine coped. The walls are oiled; the remaining woodwork is stained, primarily a tobacco brown, and oiled. At an unknown date the door and window frames were painted white. The logs were left exposed throughout the interior. The resulting log construction has been described as follows:

Where settlers chinked clay into the cracks between the logs, the logs of the ready-cut cabins are smoothed to the width of three inches on abutting sides and a groove and spline arrangement provided for further weather-tightness. The same groove arrangement

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applies for window frames so that they may be slipped into place with nailing. (Christie's Catalog, 1995:19)

On the south facade, the roof extends to cover the enclosed first and second story porches. The roof's original wood shakes have been replaced with aluminum shingles. A coursed stone chimney pierces the roof on the rear. A double chimney, also of coursed stone, pierces the ridge and vents a basement fireplace, a fireplace in the great room that extends the full height of the two-story space, and a beehive fireplace in the dining room. The ashlar used in the basement walls, the chimneys, and the fireplaces is reported to have been scavenged from the Cardiff Coke Oven site located approximately one mile southwest of the lodge.

The architect's drawings indicate that the large porch on the south facade was to be screened on both floors. But, a photograph dating from the late 1930s, indicates that the existing fenestration was in place by that time. In the same photograph, decorative woodwork shown below the second floor porch windows does not appear in the drawings, and it was covered over at an unknown date. A small, gabled roof enclosed entry, with windows similar to those of the porch, was added at an unknown date. The two entrance stoops on the rear are protected by shed roofs.

On the east and the west, there are balconies with decorative balustrades. Two original, multi-light Molesworth doors, with ironwork hardware, access each balcony. In other cases, the original plank doors were sold at auction, and they have been replaced with duplicates. Typically, the windows are wood framed, eight light casements, set in pairs or groups of four.


Two non-contributing structures are located near the entrance to the property. One is a caretaker's apartment that, according to anecdotal evidence, may pre-date the lodge and been moved onto the site. It has been significantly modified. The other, a three car garage was constructed in 1965. During the 1970s, tennis courts and a swimming pool were constructed on the grounds, and the location of the driveway leading to the rear of the lodge was modified. For the most part, landscaping remains intact.

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SITE PLAN



FIRST FLOOR PLAN



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SIGNIFICANCE

Sumers Lodge is significant under Criterion C as a well-preserved example of a log kit house designed in the Rustic style by Chilson Aldrich, author of numerous articles published in *House and Garden* and a book, *The Real Log Cabin*, which was in print from 1928 through the 1950s. Aldrich's book included not only his perceptions regarding the aesthetic appeal of log structures, but practical instructions for designing and building them.

In the case of the Sumers Lodge, by no means a commonplace kit home, its size and the quality of materials and workmanship exhibited are indicative of the lifestyle enjoyed by those able to afford elaborate vacation retreats in popular western resort areas such as Glenwood Springs. The Rustic style is clearly expressed through the log construction, stone foundation and chimneys, wide roof overhangs and small paned windows.

Aldrich, known as "the Log Cabin Architect," was retained by Page & Hill Company, a Minneapolis manufacturer of log kit houses. Page & Hill, with offices in New York's lower Manhattan, was a prominent supplier of utility poles when they diversified into log home construction in the early 1930s. Sumers Lodge is the only known western Colorado example of the log kit homes produced by Page & Hill. As was common with their products, the lodge was assembled at the Page & Hill facility in Minneapolis, dismantled, and moved numbered log by numbered log to the Sumers property. Since its completion in 1937, Sumers Lodge has been well maintained and the alterations to its exterior have not compromised its integrity.
