Originally the house was at the corner of Main Street and Hebron Avenue. It was loved back when the post office was built there in 1936, but is still on land that was belies property. The main house consists of a two story colonial facade with five windows over four, and a one and a half story ell. Both are intact. The front porch and the ell veranda have Doric columns. House faces east with south end fronting on the street. The small ell added here houses fover and stairway to adapt for two family occupancy. The slave house ell was repoved at that time and made into a small house on the same lot. The map of Main Street about 1920 shows an outline of the original house including a T-shaped ell (called the slave house) at the rear with all buildings drawn to scale.\*

The lot line starts 160.00! east of the manuambent ble enter of Main and Hebron, runs east 251.40!, north 125.93!, west 250.06! and south 126.60! to starting point. The two houses and a barn are on the lot. Assessor's lot number N2.

Architecturally the Gideon Welles House was recognized as a gem of Colonial style in 1936 when HABS conducted a survey. Filed in the Library of Congress, Washington, D.C., Ref. 2F - 2R<sup>3</sup> Conn. 4HABS Conn Class B, Feb. 25, 1937, are two outcide photos and three views inside showing winding stairs and panelling, one page of data and 13 drawings including detail.

Before Glastonbury was a town, a committee was formed in Wethersfield called "Committee for the Three Mile Farms" headed by William Swayme. They obtained from Great Sachem Souheag of the Pequod tribe a strip of land three miles wide along the river, including meadows rated a fifth best in the world, extending from the present north boundary of Glastonbury down into what is now South Glastonbury. In the year 1649 Swayme sold a 72 rod section of this land extending from the north border to where there is now a monument at the corner of Hebron Avenue and Main Street. This hand was held by the Welles family right through into the lifetime of Gideon. Thams Welles of Wethersfield, who in 1655 became the Governor of the Colony (the fourth), was the purchaser. Gideon was a seventh peace than descendant of Thomas.



Boon after taking office under Lincoln, Welles rapidly built up the navel strength and organized it into a powerful fighting force. Refusing to bow to pressure from the press, centractors and politicians, he went his own vay. Against presistent derision and ridicule he ordered weeden ships ironclad and gave a contract to the Swedish immigrant John Ericson to build the revolutionary "Monitor" which this sudvel gun turned and real addition out-a reservered and routed the dreaded Confederate ironclad "Herrinac".

In 1823, and again thirty years later, Gideon gave the Independence Day address on the beautiful Glastenbury Green. Gideon loved to write and left to pecterity his diary and about a dozen journals which provide intimate glimpses into the doings of his administration. He even wrote a four verse poem, the last line of each verse ending with "old Glasstenbury", as "Nor can there one compare with Three, Old Glasstenbury". The name of the town has been spelled "Glassenbury", "Glasstenbury", and is now "Glastonbury".

The Gideon Welles house with its 22 rooms and "Slave House" ell was in its heyday the grandest house in Glastonbury. Its site was known as "Welles Corners". Its carriage house, said to have been destroyed by fire, housed the first carriage owned by a Glastonbury resident, Gideon's father. However, the primary significance of the house hies in its association with Gideon Welles, a patriot whose organizing childry and foresight provided the Union with a crucial neval victory.
