Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Wadena Fire and City Hall is a two-story, rectangular-shaped, red brick building located in the central business district, one-half block east of Jefferson Avenue, which is the primary north-south thoroughfare in the city. Completed in early January 1913, the building originally functioned as the municipal fire department and city offices for Wadena.

The first floor of the City Hall is symmetrically arranged and formal in its interpretation of the Renaissance Revival style. In the center is a large semicircular fixed glass opening featuring a corbeled brick arch and raised concrete keystone with the date "1912" inscribed. Original fire doors, as well as all of the building's windows, were replaced in ca.1965. Flanking the center arch are two small windows, one of which has been partially infilled with brick. Window sills are concrete and lintels are part of a concrete string course which extends across the middle of the first floor. Renaissance Revival-inspired detailing can be seen at each corner of the lower floor, where an aluminum and glass door with concrete surround is surmounted by a concrete hood that has decorative brackets. Above each hood is a small, semicircular fixed window with a corbeled brick arch and raised concrete keystone. A narrow concrete string course divides the ground floor from the second story.

Two pairs of 1/1 double hung sash windows set in a large recessed panel light the center area of the upper floor. A dentillated false cornice spans the width of the panel. Another 1/1 double hung window is located to the east side. A wow of header bricks makes up the window lintels. The frieze is marked by a raised panel of bricks set in a herringbone pattern, and the crenelated parapet is capped with a narrow band of concrete. Rising above the southwest corner of the flat roof is an open bell tower that has a flared pyramidal roof supported by four brick columns. Festoons embellish each frieze of the bell tower.

The east wall of the building is covered with stucco that was applied in ca.1965. The second floor east elevation has seven tall window openings, most of which have been covered with panels. The west wall is pierced by five double hung sash on the upper story. The stuccoed rear wall has three former double hung windows that have been enclosed.

The interior underwent a remodeling in ca.1965, resulting in fluorescent light fixtures and new decorations. The original staircase remains intact.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Wadena Fire and City Hall is historically significant under the statewide historic context "Railroad Construction and Agricultural Development, 1870s-1920s" for its representation of early twentieth century civic development as a multi-purpose building, and as a classic example of a public building type common to numerous small communities in Minnesota. During the early 1900s Wadena experienced rapid growth in its built environment — the Fire and City Hall is one example of the construction boom. More importantly, other typical public buildings such as the library, sheriff's office, and jail are housed in the recently-constructed county courthouse. The Fire and City Hall is the only municipal building in Wadena from the post-1900 building era.

Wadena's original fire department was organized in 1883, operating for three years with a man-drawn cart and hand pump. Two years later, in response to an increasing number of fires, the city built a combination town hall and fire station, and by 1886 had purchased a hand engine for \$150, a hose truck for \$45, four hundred feet of hose for \$400, and a fire alarm for \$60. Despite the addition of this equipment, the worst fire in the city's history struck in 1888 resulting in the destruction of eighteen buildings. Toward the turn of the century, fewer fires occurred as masonry began to replace timber frame in building construction. But by 1911 city offices and the fire department had outgrown their facilities, prompting one fireman to plead for the construction of a new building in a letter to the local newspaper. City officials seriously began discussing the possibility of a new facility in late 1911, and the following summer the city purchased a lot measuring 32' wide and 60' deep on which they would erect a new fire and city hall. Lot size was crucial because the fire department required a minimum 50' depth for the proper maintenance of its hoses.

Erection of the new Fire and City Hall in 1912 represented just one facet of a major construction period in Wadena which covered about five years from 1910-15. Numerous public, commercial, and residential buildings were built during this span, indicating at the same time a degree of optimism and permanence within the community. A $2\frac{1}{2}$ -story brick high school designed by a Minneapolis architectural

firm was built in 1909; two years later the owner of a downtown hotel announced plans to double its size; and the Peterson-Biddick Co., today an important regional seed business, opened as a wholesale produce dealer. In 1912 the Methodist and Congregational Churches built large religious edifices, and a year later the county erected their first permanent fairgrounds buildings. The Northern Pacific Railroad also affirmed plans to construct a new passenger depot in Wadena within a few years.

Minneapolis architect Kirby Snyder designed other Wadena buildings such as the 1914 Cozy Theater. In addition to the theater and Fire and City Hall in Wadena, Snyder drew plans for the Congregational Church as well as a public school in Louisburg. Snyder's design for the Fire and City Hall called for a compact building that today continues to visually convey the essence of the city's functions. All small town city halls were designed with a formalized front and embellished on the principal elevation. Other elements that emphasized the facade included the two-story height, and classical detailing. Despite the new windows and doors, the Wadena Fire and City Hall retains these essential architectural features and its overall integrity, thereby reducing the impact of the stucco on the east wall.
