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The William Andre House is a two story brick house located on the border between Clay and Yankton County. The property is located on a rural road in a highly agricultural area.

The two story house is constructed of brick with a brick foundation. The house consists of a rectangular truncated hipped roof main section with a two-story gable wing on the rear. A historic shed roof, wood clad addition was made to the gable wing. Common elements on the house include brackets under the eaves, decorative arched stone window lintels on the brick portion of the house and one-over-one double hung windows.

The façade (west elevation) historically had a large porch on the first floor. It was removed some time before 1980. The first floor has a central entry with an arched stone lintel. On either side of the entry are two one-over-one double hung windows. All windows on this elevation have arched stone lintels and stone sills. The second floor has three sets of one-over-one double hung windows. There are eight decorative brackets under the eave.

The truncated hipped roof portion of the north elevation has two pairs of two one-over-one double hung windows on both the first and second floor. Each pair of windows has an arched stone lintel and stone sill. There are six brackets under the eave. The gable roof portion of the north elevation has a window opening that historically had two one-over-one double hung windows. Currently the window is reduced in size and has a casement window. At the northeast corner is an entry door. The openings on the first floor have an arched stone lintel and a stone sill. The second floor has a gable dormer. The dormer has wood clapboard siding. It has a one-over-one double hung window.

The gable roof portion of the east elevation has two one-over-one double hung windows on the second floor. This opening has an arched stone lintel and a stone sill. The truncated hipped roof portion of the east elevation has two one-over-one double hung windows on the first floor. Each window on this elevation has an arched stone lintel and a stone sill. The second floor has three one-over-one double hung windows. There are four brackets under the eave.

The gable roof portion of the south elevation has a shed roof addition. It has an entry door in the center of the elevation and two one-over-one double hung windows to the east of the entry. There is also a one-over-one double hung window on the east elevation of this addition. The historic addition

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is clad with wood clapboards. The truncated hipped roof portion of the south elevation has two pairs of two one-over-one double hung windows on both the first and second floor. Each pair of windows has an arched stone lintel and stone sill. There are six brackets under the eave.

Chimneys are located on either side of the truncated portion of the roof. There is also a chimney through the gable portion of the house.

Interior:

The interior is divided into fourteen rooms. The first floor has a grand central oak staircase to the second floor. The first floor also has extensive wood trim throughout the front four rooms. The second floor has decorative stenciling in the front two bedrooms. The back of the house, in the gable portion, was used as the servants quarters.

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Statement of Significance

The William Andre House is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C as it is an excellent example of the Italianate style of architecture in South Dakota. It exhibits many distinctive characteristics of the Italianate style. The William Andre House continues to provide a sense of architectural appeals that made it noteworthy in 1896.

William Andre came to America in 1867 from Germany. He lived in Nebraska until 1874 when he purchased the property in the Gayville vicinity. In 1896, William constructed a large brick home for his second wife. The home consisted of eight bedrooms, kitchen, dining room, library, sitting room, parlor and five large basement rooms.

Common elements of the Italianate style include: two to three stories, low pitched roof, decorative brackets beneath the eaves, tall narrow windows and elaborate window crowns. The William Andre House exhibits all of these characteristics. The Andre House also falls into a subtype for the Italianate style termed simple hipped roof. This subtype is a square box shaped house with a hipped roof. The façade openings are typically three to five bays. This subtype makes up one-third of all Italianate houses. The Italianate style dominated American house construction from 1850 to 1880 in eastern states and later in the mid-west. It was a popular style in the expanding towns of the mid-west.

The William Andre House is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C for its significant architectural style of Italianate. This style was found throughout the United States from 1850 through the turn of the century in the mid-west. This house is an excellent example for South Dakota.
