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#### Narrative Description:

201 West 19th Street in Sioux Falls, South Dakota is a two story multiple family dwelling located on a corner lot one block west of the All Saints Historic District. With a simple rectangular floorplan the house is a good example of the Mediterranean Revival style. Constructed as apartments in 1925 the building retains its original function with three apartment spaces, one occupying each floor and one in the basement. Stucco wall covering, a rounded arch doorway, red clay tile roof, and wrought iron railing leading to the main entrance typify the style. Associated with the house is a detached two car garage built at the same time as the house. The garage is also stucco with red clay tile flat roof. The corner lot is spargely landscaped with two large deciduous trees near the street and small shrubbery abutting the building.

Entering the house through an arched doorway on the north facade is an open vestibule leading to all three apartments. The door rests in a small bay with its own trunkated pyramidal red-clay tile roof. Red brick steps lead to the entrance from the sidewalk at an angle. An ornamental wrought iron bannister follows the steps from the sidewalk to the door. Fenestration throughout the property is grouped and is generally a multi-divided light over a single pane wood frame. The exterior of the property is very simple with few ornamental features.

The interior was renovated in 1994. All the apartments were updated with new bathroom plumbing and updated kitchen fixtures. Narrow oak floors throughout the building were restored and windows tightened. An enclosed porch was added to the side of the building at this time.

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The porch is an excellent addition reflecting the Mediterranean Revival style with stucco cladding, square openings with chamfered top corners for screens, and roof shape and material. The trunkated pyramid capping the porch is covered with red rounded asphalt shingles that reflect the clay tile on the remainder of the house. No historic material was replaced during this renovation aside from dated plumbing and some fixtures. Aside from the porch addition on the west facade the house looks as it did when originally constructed.

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#### Narrative Statement of Significance:

201 W. 19th Street in Sioux Falls, South Dakota is an excellent local example of the Mediterranean Revival style. Built in 1925 the building illustrates the specific characteristics of the style through stucco walls, tiled roof, arched doorway, and wrought iron detailing. an excellent example of the manifestation of local revivals and one of only a few buildings representing this style remaining in the city. The property illustrates the implementation of period architectural details and a rare choice of style in this northern climate. Contextually it relates to the Depression and Rebuilding (1893-1929) context of the South Dakota State Plan and the subcontext Changing Urban Patterns, Residential Changes and the Development of Suburbs, New Building Materials, and Pattern Book Architecture. The house meets National Register criterion C in the area of architecture as one of the best residential examples of the Mediterranean Revival style in the city of Sioux Falls.

Mediterranean Revival style can trace its roots to two separate building styles first coming to national attention during the 1893 Columbian Exposition. These are the Mission Revival and Italian Renaissance Revival. The Mission Revival style is exemplified by the California Pavilion and the Italian Renaissance Revival as exemplified by the principle buildings of the "White City". Both of these styles experienced great popularity following the fair and generated a renewed interest in the architecture of the Mediterranean region, particularly of Spain and Italy. After the turn of the century the interest in Mediterranean style continued and reached its peak of popularity during the 1920's.

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During the second decade of the century these styles combined to form the less academic style referred to as the Mediterranean Revival style. This style was manifested in the vernacular landscape through the use of more common building elements. These elements include the application of exterior stucco, red clay tile roofing, ornamental wrought iron and rounded arches. 201 W. 19th Street illustrates all the features that typify the style. It retains a high degree of historic integrity and is an excellent local example of the style.

Sioux Falls is the largest city in the state of South Dakota and illustrates a wide variety of late 19th century and early 20th century architectural trends. Styles in the Victorian Period, Colonial Revival and Bungalow/Craftsman tend to dominate the landscape. Mediterranean Revival style is well represented in this property and is locally significant as an example of this construction type.
