Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Norridgewock Free Public Library is a distinctive building of the Greek Revival style. It is of brick construction, with wooden and granite tirm, with one story, metal-sheathed gabled roofs, two internal brick chimneys, and granite foundation.

The facade faces north, in the gable-end, and it is three bays wide below a projecting pediment supported by Doric columns at the corners. The central doorway is covered by a projecting enclosed entry. Fenestration is 2/2.

The east side of the building features a rectangular projecting bay window with tall, narrow 1/1 fenestration.

A later added one-story wing extends from the west side of the library, with two bays facing north, each of 2/2 type.

The corner columns have been temporarily removed while repairs are being undertaken. An older photograph (enclosed) shows the columns in place.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Norridgewock Free Public Library, a Greek Revival temple style building in miniature, is one of a number of 19th-century structures, originally built as law offices, which are stylistically exemplary. It is also notable as having been the office of a number of distinguished legal and political figures. The library organization which it now houses can be traced to a very early social library founded in 1810.

John S. Abbott erected this building in 1841 upon his arrival in Norridgewock and quickly became the most successful lawyer in the community. He also prospered in both farming and lumbering operations. After his departure to join a prominent Boston firm, the office was used by a succession of lawyers and later owned by Stephen Decatur Lindsey who served in the United States Congress from 1877 to 1883. He married a sister of Rebecca Sophia Clark, better known as the author "Sophie May" (Sophie May House - N.R. 10/8/76), who eventually inherited the property. In 1903 she donated the building for use as a public library.
