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### DESCRIPTION

Located at the corner of 3<sup>rd</sup> St. and Box Elder Ave., the two-story Paonia Christian Fellowship is an imposing in Romanesque Revival style church. The building is in the heart of the residential area, along with several other churches. The town has a long-standing religious identity marked by the high density of churches in the small town. Each of these religious buildings has a distinct architectural style, adding to the character of the town setting. Also on the property are a simple parsonage and a non-contributing garage, but the massive stone church building dominates the property and defines the character of the site. The town of Paonia, settled in 1880 and incorporated in 1902, is located at the eastern edge of Delta County. Built along the North Fork River, the town is encircled by orchards, which have defined the areas agricultural history. Most of the current 1,500 residents, however, are employed by one of the nearby operating coal mines.

#### Church Building (contributing building, 1906)

##### Exterior

The building is two stories tall and has a full basement. The exterior walls are of regularly coursed, rusticated sandstone with the largest block measuring approximately 2' x 1'. The foundation is also sandstone, but has been covered in stucco for many years. The multi-planed roof has asphalt shingles and consists of a central hipped roof with a globe finial atop the highest peak, and projecting gables on the north, west, and south with a short gabled wing on the east.

A distinctive feature is the round, three-story, crenellated tower on the northwest corner of the building. The tower features a graduated buttress at the northwest edge of the building, with a single, double-hung stained-glass window on either side at the mid-story level, and a double-hung stained-glass window at the eastern-most and southern-most edges of the tower at both the second and first-story level. The third story is differentiated by a thin, rounded belt course at both the base and the top with arched, four double-hung stained-glass windows that are equally spaced around the tower, each featuring a segmented stone arch surround. A 1962 photograph shows these windows as containing glass block, but those windows were subsequently returned to stained glass. The crenellation on the top of the tower was originally stone but replaced with dark cinderblock.

The west façade (front) features the main entrance to the building with contemporary double doors covered by a porch, and steps leading down on the north and a contemporary accessibility ramp to the south. The entryway is surmounted by a three-light arched stained-glass transom. In the bay formed by the projecting gable to the south is flanked on either side with a wall, flanked on either end by graduated pilasters, that projects out from the entrance bay and the gable end projects further out from that wall. The roof is pierced by a brick chimney to the north of the gable. Within the gable end are a row of three windows at the base to provide light to the basement, three double-hung stained-glass windows on the main floor level, and a large stained-glass clerestory window above. The clerestory consists of a band of three double-hung stained-glass sashes surmounted by three fixed stained-glass windows, which replicate the arched transom over the entrance. All windows in the building are wood framed with stone sills and lintels for the square window openings and stone sills and segmented arches for the arched windows.

The north façade is similar to the west façade in that at one time there was an additional entrance to the building from 3<sup>rd</sup> St. That has since been enclosed with glass blocks (possibly dating to 1962) and

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there are currently no steps leading up to this former entrance. Otherwise the window and bay arrangement is identical to the west façade.

The east façade (rear) is a simple sandstone block wall with decorative wood shingles in the gable, which on the interior houses the bema and projecting apse. The pattern of the shingles within the gable is two rows of square shingles, topped by seven rows of fish-scale shingles, topped by three rows of square shingles, topped by twelve rows of diamond shingles, then one row of square shingles, then eleven rows of fish-scale shingles, and finally two rows of square shingles at the gable's peak.

The south façade has a covered entrance to the basement. The southwest facing wall has a set of three single-pane square windows, which are on the balcony level. Also, on the southeast side of the building is another entry door to the main level.

#### *Alterations*

Other than previously stated changes, the only major alteration to the building was the addition of the accessibility ramp in 1980, completed by stone mason Albert Kloos. While made of the same sandstone as the building, it is differentiated in style by having randomly coursed ashlar whereas the building is regularly coursed quarry ashlar. This addition not only provided access for the handicapped and eliminated the narrow, steep entry steps.

#### Interior

The interior of the building has a high arched ceiling featuring exposed wood beams. The walls and ceiling are plaster. The main floor of the sanctuary is carpeted and slopes to the front of the sanctuary. On the second floor, a large balcony wraps around the north and west sides of the nave. Most of the interior finishes are original, including the decorative light fixtures, the pews, and the lectern.

The tower interior, which serves as the narthex, has a central circular stairway leading to the balcony area. On either side of the stairway are stairs leading to the basement. At the balcony level another small set of stairs leads to the "Crows Nest" or Tower Room.

The basement houses two offices, classrooms, two bathrooms, a nursery, kitchen and fellowship hall, which has periodically undergone redecorating. The basement is accessed by the stairs coming from the narthex, a narrow stair leading from the bema, and an exterior entrance.

#### **Parsonage (non-contributing building, 1904)**

The frame building was constructed in 1904 and can be seen in pictures of the early construction of the church where it is denoted as the parsonage. Originally privately owned, the congregation purchased the property in March 1962 to continue serving as a parsonage. The house is a one-and-a-half story, gabled building in a T-shaped plan with a front-gable projection next to a shed-roof porch on the primary façade (west side). It retains the original wood, clapboard siding and original windows. At the rear (east side) of the building is another shed roof covering the rear entrance. The interior contains a kitchen/dining room space, living room, three bedrooms, one and a half bathrooms, and a partial basement. The congregation remodeled the house in 2007 to update the wiring and plumbing, replace the kitchen cabinets and appliances. While the house originally only had one full bathroom, as part of the 2007 remodeling, they added a half bathroom. The metal standing-seam roof was also replaced in 2007.

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**Garage (non-contributing building, moved 1988)**

The congregation moved a small, front-gabled garage onto the property in 1988. It sits in the back of and to the east of the parsonage and church. While it retains its original wood siding and door, as the garage was moved to the property outside of the period of significance, it is considered non-contributing.

**Integrity**

The property, particularly from the street-side view shed, has remained largely unchanged over the course of the past century, maintaining its integrity of setting, location, feeling, and association. The majority of materials of the church remain intact. The design of the church, both interior and exterior, retains a high level of integrity. The church's integrity of workmanship not only remains high, but serves as a character defining feature of this vernacular interpretation of Romanesque Revival architecture.

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**SIGNIFICANCE**

The Paonia First Christian Church is eligible to the National Register under Criterion C in the area of Architecture from 1906 to 1908 at the local level of significance. The architecture of the building is an excellent example of Romanesque style church as interpreted by local craftsmen. As a property owned by a religious institution for religious purposes that is being nominated primarily for its architectural style, this property meets the burden of Criterion Consideration A. While the historic name was "Paonia First Christian Church," a 2002 split of the congregation resulted in one group retaining the historic building with a new name and one group retaining the historic name with a new building.

**Architectural Significance**

In 1906 the land on 3<sup>rd</sup> Street was deeded to the church and pastor J.K. Hester dreamed of a beautiful house of worship. As far as is known, Mr. Hester was the principal designer of the building with a Mr. McMillian designing the roof. Construction of the building was begun in 1906 and completed in 1908. The stone walls today are a testament to the skill of local stonecutters: Al Hurst, Sege Stratton, and Bert Edwards. The cornerstone was laid on July 28, 1907, in an impressive ceremony drawing one of the largest crowds ever assembled in Paonia. The iron box in the cornerstone contains a copy of the New Testament, a one dollar bill, contemporary copies of the local newspapers, the church paper, and a list of the membership.

The stones used in forming the foundation and walls were quarried from the back (east) of what is called Mount Jumbo, northeast of Paonia. The brush bridges across the gulches required to reach the quarry site were built by R.J. Decker and his son Orange. These men also quarried, hauled, and laid the foundation stones. Skids were made of long cedar logs anchored together to form a ramp up which the stones were rolled into the wagon beds. The stones were from large sections that had broken off the ledges naturally and rolled to lower ground. The stones were carefully chosen and worked into usable size. Stones for the inside walls were quarried north of Paonia to the east of the old Converse Mine. Albert Campbell and W.T. Bross hauled much of this. By September 18, 1906, there was ample stone on the grounds.

French and Russell placed an ornament on the top of the church. The finial is a large globe resting in a crescent of nickel plated copper, gilded with gold leaf, and was constructed by local craftsman, E.E. Bryan. J.K. Hester had requested this style of finial as representing "Christ in the world."

In the June 18, 1910, edition of *The Booster*, editor Clinton Oliver wrote the following:

Who among the residents of Paonia is not proud of the building erected by the congregation of the Christian Church of this city? Does not every stranger have it pointed out to him as a mark of the greatness of Paonia's progress? This is undoubtedly the case, and yet practically none of those who are so proud of the structure know or realize for an instant the wonderfully hard work and sacrifice that has made the church a possibility. There is certainly a mountain of sacrifice and Christian devotion bound up in the walls of this beautiful church structure.

The Romanesque Revival style, whose character defining features include rough cut stone and rounded arch entranceways, was a popular architectural trend in the late nineteenth century. While this style reached its peak popularity on the East Coast in the 1880s, the style persisted in Colorado

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into the turn of the twentieth century. Due to the expense of construction, this grand style was primarily used in religious, civic, or commercial architecture. Favored for American religious architecture during this period, this style of architecture harkens back to the medieval churches and monasteries of Europe as derived through École des Beaux-Arts-inspired architectural education.<sup>1</sup>

The interior of the church is an auditorium plan with a small narthex in the tower with most of the building devoted to a large nave that served as the sanctuary space. In the late nineteenth and early twentieth century, Protestant denominations experienced a shift in religious educational philosophy resulting in a strong emphasis on Sunday school programs. Auditorium plans were popularized by a style known as the Akron Plan, which was available in pattern books. There is no evidence that the craftsmen who designed and built this church used one of those pattern books, but by the time they were constructing this building, auditorium plans were the preferred style of Protestant church construction.

Just as the exterior showcases the skills of local stonemasons, the simple nave highlights the skills of master carpenters in the decorative detailing at the ends of curving, crisscrossing beams on the ceiling, which emphasize the clerestory windows. Local craftsmen also crafted the lectern, which is original to the building.

**Developmental History**

The congregation of the First Christian Church was formed in 1898. In June 1918, three Paonia churches — Friends, Congregational, and Christian Church — joined in federation under the Rev. C.G. Stout, forming the Community Church. This union lasted until 1926.

Over the years the church has been used for community activities. Before the high school was built the baccalaureate and commencement exercises were held at the church. Also, many concerts and cantatas were preformed at the church, the last one being Handel's Messiah on December 1, 2001. On September 7, 2008, the congregation held a celebration of the 100-year anniversary of the completion of the building.










