The old Burlington library is a small rectangular building with a hip roof of composition shingles. It has one story over a daylight basement. The building is rough-textured stucco with an ornamental spandrel of red bricks between the two floors and under the window sills. A centrally-located, gable-roofed projection on the south facade forms the main entrance and is flanked by trios of windows. Fenestration on the other facades is also regularly spaced.

a. History

Burlington's first library was established in 1911 by the Alpha Club, an organization founded for that purpose earlier that year. The club operated the library until 1916 and continued to support it thereafter. Local philanthropists made donations to form an endowment for the purchase of books. In order to qualify for a Carnegie grant, the city pledged to support a library and obtained a lot on one corner of the school grounds. The new building was dedicated in 1916 and served the community for over 60 years. Objections to the old building were that there was only one entrance, there were too many stairs and there was too little space. A new facility opened in 1979 across the street from the old building. It is still owned by the city, but is now used as a private school.

b. Evaluation of Significance

The Burlington Carnegie library has played an important role in the intellectual life of the town for most of the twentieth century.
