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### SUMMARY

The Fruitland Park Community Center, also commonly known as the Casino, is located at 604 West Berckman Street, Fruitland Park, Lake County, Florida. The Community Center is a Frame Vernacular building built in 1914 by George T. Clark to house community functions. The building is nominated to the National Register for local significance under Criterion A for Social History and Government. The rectangular building is faced with horizontal siding and has double-hung wood sash windows and a south facing verandah. The hipped roof with broad eaves is covered in 3-V crimp metal, and the entire building rests on a concrete block pier foundation. The interior has a large assembly center room clad in tongue-and-groove wood walls with a chair-rail and vertical wainscoting. The west end of the assembly hall has an open stage, flanked by two doors and hallways to the south and north that access a kitchen, storage, and a dressing room. The east end of the assembly room has bathrooms that were added in 1984.

### SETTING

The Community Center is located on the southwest quarter of a block at the corner of Berckman Street (east/west) and Rose Avenue (north/south). This lot has a lawn to the south, and the block is occupied by small houses to the north. Laura Street runs east/west behind the Center, and serves as an alleyway in the middle of the block. A residence sits to the east of the Center property, and is what remains of the reconfigured 1907 Gardenia Hotel. The city has streets laid out in an orthogonal configuration with buildings set back from the roads, with plentiful lawns and mature trees. Two blocks to the east is State Highway 441/27, the main north/south thoroughfare through the city. Fountain Lake is located immediately to the west surrounded with open park property.

### PHYSICAL DESCRIPTION Exterior

The Community Center typifies frame vernacular construction. It is a rectangular wood frame building with a large hip roof covered with sheet metal set on a concrete block pier

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foundation. The exterior is surfaced with horizontal wood siding with 1/1 double hung wood sash windows in paired arrangements on the façade.

The <u>south main façade</u> fronts onto Berckman Street with a broad lawn between the building and street, and is accessed via a driveway on the east side of the lot. Here, with the western bay filled in for storage, the broad hip roof extends to shelter a verandah with seven bays (Photo #1). Eight square wooden posts support the roof, and hand-rails with lattice-work span the posts. Five central steps access the porch and central double wooden doors topped by a transom (Photo #2). Three windows are to the east of the entrance, and one to the west, each with a pair of sashes. The hip metal roof has two shed dormers on its south slope, each with three two-light slide windows. Visible to the east, and setback from the south wall, is a shed roofed extension surfaced with horizontal siding. There is a single door at the juncture with the main body of the building. The broad shed roof extends to shelter a sidewalk and wheelchair ramp.

The <u>west elevation</u> fronts onto Rose Avenue which runs north/south. The building wall extends a foot beyond the enclosure at the southwest corner (Photo #3). The storage enclosure at the south corner has screen across the top for ventilation. The elevation has six windows in total with two small single wooden sash windows centrally placed, and two larger single windows flanking the center two.

The <u>north elevation</u> is the broad-side of the rectangular building, and has an exterior small brick chimney that pierces the roof eave near the west corner (Photo #4). Closer to the west corner is a single window with a pair of wood sashes. The remainder of the exterior wall to the east has five paired 1/1 windows, evenly spaced. The extension of the east addition, sheltered by a shed roof, rests on a continuous concrete block foundation.

The <u>east elevation</u> is sheltered by the shed roofed extension, with two awning windows piercing the top portion of the wall (Photo #5). The shed roof extension is supported by five steel Lollie columns and the south four columns support the steel handrail for a wheelchair ramp. The side view of the south verandah is visible.

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### Interior

The main double doors lead to the large <u>assembly room</u> (Photo #6), with windows lining the south and north walls. The wood floors are surfaced with linoleum, and the walls with tongue-and-groove board wainscoting and a chair-rail. The walls are further accented by ornamental molding between and around doors and windows. The ceiling is drop acoustictile over a wood ceiling, installed to conceal heating-and-air ducts. To the west side of the main room is an open <u>stage</u> with steps at the right side (Photo #7). The stage is flanked by doors. The door and hall beside the stage to the south leads to a <u>kitchen</u> that spans the west side of the building (Photo #8). The north side of that space is partitioned for a <u>storage</u> <u>room</u> (Photo #9). Historically the storage room functioned as theatrical changing rooms. The door and hall beside the stage to the north is a <u>woman's dressing room</u> for theatrical uses. At the east side of the main room is a centrally located open entry (Photo #10) into the eastern extension that contains bathrooms (Photo #11).

### ALTERATIONS

The Community Center mostly encompasses a large assembly room big enough to hold several hundred people, although current building code restricts that number to one-hundred persons. The kitchen storage room was at one time used for the theatrical productions. In 1946, rest rooms on the west end of the porch were added (which today are storage areas for the Boy Scouts). Air-conditioning was added around 1975, and ducts were hidden behind drop ceilings. Prior to climate control, the dormer windows in the roof functioned to vent out rising air. In 1980, the east elevation extension was added to house men's and women's rest rooms and a handicap access. A water tower that once stood on the grounds was removed during the historic period.

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### SUMMARY

The Fruitland Park Community Center, also known colloquially as the Casino, is nominated to the National Register for local significance under Criterion A in the areas of Social History and Government. The period of significance is 1914 to 1965. Since the construction of the Community Center in 1914, the public facility has served numerous and frequent events for the residents of Fruitland Park and surrounding communities. Immediate early uses included regular meetings of the Chamber of Commerce and the local government, as well as recreational events. In November of 1924, public discussions were held in the Community Center with regard to incorporation of the town, and in December of 1925, the public voted to incorporate with a town council. With its large central room and a stage at the west end, the Community Center has been the hub of civic and public activity for the small city of Fruitland Park and the surrounding region for over one-hundred years.

### HISTORIC CONTEXT

The Fruitland Park area had a few early and short lived settlements. Prior to the Civil War, P.S. Bouknight homesteaded forty acres of land by Mirror Lake located about one thousand feet south of the present location of the Community Center. His log home was torn down after he abandoned the area. M. Calvin Lee of Leesburg, the largest settlement in the region, set out a twelve acre grove. Lee and several other pre-Civil War settlers would abandon the area by the time Orlando P. Rooks arrived in 1876.

In 1875, a Captain William H. Kendrick from Tampa, who was promoting Florida, encouraged a man from Missouri, Orlando P. Rooks, to visit and settle in Florida. Rooks traveled to Jacksonville, took the St. Johns River as far as Silver Springs, where he hired a horse-drawn coach to get to the settlement of Leesburg in January of 1876. Leesburg was the largest settlement in the area at the time, roughly three and one-half miles from what would become Fruitland Park. Leesburg become the County seat in 1881, surrounded by small agricultural and retirement communities. He made a homestead claim to 160 acres

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adjacent to Crystal Lake.<sup>1</sup> Having cultivated land and constructed a home by 1877, Rooks sent for his wife Josephine who arrived in December of 1878. Rooks was interested in horticulture and started an orange grove. He was known for cultivating a wide variety of citrus as well as olives and pineapples.<sup>2</sup>

An Englishman named Granville Chetwynd Stapylton came to Leesburg in 1882, looking to develop a colony for other Englishmen. Stapleton met Rooks, and together they discussed how to develop the land. Rooks offered land and right-of-way so that the Florida Southern Railroad Company, from Ocala to Leesburg, would lay tracks adjacent to his settlement. Work started in Ocala in June 1883, and extended to Leesburg by December 1883. On January 20<sup>th</sup>, 1884, the first train arrived in Fruitland Park.

Rooks named the town Fruitland Park after a friend's business, Fruitland Nursery, in Augusta, Georgia.<sup>3</sup> George H. Long, a civil engineer for the railroad, surveyed and platted the town. The plat was filed on November 1, 1883. Berckman Street, a main east/west road through Fruitland Park, along which the Community Center and City Hall were built, was named for Prosper Jules Berckman who owned the Fruitland Nursery.<sup>4</sup> In 1884, a Mrs. Kingsley began teaching school in her family's new store, thus establishing the first store and school in town. A separate school building was erected in 1885. A Methodist congregation was organized at the end of 1884, and their frame church was built in 1886. Holy Trinity Episcopal Church was formed in 1886, and the church was built in 1888.

In addition to encouraging English settlers to Fruitland Park, Stapylton had a company, Stapylton & Company, who bought land around Zephyr Lake and Lake Ella, just north of Fruitland Park, and started a town called Chetwynd in 1886. A boarding house was built

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in which English visitors could stay and consider settling. In the settlement next to Spring Lake, another store was started in 1885. The company instructed visitors on cultivating citrus and promoted the idea that it was a predictable source of income. The company would plant groves for new buyers. A community social hall, known as Zephyr Hall, housed all gatherings such as theater shows, musicals, dances, and what were termed "casino nights." Members of the private social club called the "Bucket and Dipper Club" met at Zephyr Hall. The English settlers in particular were fond of outdoor sports including horse racing, hunting and fishing. Stapylton would also establish a bank in Leesburg.

The deep freezes of the winters of 1894-95 decimated the citrus industry all across Florida, and killed most citrus trees except in South Florida. This resulted in an economic hardship for many of Fruitland Park's early settlers. Many moved away to other parts of the state or back to England.

The Fruitland Park community would develop incrementally after this point, and sustained the necessary elements of a functioning small town.<sup>5</sup> The non-denominational Shiloh Cemetery was organized in 1896, and deeded to the town the next year when S.F. Smith donated land from what was known as his "Old Plantation Farm." By the time the deed was completed, two people had been interred. Until that time people were either buried in Leesburg or in the Trinity Episcopal Church yard.<sup>6</sup> John D. Robertson in 1906, bought pine forest land and set up a turpentine still. Robertson continued to purchase pine land, and in 1913 sold some to the newly organized Lake County Land Owner's Association. The Association promoted Fruitland Park and paved the roads with clay. The Association kept an office in the large 1907 Gardenia Hotel, on the block where the Community Center now stands. By 1915 a two room school was built followed by a Baptist church in 1916, and a Catholic church in 1921.<sup>7</sup> The Association's George T. Clark and brother J.Y. had electricity run from Leesburg to town. In 1922, the new Fruitland Park Water Company acquired small private suppliers and provided the town with water. Fruitland Park was incorporated on December 14, 1925, and formally established a government. T.B. Stinson

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became mayor. In 1926 the town hired Geo. H. Ruhling and Company of Orlando to resurvey and expand the town. As a leader in the Lake County Land Owners Association, George T. Clark thought Fruitland Park needed a Community Center, or "Casino," to serve as a civic and recreational center.

### HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE

George T. Clark was a Fruitland Park resident, promoter, and a builder who envisioned a community building suitable for all types of public gatherings. In 1914, he built what the locals have called the "Casino." This reflects a 19<sup>th</sup> century use of the word to denote a public facility devoted to recreational activities, not necessarily gambling. This building was constructed on property that was a part of the Gardenia Hotel, which Clark owned. Within a couple of years, W.G. Dwight and his wife would buy the Community Center from Clark (exact date unknown). The Dwights had moved to Fruitland Park in 1906 from Massachusetts, and became philanthropists for the town. Two of their favorite causes were the Holy Trinity Episcopal Church and the Leesburg High School. They made the Center available to everyone and helped with the ongoing maintenance. Mr. Dwight died in 1930, and in 1948 his widow donated the Community Center to Fruitland Park.<sup>8</sup>

From its construction to the present, the Community Center has served many types of community events, for not only Fruitland Park, but for the surrounding small towns. The Community Center served an essential function in this rural area, much like the services provided at the National Register-listed Spring Lake Community Center near Brooksville (NR 2009). Built as a New Deal project in 1938, and located at a rural cross road several miles from Hernando County's largest city of Brooksville, the Spring Lake Community Center served every social and civic function for the area. Over time, the civic identity is associated with such a facility. Most rural Florida towns did not have auditoriums or public spaces in which to accommodate a broad range of public activities, and to this day the Fruitland Park Community Center is largest assembly area for the city and surrounding communities. Fruitland Park's Community Center is unusual in that throughout its historic period, the local government also operated out of the facility.

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An extensive list of historic activities hosted in the Community Center was derived largely from *The Tampa Tribune* micro-film records available through the Leesburg library. Rather than list events chronologically, uses are grouped by <u>governmental</u> functions, <u>civic</u> engagements, and <u>social</u> functions.

### **Governmental Functions**

From the time the building was constructed in 1914, the Fruitland Park Improvement Association held their monthly meetings at the Community Center, which included the reports from its various committees. The Association functioned as a quasi-form of local government until the town officially incorporated. The Fruitland Park Chamber of Commerce who promoted business concerns, began holding their monthly meetings at the Community Center in 1915. At their monthly meeting on November 27, 1924, the Fruitland Park Chamber of Commerce had the incorporation of the town as their main topic. T. G. Futch, a local attorney, spoke on the pros and cons of incorporation. Then the meeting was opened to the public for discussion. After a year of discussion, on December 15, 1925, a town wide meeting was held to vote on incorporating the town. The vote of more than 200 citizens was unanimous to incorporate, and the name of the Fruitland Park Improvement Association was changed to the Fruitland Park Town Council. Elected to the town's first government was T. B. Stinson as mayor with H. W. Palmer as Clerk. Joseph Lee was elected as marshal, and the following were elected as councilmen: W. H. Bickley, H. L. Cowles, E. T. Gould, D. F. Hammond, A. W. Smith, G. R. Smith and Charles Ury. At a follow-up meeting on December 29, 1925, members agreed that the Council would meet at the Community Center every Thursday evening at 7:30 o'clock until further notice. After Fruitland Park incorporated in 1925, the Center became a voting precinct, which it remains to this day.

On March 12, 1929, the Town Council, grateful to the Dwight family for allowing use of the Center at no charge, voted to reimburse their annual tax on the property. The Town Council continued to meet at the Community Center until 1967, when they relocated activities to a remodeled Gulf Service Station.

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The Community Center was the site of the city court where the mayor presided. An example of how the city court operated is illustrated by the case of several young boys who broke windows of houses adjacent to the railroad section. They were arrested by the town constable and brought before the mayor. They were fined \$5.00 each and sent home to be punished by their parents.<sup>9</sup>

At the Fruitland Park Town Council meeting on May 3, 1948, plans were made to host a gathering for the Lake County League of Municipal Cites on June 23rd. All towns in the  $5^{\text{th}}$  congressional district were represented at the meeting accompanied by a fish fry dinner.

### Civic Engagements

Many Fruitland Park civic groups meet monthly at the Community Center. All of them held fund raising events as well as hosting public social occasions. The following organizations met monthly at the center (starting dates and names are given): in 1921, St. Paul's Catholic Church's Pioneer Club; in 1922, Community Club; in 1923, The Holy Trinity Guild, Fruitland Park Serving Club, Fruitland Park Mother's Club (later becoming the Parent Teacher Association), Fruitland Park Musical Club, and the Fruitland Park Christian Endeavor; in 1924, The Woman's Civic League; in 1940, Boy Scouts; in 1948, the fire department and a woman's auxiliary; in 1954, the Fruitland Lions Club.

Musical events were popular and often used as fund raisers. In 1924, the musical cantata "Ruth" was sponsored by the Holy Trinity Guild, and concerts were presented by the Musical Club, the Woman's Civic League, and the Chamber of Commerce.

The Mother's Club reformed as the Parent Teacher Association (PTA) at their September 16, 1931 meeting. The next year the Fruitland Park PTA hosted the Lake County Council of PTA who met at the Center with 60 people attending. Also in 1932, the PTA put on a Christmas program with decorations and entertainment provided by the children. They sponsored a Founder's Day "colonial silver tea" on February 17, 1933 that featured exhibits of antiques and quilts.

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The fire department and woman's auxiliary hosted many chicken and spaghetti suppers at the Community Center to support the department. They initiated the very popular bingo night which was held every Friday night, and kept it suitable for all ages.

### Social Functions

From the <u>Leesburg Commercial</u> newspaper, on March 9, 1917, the headlines read: "Masquerade Ball - Big Event of the Week at the Park - Wonderful Collection - Who's Who." The Masquerade Ball, the first affair of this type to be held at the Community Center, was also the first to be held in the Park for many years. The entire town of Fruitland Park, as well as from the surrounding areas, were invited to attend in costume.

Only one month after the masquerade ball the United States entered World War I in Europe. During the war, local women and many children met at the Community Center to knit sweaters, socks and mufflers for the servicemen. During that time the Center became a place where copies of the local newspaper were kept for public reading and reference.

The Community Center was used for commencements from the local grammar and elementary schools, May Day festivals with the May King and Queen, and popular Christmas Eve dances. The Christmas Eve dance of 1929 drew seventy-five couples from the surrounding communities.<sup>10</sup>

The Committee for Street Lighting Fund for the Fruitland Park Improvement Association held a musical fund raiser in November 1924, with Florence Gilbert Manscom appearing in costume to do readings, pianologues, and songs with Mrs. Lawrence Smith as her accompanist.

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During the early formation of the Fruitland Park Baptist Church, church services were held at the Community Center in 1957, until their new church was built on the south side of Berckman Street.

With many civic groups meeting on a continual basis at the Community Center and hosting public events, to this day the Center actively serves the town. George T. Clark died on March 11, 1918, but his vision of the Fruitland Park Community Center, also known as the "Casino," filled an enduring need that continues to the present.








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Floor Plan & Photo Diagram



Please accept this letter as the City of Fruitland Park's official petition objecting to any consideration that may be given to the above referenced building in relationship to any placement on or designation of said as it pertains to the National Historic Register.

Pertinent to the objection is the fact that the City of Fruitland Park is the owner of the structure and the land on which the building is located. This is and has been the case since the 1920's which, as far as can be discerned, is when the City assumed ownership of the building.

The objections to such consideration are as follows:

- Initial consideration to this action was contingent on the ability of the applicant to move the building to a new site. Cost estimates from licensed contactors who specialize in the moving of these types of structure show this to be financially impractically and, as such, fiscally not in the best interest of the taxpayers of this community.
- A cost estimate from a licensed contractor for executing the work necessary to bring the condition of the building up to a) code & b) a state of repair that would render said to become a viable and useable structure for City is cost prohibitive when compared to the actual value of the building
- The practicality of allowing this building to remain on site is not, nor has it been a viable option or consideration for many years. It has been and is the City's intent to build a Town Square, to include a new library, a new modern public safety center, as well as facilities to allow for public events on this site. Design has already started; construction will begin in the next six (6) months to a year.
- The building itself has been altered on more than one occasion with no regard given to historically accuracy. Said alterations include extensive interior and exterior work.






I represent the Fruitland Park Historical Society, Inc., a Florida Corporation (the "Historical Society") with regard to a parcel of real property (the "Property") owned by the Town of Fruitland Park, n/k/a the City of Fruitland Park, the Property known as "The Casino", pursuant to deeds recorded at Deed Book 296 page 452-457 (hereinafter "Deed 296") and Deed Book 84, page 28-30 (hereinafter "Deed 84"), both in the Public Records of Lake County, Florida, copies attached.

The Property building is registered as an historical site with the State of Florida and an application is pending with the The Keeper of the National Register in Washington, D.C.

Deed 296 contains a reverter provision that provides upon the "breach of any of which conditions the property hereby given, granted or conveyed shall revert to the grantors and their heirs", "said property hereby given, granted or conveyed shall be used as a community house and public park for the perennial and temporary residents of Fruitland Park ...". Further conditions and restriction on the property are further described in Deed 84 providing that the George T. Clark Club House that was built by George T. Clark is "for use as a community or clubhouse for the purpose of affording citizens of Fruitland Park and that neighborhood greater opportunity for amusement, entertainment and social intercourse, at a small cost ...".

I understand the City of Fruitland Park City Commission has resolved to demolish the building on the Property at its June 25, 2015 meeting.

My clients object to the resolution based upon the following:

- a) The 100 year old building has historical significance; and
- b) The Property, including the building is subject to reverter conditions contained in Deed 296 and Deed 84 and the demolition of the building would violate the conditions.

DANIEL HICKS, ESQUIRE BRENT D. HICKS, ESQUIRE A reversion occurs when a property owner makes a transfer of property to another but retains some future right to the property. In this case, the grantor of Deed 296 clearly retained a right to The Casino property if the conditions of the transfer were breached. The law on reversion in Florida is quite clear. Florida Statute 689.18(5) provides that a reverter provision of unlimited duration in the conveyance of real estate is allowed when the transfer is made to a governmental corporation or association.

Please review and advise accordingly.


