The Lieutenant Governor's Mansion is constructed of brick and stone, with wood trim. Georgian in style, it is composed of a first floor, second floor, with a less-adequate third floor, and basement. Stone steps lead directly from the sidewalk at street's edge. There was once a broad veranda across the front, which was oramented with wrought-iron grill work. The main hall is wide and long, with rooms on each side and a stairway leads up the left wall of the hall. The first door to the left of the hall opens into a long and wide salon-shaped room. It was and is used as the main reception room. On the right is a room, which was usually occupied as the Governor's private library and sitting room, from which the dining room was entered through a folding door. Bedrooms are on the second floor.

Fireplace walls of the reception and dining-room are paneled in the Georgian fashion.

The Lieutentant Governor's Mansion, official residence of 33 Kentucky Governors between 1798-1914, has been restored to the dignity and elegance of the 1800's.

Construction began in 1797 on this Georgian building. Governor James Garrard was the first to occupy it; Governor James B. McCreary was the last, when he moved to the new Governor's Mansion in 1914.

The house remained vacant nearly the entire time from 1914 to 1946, when the Kentucky Historical Society undertook management of it. After extensive restoration, the house was designated the official residence of the Commonwealth's Lieutenant Governor.

Two workmen on the construction of the house, Robert P. Letcher (bricklayer) and Thomas Metcalf (stone mason), later occupied the house as Governors of the Commonwealth.
