Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Roma Bakery is a two story, hipped roof, wood commercial structure with two one-story extensions located south of the facade and west of the original rear elevation. Architecturally, the building derives its style from the Colonial Revival design. Characteristic elements of the style may be seen in the centrally placed facade dormer with hipped roof, and in the wood modillions located under the second level eaves. A horizontal band of dentils may be seen between the first and second levels as well as under the dormer eave.

The most unusual design element of the structure is the second level turret which dominates the northeast corner of the building. Typically a trait of the Queen Anne style, popular in the 1890's, this turret has a shingled, rounded roof, and was topped by a flag pole in earlier years. At one time the focal point for the building's entrance, the turret was immediately above a diagonal opening and was supported by three decorative wood columns. This entrance today has been closed off with horizontal wood siding, as well as the partial closing off of two large plate glass windows which once flanked the opening. The uppermost portions of these side windows are still visible. The original three columns may still be seen in this closed off entrance; restoration to the original appears very feasible.

Fenestration consists of double-hung windows, each flanked by decorative **pilasters.** One set of paired windows is located on the second level facade as well as on the north elevation, while three single double-hung windows may be found around the turret (each containing rounded glass). One window may be found immediately below the facade dormer at the second level.

The existing main entrance to the structure is a recessed glass plated door topped with a transom located behind a decorative arched entrance. This opening is flanked by two flat columns and topped with wood detail simulating a keystone. The entrance is located immediately adjacent to the one story facade extension. This extension is also of horizontal siding and was part of the original 1911 building design. Two double-hung simple sash windows flank a centrally placed double door. Alterations to the extension include the addition of a new entrance and plate glass window to the right of the older entrance. Dates of these modifications are unknown.

To the south of the one story facade extension is a two story addition of more recent vintage. Likewise, the one story extension at the rear elevation of the building was built in 1976. These two additions to the original building are now a part of the structural formation of the complex and should be considered a part of the entire design. Both additions maintain the same horizontal wood siding and paint color; they do not detract from the overall architectural integrity of the original building.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Roma Bakery is **important for** its architectural style exhibiting an unusual combination of Colonial Revival and Queen Anne elements, and because it is one of the last family run bakery operations still in existance in the San Jose area.

The bakery was built in 1911 by Vittorio Pera, an accomplished builder who learned his trade in Italy. Pera, who did not come to the United States until sometime after 1900, is also noted as the builder of several elaborate two and three story homes in San Francisco. Vittorio built the bakery for his cousin Rizieri Pera, who actually began the bakery-grocery business in 1907. The business originally began as a combination bakery-grocery and maintained this usage until the late 1940's. The bakery portion of the business was leased outside the family for two years during the late 1920's, and, oddly enough, it was at this time that the name "Roma Bakery" was aquired. Rizieri shut down the business during the second World War but reopened with the help of two sons soon after the war ended. Today the bakery is managed by the grandson of Rizieri.

The building, while still in operation as a bakery, is undergoing rehabilitation. Because the architectural integrity of the building has not been severly altered over the years and is currently being rehabilitated, and because the bakery is one of the last family run operations in the City, Roma Bakery deserves to be listed on the National Register of Historic Places. In addition, Roma Bakery represents one of a very few remaining wood commercial structures in the downtown. The design of the building exemplifies a type once typical of turn-of-the-century downtowns, but now a rarity in San Jose.
