Situated on a corner lot in a shaded residential district, the Governor William J. Bulow house in Beresford is a two-story frame foursquare resting on a stone foundation. The house has a wraparound front and side porch supported by Doric columns, a small back porch, and a hip roof with overhanging eaves and a brick chimney. Dormers with diamond pane windows project from the attic floor on the north (front), east (side) and west (side) facades. All the rectangular windows have retained their original frame surrounds. The wood front door is also intact. A frame garage (contributing) is located to the rear of the house.

On the interior, the first floor has a front vestibule, living room, dining room, utility room with half bath, kitchen/family room and rear vestibule. Some first floor moldings are intact. The second floor has four bedrooms, a full bath and a sun room/sitting room over the west side porch. There are transoms over the interior doors leading to the bedrooms. A stairway leads to the attic which stores Bulow's Congressional Records.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The William J. Bulow house in Beresford is significant for its associations with William J. Bulow (1869-1960), U.S. Senator and 12th Governor of South Dakota. Bulow resided in this house throughout his political career in the state which spanned from 1898 until 1942.

A native of Clermont County, Ohio, Bulow received his law degree from the University of Michigan in 1893. He moved to Beresford, South Dakota, the following year where he commenced practicing law. After his marriage to Katherine Reedy in 1898, he purchased a large frame dwelling at 207 W. Hemlock which had been built in 1893. (1) Bulow served as Union County Judge before being elected in 1898 to the State Senate on the democratic ticket. Defeated for a second term as State Senator, Bulow's political activities for the next 20 years were limited to county and municipal government. He was City Attorney of Beresford from 1902 to 1912, and Mayor of Beresford from 1912 to 1913, during which time he again served as Union County Judge on a temporary appointment. Bulow became City Attorney again from 1913 until elected governor in 1926. After serving two, two-year terms as governor, Bulow won the election to the United State Senate in 1930 and was re-elected in 1936. He was defeated in the 1942 primary by former Governor Tom Berry. (2)

Alan L. Clem writes about Bulow in South Dakota Political Almanac:

"Bulow's career is remarkable for at least two things. First of all, he has been described as an old-line, Jeffersonian Democrat, and as such was distinctly and vocally out of step with the national Democratic leadership of the 1930's. Secondly, the margins of victory in his successful campaigns were invariably close, as might be expected in any Democratic victory in (the predominately Republican) South Dakota." (3)

Bulow and his family resided in the house at 207 W. Hemlock until Sept. of 1944. The property was then sold to Anton and Bertha Sorenson who lived there until July of 1969. Hans and Ardella Johnson acquired the property in 1970 and lived there until the present owners, Doug and Carol Nygaard purchased it in Aug. of 1984. Today, Bulow's Congressional Records are still stored in the attic of the house.
