Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Pennellville Historic District occupies a sparsely settled area at the head of Middle Bay in the town of Brunswick. The rectangular district extends along Pennellville Road in a rural setting consisting of scattered residences set among a mixture of open fields and woods. The southern boundary of the district terminates with the road, which ends at the water's edge.

In the district are seven residential buildings and a former carpenter's shop. In addition, several structures have carriage barns. All of the buildings date from the late eighteenth to mid-nineteenth century and are similar to each other in scale and materials.

Buildings contributing to the character of the district are:

- 1. Job Pennell House, Pennellville Road, c. 1860, Greek Revival style, two story residence with vinyl siding, gable roof, one-and-one-half story ell and carriage barn.
- 2. Jacob Pennell House, Pennellville Road, 1794/1806, Federal style residence, one-and-one-half stories high with clapboard siding and gable roof.
- 3. Andrew Dunning House, Pennellville Raod, c. 1853, Greek Revival style residence, one-and-one-half stories high, gable roof, clapboard siding, porch on south side, adjoining carriage barn.
- 4. William Pennell House, Pennellville Road, 1859/1862, Greek Revival style residence, two stories high, clapboard siding, hipped roof, small one story classical portico over east entrance, adjoining two-and-one-half story carriage barn.
- 5. James Pennell House, Pennellville Road, c. 1838, Greek Revival style residence, two stories high with clapboard siding, gable roof and hexagonal cupola. One story porch with classical columns on south side of main structure, attached carriage barn on west end.
- 6. Benjamin D. Pennell House, Pennellville Road, c. 1834, Greek Revival style residence, two stories high with clapboard siding and gable roof. Recessed porch with classical columns on east wing. One story service wing extending from east side with one-and-one-half story barn built in 1876.
- 7. Carpenter Shop, Pennellville Road, mid-nineteenth century, one-and-one-half story structure with gable roof and clapboard siding. Extending across east facade is a veranda with Italianate style brackets.
- 8. Charles Pennell House, Pennellville Road, c. 1844, Greek Revival style residence, two stories high with gable roof, clapboard siding, classical entrance on east facade, one story porch on south side. Large two-and-one-half story barn with clapboard siding, gable roof and Italianate style cupola to rear (west) of the house.

There are no non-contributing buildings in this district.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Pennellville is the common name given to a small concentration of early nineteenth century residential buildings which are historically part of a local shipbuilding operation on Middle Bay. Six of the seven houses were built by members of the Pennell family, whose ships ways were located at the end of the road that bears their name. All of the principal buildings date from the first three quarters of the nineteenth century when the shipbuilding industry was at the height of its activity. The district retains its original rural ambiance in which the houses are scattered on large lots in a semi-natural setting characteristic of the last century.

The historically important period for Pennellville was roughly between 1775-1875. Three families, the Pennells, the Dunnings and the Givens built homes in this area deriving their income principally from shipbuilding and maritime commerce. An estimated seventy vessels were launched from nearby sites on Middle Bay. Indeed, the Pennells were the most important shipbuilding family in Brunswick.

The houses in the Pennellville Historic District are predominantly in the Greek Revival style and are typical of Brunswick area residential design during that period. Especially outstanding is the James Pennell House, which features an hexagonal cupola ornamented with Greek anthemion designs. James Pennell, a ship joiner by trade, is credited with the design of his own house. The remaining structures were probably the work of local carpenters and joiners, such as Thomas Given, who built the William Pennell House. Also important is the existance of the former carpenter's shop, which is situated at the end of Pennellville Road near the site of the ship ways.
