Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Ingram house is situated on a 200 acre farm in Oldham County, Kentucky, 1.7 miles southwest of Shrader Lane near the area known as Buckner. The house, the original kitchen (now joined to the main block by a glass-enclosed passage), and the smokehouse are within a fenced area of approximately $1\frac{1}{2}$ acres. (Photos 1 and 9)

The house is a two-story, single pile brick structure with a symmetrical five-bay facade and interior end chimneys. There is a coursed stone foundation. The front facade has Flemish bond brickwork and queen closers. The rear and sides are laid in common bond. The front door has a transom with rectangular lights. A center door on the second story opens onto the porch roof. Both front and rear doors are six-panel doors. Windows on the first story are 9/6 and those on the second story are 6/6.

The front porch, with chamfered columns and a railing and balustrade, is not original. It was built by the present owners, who reproduced the porch shown in an old photograph. (photo copy 1) The one-story brick kitchen was joined to the main house by construction of a glassed-in passage. The kitchen wing has two rooms and a central chimney. Both the house and wing have a standing-seam metal roof. The outline of a rear ell can be detected on the rear facade. It was removed by the previous owners. (photos 2, 3) A brick smokehouse with diamond-shaped vents and a pyramidal roof is north of the house. (photos 4, 5)

The interior is virtually unaltered. The original mantels, woodwork, and chair rails remain. All doors are six panel doors, and the door into the kitchen wing is an unusual one with six vertical panels. (see photo 8) Window reveals are canted. The first floor rooms have exceptionally fine Federal mantels with reeded pilasters and a center panel. (photo 7) Original chair rails remain in all four rooms, both hall ways, and along the stairway. The staircase has a simple turned newel of cherry wood and the goose-neck rail is also cherry. (photo 6) Mantels in the second floor rooms are small and plain.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Ingram house is architecturally significant as a fine example of an early 19th-century Federal-style farmhouse. It has had few alterations and retains the original floors, woodwork, Federal mantels, and chair rails throughout the house.

The house is thought to have been built by William Ingram. Thomas and William Ingram were first listed in Jefferson County tax records in 1812 as owning 153 acres of land on Harrods Creek. A James Ingram owned land in the same area in 1805. (Oldham County was formed in 1823 from part of Jefferson, Henry, and Shelby counties.)

William Ingram evidently became a fairly prosperous farmer. In 1845 he married Rebecca Hitt, a daughter of Joel Hitt who owned farmland just southwest of the Ingram house site. Ingram died in 1861, leaving a sizable estate, including 29 slaves. His will directed that proceeds from the sale of surplus stock on the farm be used by his wife to build an "ell addition to her dwelling house." This was probably the ell which was removed a number of years ago. Both William and Rebecca Ingram are buried in the family cemetery near Shrader Lane. Rebecca Ingram was much younger than her husband and lived until 1909. The house was sold out of the family some years later.

The house, the kitchen wing, and the smokehouse form an intact complex with significant architectural integrity.
