### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Thomas A. Hendricks Library occupies a prominent site at the top of a bluff, overlooking the Ohio River from the Hanover College campus. The building is basically a rectangle measuring 48 by 75 feet, and is a well articulated example of the Colonial Revival style.

The exterior is of masonry, combining Bedford limestone with mottled brick laid in a Flemish bond. The base of the building is of limestone, as are the steps leading up to the main entrance. This entrance, set in a central projecting bay, dominates the main facade. The central bay is emphasized by stone pilasters at the corners and flanking the entrance. These fluted pilasters feature Ionic capitals, and support an entablature that continues around the entire building. The entrance is set in stone, with ornate consoles supporting a classical pediment. Directly over the entrance is a blind balustrade, set in a brick parapet that is above the entablature. The entablature is plain, except for dentils on the front and on the ends.

Windows on the building offer a variety of treatments. Flat arches of limestone ornament those on the main facade. The end elevations feature Palladian style windows, set in slightly projecting bays. Windows on the rear of the building are segmentally arched, with a blind keystoned arch over the central window.

A low dome is centered on the roof. Formerly covered in red tile, the dome was sheathed in copper following damage by a tornado in 1974. The dome illuminates the circulation desk area of the interior.


The main floor of the interior was originally devoted to a public receiving room in the center, with the main reading room on one side and the stack areas on the other. Offices opposite the main entrance still contain some original features, including shelves, cabinets, and a marble wash bowl in the librarian's office.

The lower floor was used for mechanical and maintenance facilities, but also included a data stock area and a large meeting room that opened onto  $\mathbf{a}$  terrace.

Alterations to the interior are limited primarily to partitions that were installed on the main floor.

### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Thomas A. Hendricks Library is significant as an architectural and historical landmark on the Hanover College Campus.

Hanover College was founded in 1827. This building was constructed in 1903 as the college's first library building, and helped form the "old campus" academic triumvirate of Classic Hall, Science Hall, and Hendricks Library. The Library is the only one of these still standing, and is one of the three oldest buildings on the Hanover College campus today (the others being the Y.M.C.A. and the astronomical observatory). The building has served the college continuously since its construction, as a library until 1952, and in numerous other capacities since.

The Hendricks Library was designed by the Chicage firm of Patton and Miller. Architecturally, it is distinguished by its nonconformity with the rest of the campus, which has been designed in imitation of the Georgian style. Furthermore, it dominates the campus from its location on top of a bluff, which also commands an excellent view of the Ohio River Valley. The Library, despite the varied uses it has served, has managed to retain most of its original features and integrity.

The Library is named for Thomas A. Hendricks, a Honover College graduate who became governor of Indiana in 1872, and Vice President of the United States in 1885. It was financed and given to the college by his widow, Eliza A. Hendricks.

The Hendricks Library is a well-articulated example of the Colonial Revival style. It is, without a doubt, the most prominent and the best example of the style existing in the community of Hanover.

In 1883 the oldest YMCA building, built for that purpose, was located on the Hanover Campus and is on the Historic Register. The first Signa Chi house in the nation was completed on the Hanover Campus in 1990 and was occupied until its distruction by the 1974 tornado. Within a 9 block area are many older homes, one built in 1809 as a log cabin and later a frame house was built around it by Williamson Dunn, Hanoverss(the town) first resident. Hanover's Campus has changed through the years and there are now 24 relative new buildings. Hendricks Hall is the only remaining building other than the MMCA building to remind us of the tranquil past.
