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Most historic resources in the park (c. 1934-1942) are one story in height with gable roof. The majority of the buildings and structures are constructed of rock faced coursed stone and have wood trim. Roofs were originally wood shingle, but all are now asphalt shingle. Some window alterations have occurred, but there have been few other alterations or additions to the buildings. New intrusive buildings have been added to the park. The pattern of trails and roads constructed in the 1930s is still largely intact.

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- 1. Ranger House. Modern. Two stories, Crab Orchard sandstone and wood, asphalt shingle gable roof, rectangular plan, 1/1 windows. (NC)
- 2. Contact Station. c. 1935. One story, rock faced coursed stone, asphalt shingle gable roof, eight by eight casement windows, rectangular plan, peeled log and waney edged siding trim, interior fireplace with arched opening, flagstone floor, some wood deterioration, stone wall adjacent to station and across road. (C)
- 3. <u>Park Office</u>. Modern. One story, glass and wood, asphalt shingle gable roof, picture windows, irregular plan, stone foundation. (NC)
- 4. <u>Large Woodshed</u>. Modern. Vertical board, asphalt shingle gable roof, rectangular plan, exposed rafters. (NC)
- 5. <u>Building</u>. Modern. One story, asbestos shingles, asphalt shingle gable roof, rectangular plan, small windows. (NC)
- 6. <u>Maintenance Building</u>. Modern. One story, board and batten, asphalt shingle gable roof, rectangular plan, exposed rafters. (NC)
- 7. <u>Comfort Station</u>. Modern. One story, vertical board, asphalt shingle shed roof, rectangular plan. (NC)
- 8. <u>Water Tank</u>. c. 1935. Rock faced stone base, wood board tank with asphalt standard roof (new), polygonal plan. Tank severely altered c. 1978 with mansard roof. (NC)
- 9. <u>Picnic Shelter</u>. Modern. One story, open sides with log posts and Y-braces in gable end, asphalt shingle gable roof, rectangular plan, concrete floor. (NC)

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- 10. Naturalist Station. c. 1935. One story, rock faced coursed stone, asphalt shingle gable roof, basically rectangular plan, modern doors and windows, on main section, 4 by 4 casement windows, waney edged siding in gable ends, exposed rafters, battered stone porch piers with log columns, interior chimney. (C)
  - 11. <u>Chalets</u>. Modern. One and one-half stories, board and batten siding, asphalt shingle gable roof, exposed rafters. (NC)
  - 12. <u>Pickett Lake and Dam</u>. c. 1935. Concrete, segmental arch plan dam, irregular shape lake. (C)
  - 13. <u>Trail Shelter</u>. c. 1935. One story, rock faced coursed stone base, open sides, peeled log posts, asphalt shingle gable roof with logs in gable ends, log bracing, stone seat, open sides, rectangular plan, log deterioration. (C)
- 14. <u>Trail Shelter</u>. c. 1935. One story, rock faced coursed stone base, open sides, asphalt shingle gable roof with wood in gable ends, log bracing, stone seat, rectangular plan. (C)
- 15. Cabin No. 2. C. 1935. One story, rock faced coursed stone, asphalt shingle gable roof, casement windows, L-shaped plan, interior fireplace, screened porch with log posts, flagstone porch floor, peeled log rafters, some log deterioration; interior has stone floor and fireplace with arched opening and chestnut mantle shelf, three floor levels, door and window hardware may be original. (C)
- 16. <u>Cabin No. 1</u>. c. 1935-1939. One story, wood shingle siding, asphalt shingle gable roof, modern windows, L-shaped plan, rock faced coursed stone foundation, screened porch, interior fireplace. (C)
- 17. Storage Shed. c. 1935-1939. One story, wood shingle siding, asphalt shingle gable roof, two four-pane windows, rectangular plan, set on stone piers. (C)
- 18. <u>Trailer</u>. Modern. One story, metal siding, flat roof, rectangular plan. (NC)
- 19. Pumping Station. c. 1935. One story, rock faced coursed stone, asphalt shingle gable roof, rectangular plan, peeled log purlins, exposed rafters, large wood double door. (C)
- 20. <u>Cabin No. 9</u>. Modern. One story, Crab Orchard sandstone, asphalt shingle gable roof, picture window, rectangular plan, fireplace, exposed porch rafters. (NC)

- 21. <u>Cabin No. 8</u>. Modern. One story, Crab Orchard sandstone, asphalt shingle gable roof, rectangular plan, fireplace, exposed rafters. (NC)
- 22. <u>Cabin No. 7</u>. Modern. One story, Crab Orchard sandstone, asphalt shingle gable roof, rectangular plan, fireplace, exposed rafters.(NC)
- 23. <u>Cabin No. 6</u>. Modern. One story, Crab Orchard sandstone, asphalt shingle gable roof, rectangular plan, fireplace, exposed rafters. (NC)
- 24. Cabin No. 5. c. 1935-1937. One story, rock faced coursed stone, asphalt shingle gable roof, six by six and twelve by twelve casement windows, L-shaped plan, peeled logs in gable ends, screened porch with peeled log posts, log rafters, low stone wall, flagstone patio and porch; interior has fireplace with arched opening and chestnut mantel and wood floors; some log deterioration. (C)
- 25. Cabin No. 3. c. 1935-1937. One story, rock faced coursed stone, asphalt shingle gable roof, four by four and six by six casement windows, L-shaped plan, peeled logs in gable ends, log rafters, screened porch with peeled log posts, flagstone patio and porch; interior has fireplace with arched opening and chestnut mantel and wood floors. (C)
- 26. <u>Cabin No. 4</u>. c. 1935-1939. One story, wood shingle siding, asphalt shingle gable roof, eight by eight casement windows, L-shaped plan, interior fireplace, screened porch, rock faced coursed stone foundation. (C)
- 27. <u>Boathouse</u>. c. 1935. One story, rock faced coursed stone, asphalt shingle gable roof, rectangular plan, battened wood doors, concrete deck, exposed peeled log purlins, exposed rafters, some log deterioration, stone wall and steps adjacent. (C)
- 28. <u>Swing Bridge</u>. Modern. Steel tubing and wood planks. Although a new bridge, it is the site of earlier swing bridges. (NC)
- 29. <u>Trail Shelter</u>. c. 1935. One story, rock faced coursed stone base, open sides, peeled log posts and railing, exposed rafters, rectangular plan, flagstone floor. (C)
- 30. <u>Picnic Shelter</u>. Modern. One story, asphalt shingle gable roof, open sides, rectangular plan, Y-bracing, exposed rafters. (NC)
- 31. <u>Picnic Shelter</u>. c. 1935-1937. One story, asphalt shingle gable roof, rock faced coursed stone base, open sides; peeled log posts, railing and gable end bracing; rectangular plan, concrete slab floor, some log deterioration. (C)

- 32. <u>Comfort Station</u>. c. 1935. One story, rock faced coursed stone, asphalt shingle gable roof, awning windows, L-shaped plan; peeled log porch posts, rafters and purlins; battered wall drinking fountain nearby. (C)
- 33. Electric Generating Station. c. 1935-1939. One story, waney edged siding, asphalt shingle gable roof, rectangular plan, concrete floor; not used, deteriorating. (C)
- 34. <u>Lodge</u>. c. 1935. One story, rock faced coursed stone, asphalt shingle gable roof, awning windows, L-shaped plan, waney edged siding in gable ends, two interior fireplaces, flagstone patio floor; c. 1984-1985 glass doors altered, now wood; low stone walls and steps surround building. (C)
- 35. Tennis Court. Modern. (NC)
- 36. Bridge. c. 1935. Rock faced coursed stone, segmental arch plan, low stone guard rails. (C)
- 37. <u>Cabin No. 10</u>. Modern. One story, Crab Orchard sandstone, asphalt shingle gable roof, rectangular plan, fireplace, exposed rafters. (NC)
- 38. Swimming Area. c. 1935. Stone and concrete barrier, arched plan beach area. (C)
- 39. Low stone walls and barriers, trails, and roads built by the Civilian Conservation Corps are located throughout the park. (C)

park was part of a cooperative effort between Tennessee and the federal government to develop a recreation system in the state and ease unemployment.

#### Background

In 1910 Stearnes Coal and Lumber Company of Michigan acquired land for logging in Pickett and Fentress Counties of Upper Middle Tennessee. In 1933, when logging operations were no longer feasible, the company deeded the land to the State of Tennessee. All of the land was administered by the Tennessee State Forester in the Department of Agriculture until 1937 when it was transferred to the newly established Division of Forestry, Department of Conservation. Although development of the park area began in 1934, it was not until 1949 that about 1000 acres of developed park was transferred to the Division of State Parks, Department of Conservation.

In 1933, Civilian Conservation Corps Company 1471, S-65 was organized at Fort Oglethorpe, Georgia. First located near Cookeville in Putnam County, Tennessee, the company moved to Pickett on May 21, 1934. Here they built the dam, roads, telephone lines, trails, a lodge, picnic areas, a contact station, fences, and cabins. (The company also built fire towers and ranger stations in the forest area). The construction continued into the late 1930s. No known structures were then built until the early 1950s when additional cabins and the superintendent's residence were built.
