Describe present and historic physical appearance.

Thorpe's Opera House is located in the downtown business district of David City, the county seat of Butler County. Constructed in 1889 by William Thorpe, the pressed brick three-story, Two-Part Commercial Block structure measures 50'x108' and shows a slightly peaked roof with shingles and a flat tar-coated roof. Sandstone scallops and arched designs decorate the facade windows. The structure originally included a elaborate cornice with finial peak, but the peak was destroyed by a tornado. Access to the second-floor theatre is through double doors topped by a sandstone portico between two retail establishments. A ticket window remains on the second floor landing, to the left of the double door entrance to the auditorium.

The auditorium is 40' wide and 56' long from the back to the edge of the apron. The balcony, originally a horseshoe around the auditorium, retains 27' across the rear of the house only. The raked balcony has ten separate levels, each five inches high. Access to the stairs is in the northeast corner of the foyer outside the auditorium. Two-tiered boxes originally existed on both sides of the stage; only those on stage left remain. A reported seating capacity of 950 consisted of nonpermanent seating. The original interior was painted blue with a nongilt gold trim; restoration has mimicked the original colors. Dressing rooms, once located under the stage, were removed when the building was converted to apartments.

The plain wooden proscenium saucer-edged arch extends 22' wide and 18' high. Dimensions of the stage proper are 22'5" from the curtain line to the back wall, a 4'1" rounded apron, and 9' wings on each side of the stage. One trap door exists center stage; four grooves for scenery remain.

Except for modifications made to the street level facade, the structural and historical integrity of the building and theatre has been preserved.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

Thorpe's Opera House is significant for its association with and in reference to the historic context "Aesthetic Systems: Itinerant and Local Performing Arts in Nebraska" and the property type of "Opera House Buildings in Nebraska, 1867 to 1917." Under Criterion A, this opera house is significant in the areas of the performing arts; entertainment/recreation; and social history, on a state level, as a well preserved example of an opera house building in Nebraska. The building retains a high degree of historical integrity, possessing the physical and associative characteristics to make it an eligible member of its property type.

This opera house is significant in the area of performing arts for bringing a variety of entertainment to the community of David City. As a facility for the performing arts, Thorpe's (later David City) Opera House offered productions such as grand and comic opera; popular New York touring productions; gospel singers; classics like *Uncle Tom's Cabin, Quo Vadis*, and *The Shepherd of the Hills*; dialect plays; musical concerts; melodramas; minstrel shows; Shakespeare; Sanford Dodge; the traveling stock companies; musical comedies; hypnotists and magicians; and the actress Elsie de Tourney. This opera house is significant in the area of entertainment/recreation, since it provided a place where the whole community could gather to attend dances, lectures, humorists and moving pictures. (See following table of Representative Entertainments, 1895-1915.)

This opera house is significant in the area of social history, because it gave David City a neutral, nonaffiliated location for WCTU meetings and functions; fraternal lodge meetings; high school commencements; and political meetings. (See following table of Representative Entertainments.) In the days before radio, television, and sound movies, activities at the opera house were anticipated for days or weeks ahead of time. It provided a place for people to get together to have a good time and forget their troubles over crops, weather, taxes, the railroads, and the generally hard life of settling the Great Plains.

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The three-story brick rectangular building has a flat roof with stepped parapet wall. The front (north) facade is adorned with narrow wall and corner pilasters that divide the building into three bays, each bay containing paired window units (on the second and third levels) capped with decorative stone lintels and arches. The third story windows are now boarded up. The street level facade displays cast iron columns and a pressed metal wall cornice. The "double store" is divided by a central entry (leading to the opera house) showing cast iron columns, double doors, transom, and cornice. The storefronts have been remodeled-- the northwest storefront shows new brick infill, plate glass windows and new door, and the northeast storefront shows plate glass windows and new entry, although the transom window and recessed entry configuration remain intact.

The building originally housed a furniture and undertaking business, and a restaurant on the street level. Although used for apartments in the 1920s, the only major change in the interior space was the removal of the dressing rooms. The building no longer contains apartment units and historical integrity has been preserved (see photos 2, 3, 4). The first level retail space is currently used as a civic center and as office space for a gas company. Restoration work on the second level opera house is on-going and the space is used today as a community theater.

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The period of significance derives from the original construction date of the building, 1889. This opera house represented a major step forward in civility for temperance-minded David Citians, since William Brownfield Thorpe, the owner, constructed it in a location removed from the saloon, so that members of the WCTU could attend community functions without entering the same building shared by a drinking establishment, as had been the case in an earlier opera house, Nowotny's Hall. The period of significance continues through 1917, the year considered to signal the end of the opera house era in Nebraska, based on declining numbers of touring companies nationally and rising numbers of movie houses and automobiles. The local opening of the Jewel Movie Theatre in 1908 and the erection of the David City Auditorium in 1911 took most of the business away from the David City Opera House, leaving only sporadic events dwindling in quantity year by year.
