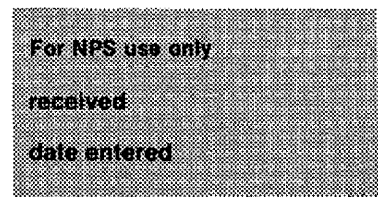

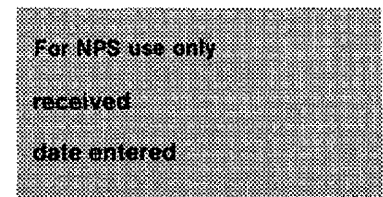

Jewell Town District

The Jewell Town District is located to the South of the South Hampton Town Center and extends to the Massachusetts state line. The District is defined by the northern property line of sites located along north West Whitehall Road and Jewell Street. The Southern District boundary is defined, in part, by the Massachusetts state line.

The Jewell Town District includes low density, residential scale (one to two-and-one-half stores), residential development and historically associated open acreage. District dwellings are constructed in wood with brick chimneys and are largely vernacular interpretations of high style design dating from the eighteenth through the early twentieth centuries. Included in the District are three Georgian, one Federal, three Greek Revival, five late-nineteenth century vernacular and one Colonial Revival style structures. The District also includes four sympathetic, contemporary residential buildings classified as intruding elements due only to their date of construction.

Jewell Town can be visually divided into two components which relate to the area's historical development. This first component is Jewell Town proper, and surrounds the intersection of Jewell Street, West Whitehall Road and the Pow Wow River. The second District component includes outlying, nineteenth century agricultural development located along West Whitehall Road.

Jewell Town proper was first settled in 1687 and derives its historical name from prominent early settler, Thomas Jewell. The area's dominating geographic feature is the Pow Wow River, once a power source for eighteenth and nineteenth century mill development. The river, and the two bridges which span it, remain an important visual element contributing to the area's eighteenth and early nineteenth century residential character. Of the nine dwellings (Sites 99-107) concentrated in the area, five (Sites 99, 101, 102, 104 and 107) are associated with the Jewell family. These structures form a cohesive grouping of Georgian and Federal style dwellings. Also included in the area is a sophisticated, early twentieth century Colonial Revival dwelling, the Merrill House (Site 100). Dwellings are sited on mature, landscaped grounds, many of which extend to the banks of the Pow Wow River.

West of Jewell Town proper, West Whitehall Road straightens to become a tree-lined rural lane flanked by open fields and woodlands. Nine sites documenting nineteenth century agricultural development are found here (Sites 87-98). Also included is the Georgian style Kimball House (Site 96), notable for its architectural integrity and historical association with the Jewell family. Remaining area dwellings are in the Greek Revival and late nineteenth century vernacular styles. The majority of sites include intact, open acreage affording uninterrupted vistas to the north and south. This acreage reflects original, nineteenth century agricultural strip land divisions.

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Jewell Town District

The historical development of the Jewell Town District has been critical to the evolution of South Hampton's architectural and agricultural as well as industrial economies. From the period of initial settlement in the mid-seventeenth century until 1860, South Hampton's water powered industries concentrated on sites adjacent to the Pow Wow River in the Jewell Town District. Eighteenth century industry found here included sawmills, a grist mill, a fulling mill and bog ironworks. Jewell Town proper is significant for preserving an intact grouping of eighteenth and early nineteenth century houses at the junction of roads and river (West Whitehall Road, Jewell Street, Pow Wow River) which is clearly the focal point upon which these early farms centered. The abundant water power which attracted early industry here remains clearly evident, although virtually all traces of the industry have vanished. Thus, Jewell Town proper, as well as the early farms along West Whitehall Road, present an unusually clear demonstration of the typical early New England patterns of nucleated settlements at crossroads and strip farms along major thoroughfares. Early agricultural vistas remain substantially intact. The river itself, which is dammed as it passes under Jewell Street, testifies to the availability of water power for industry at this location.

The nineteenth century brought about industrial diversifications and specialization. Writing c. 1905, F.F. Perry described Jewell Town's industries in his local history, "The Story of Pow Wow River":

"In the section of the river called Jewell town, the river was dammed and furnished power for quite a variety of manufactures. James Jewell carried on a grist and sawmill and carded wool; Jeremiah Eaton ran a planing mill as well as manufacturing pails and matches. Col. Barnard Jewell made axles."

"In 1836 a company was incorporated to manufacture cotton and woolen goods in all their various branches. The purpose was to continue the manufacture of these goods on the river at Jewell town."¹³

The decline of Jewell Town's industrial sector is related to the power source which fostered its rise. In 1860, Salisbury Mills, located in the adjoining state of Massachusetts, purchased the water rights to the PowWow River as it passed through Jewell Town. The Salisbury monopoly subsequently outruled further development of water powered industry in the district.

Significance Continued (Jewell Town)

Little visible evidence survives to indicate the eighteenth and nineteenth century industrial importance of the area. Substantial Georgian and Federal dwellings, concentrated on sites along the banks of the river and commanding vistas of this focal geographic feature attest to the district's early prosperity. The district retains a late eighteenth and early nineteenth century residential character derived from an interplay between architecture, original road patterns and landscape. Period architectural aesthetics are documented by the district's concentration of Georgian and Federal period dwellings which manifest a uniform "Georgian mindset" through tripartite, bilateral symmetry emphasizing symmetrical massing, balance, proportion and molding.

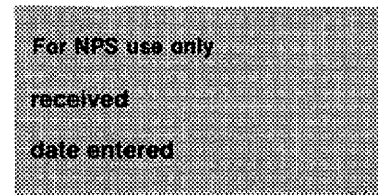
Representative of these early dwellings is the Joseph Jewell House (Site 102), c. 1740, a 2½ story, five bay, double pile dwelling constructed in wood and terminating in a gable roof punctuated by a brick straight stack center chimney.

The Colonial Revival style Merrial House (Site 100, c. 1915) provides an interesting juxtaposition to the predominantly Georgian period district core. This sophisticated example of the style, with its freer and more plastic interpretation forms, provides a striking contrast within the context or its prototypes.

The district shifts in architectural character and building density as it progresses southwest along West Whitehall Road. The landscape becomes decidedly rural and agricultural in character. Surviving domestic structures are vernacular adaptations of Greek Revival and late Victorian period styles, sited amid intact agricultural sites. Representative of these is the Miller House (Site 93, c. 1840) a 2½ story, 4x2 bay, frame dwelling sheathed in clapboard and terminating in a gable roof. Simple structural details including gable returns, corner pilasters and plain window surrounds define the building's Greek Revival style.

NAME: The Jewell Town District

VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION: Beginning at the center line of W. Whitehall Road at the Amesbury, Massachusetts, border the district boundary runs northwest along the westernmost property line of Site 87 (2-1) and continues to trace the northern boundary of Site 87 to the northeastern corner of the property line. Turning southeast the boundary continues to the intersection of the property lines of Site 87 (2-1) and parcel (2-3). Turning east, the boundary traces the northwestern property line of Site 89 (2-3). Proceeding to the easternmost corner of Site 89, the boundary turns south, then east to the point of intersection of 2-4, 2-5, 2-6, then follows north the westernmost boundary of 2-6 to the northernmost corner of 2-6. The boundary traces the northernmost property line of 2-6 to the intersection with the western boundary of 2-28, where it turns abruptly southeast to the boundary of Site 96 (2-8). Turning east, the boundary proceeds along the northern property lines of 2-8, 2-10, and 2-11 to the easternmost corner of Parcel 2-11. Proceeding south along the eastern property line of Parcel 2-11 to a point of intersection with the northern property line of 2-14, the boundary turns east and proceeds to the east side of Jewell Street. Tracing the east side of Jewell Street and crossing the bridge to the south bank of the Pow Wow River, the boundary follows the south river bank to the Massachusetts border. Tracing the state border to encompass the southeastern property lines of Site 104 (2-76) and Site 101 (2-79), crossing Jewell Street, Parcel 2-80, the Pow Wow River to the westernmost boundary of Site 99 (2-81) the boundary turns north and follows the property line of Site 99 (2-81) to the intersection of the mid-point of W. Whitehall Road and follows said road centerline to the point of beginning at the Massachusetts border.

BOUNDARY JUSTIFICATION: In following the above boundaries, the district encompassed includes architecturally and historically significant sites and structures as well as contributing open land and environs, while excluding intrusions located along the south side of W. Whitehall Road. The boundaries encompass significant open acreage, historically associated with the built resources and include a portion of the Pow Wow River, influential to the industrial and aesthetic development of the area as well as a logical geographic boundary line. Recent unsympathetic development across the state line makes the integrity of the Jewell Town Area all the more striking.

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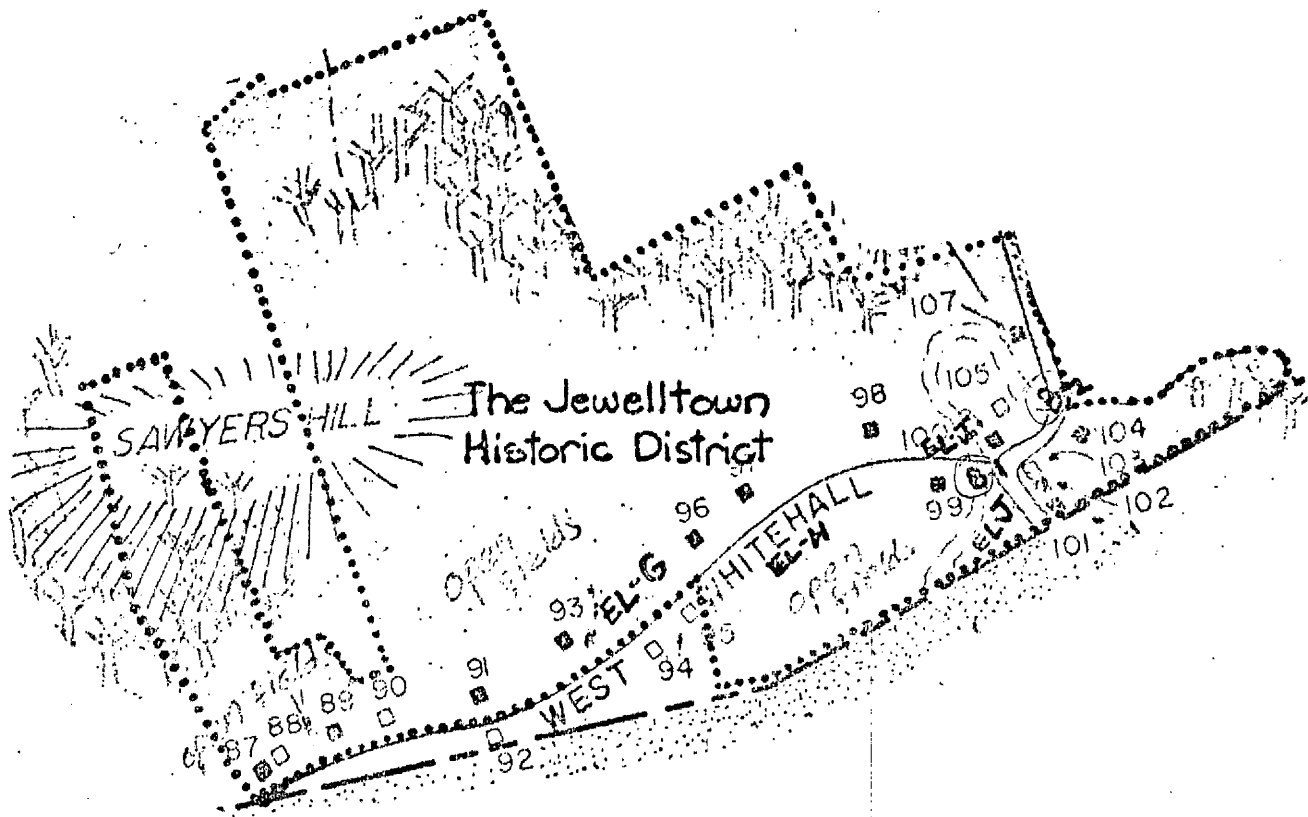

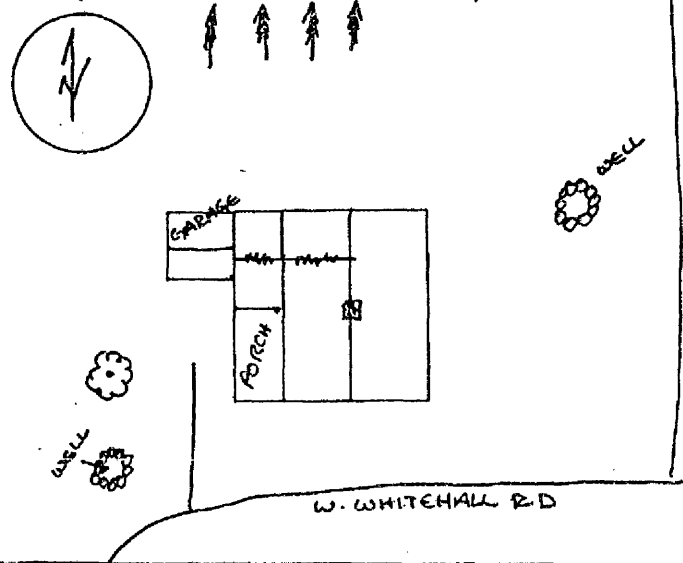

ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

The gable end of this late nineteenth century Vernacular house is oriented towards the street with a wing projecting off the rear west corner. Simple pilasters support a plain boxed cornice with a slight return. The four paneled sidehall door is under a drop bracketed door hood; window trim is simple; and squared columns support the roof of a porch along the west side. A garage has been attached to the west end of the wing.

ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

An intact example of the Cape style, its main features include: symmetrical fenestration; a massive central chimney; four lights built into the main entry four-paneled door, which is flanked by simple pilasters supporting a three-part entablature. Sympathetic additions include: the addition of front and rear shed dormers to the gable roof; and a screened porch to the west supported by square columns.

Although the addition of shed dormers has altered the lines of the original gable roof, the characteristics of the cape style are still evident. Set back from the road and resting on a small hill overlooking open fields and the rural areas of Amesbury the Brown home is one of the two remaining Greek Revival capes in South Hampton.


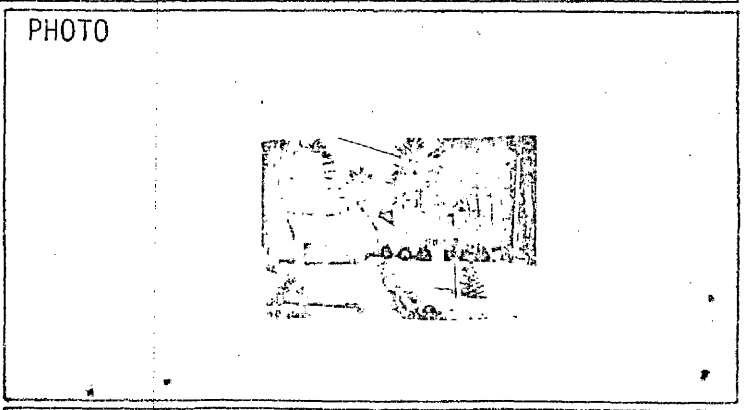

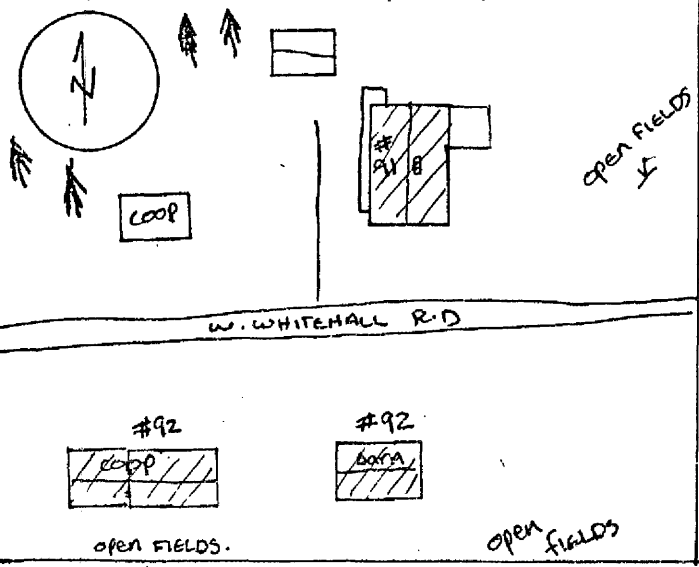

The steeply pitched gable end of this late 19th century home is oriented to the street and contains a semi-circular louvered attic vent. Greek Revival features are evident on the west side shed projection which contains the main entryway. They include: narrow fluted pilasters flanking a Victorian door; and corner blocks topping the pilasters. An unusual feature is the round embellishment on the end of the fascia at the raking eaves.

Even though the town felt that maintaining two ways and bridges within 25-30 rods was a "great and useless charge."

Behind the reinforced concrete the bridge still retains its cut granite foundation.

ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

Settling well back from the road this home was built in two stages. Built as a large Greek Revival farmhouse the building at a later date had an equally large wing sympathetically added to the rear. Details of the main block include: simple pilasters; a boxed cornice with returns suggesting a pediment; plain window surrounds with quarter-round shelves and plain sills; and plain square columns supporting the hip-roof of the porch. A projecting bay with an entablature is located on the front of the house where a sidehall entry may have once been. The rear wing is lacking in architectural details.

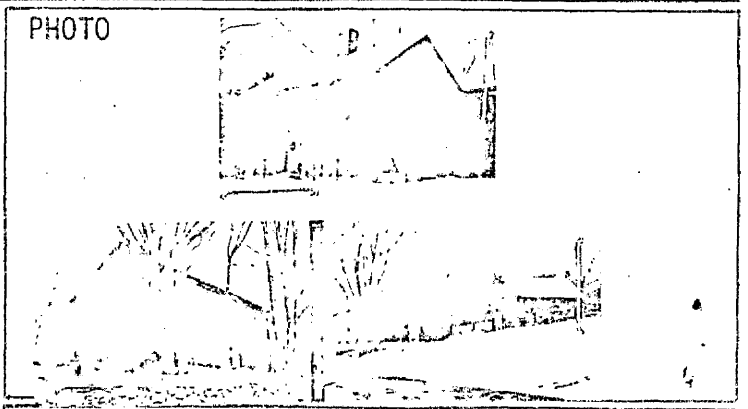
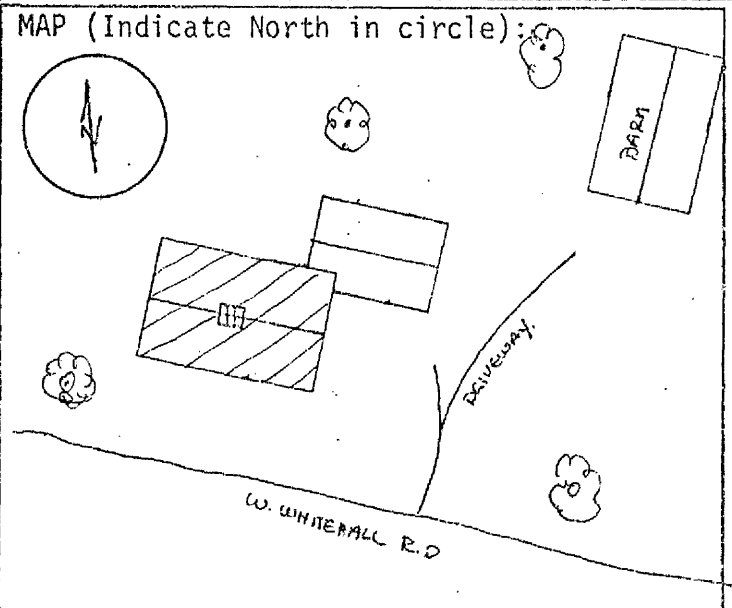

An impressive example of the Georgian style of architecture its main features include: symmetrical fenestration; a massive central chimney; plain window surrounds; a plain door hood supported by simple pilasters; and a Victorian era front door with 2 lights of etched glass in a floral pattern. A feature unique to the Conway home and to South Hampton is its paneled corner boards containing a raised lozenge cap. A three bayed, two story wing has been added to the north east corner of the main block, recently used as a goat barn.

ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

This is a five-by-three bay early Federal style house, 2½ stories high with a gable roof pierced by symmetrically placed interior chimneys. The center entry is flanked by half-length sidelights with panels below. The sidelights, in turn, are flanked by fluted pilasters rising to a louvered fan blind.

The original fenestration remains. Windows have six-over-six sash and simple surrounds consisting of architrave molding and louvered blind fans that repeat the motif of the main entry. The roof line is marked by a simple boxed cornice.

A screened porch supported by round columns dominates the east elevation. A balustrade with diagonal braces connects the columns.

A multi-bayed ell with a flat roof lined by a balustrade connects the main block with a large, gable-roofed barn.

The large double door of the barn is topped by a multi-light transom. Two four-over-four windows are set in the gable wall. A square cupola with paired, round-headed louvered vents and a pyramidal hipped roof rests on the ridge line.

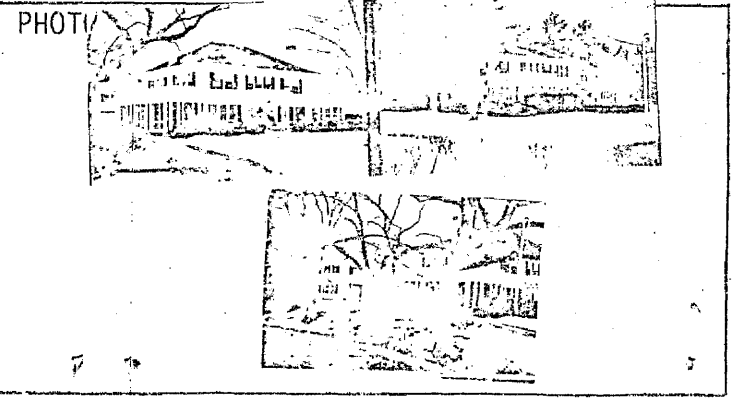
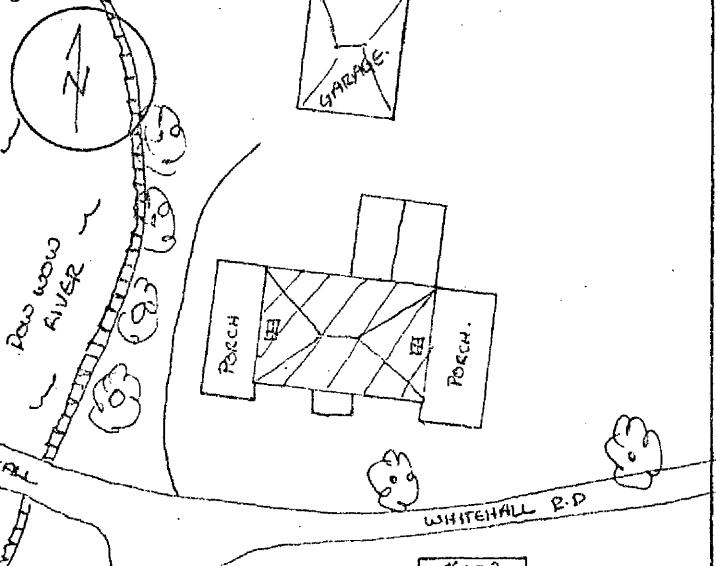

ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

Large and balanced, the main block of this house is square with an enclosed porch on the east end and a screened porch on the west end. A rear two story ell projects from the northeast corner of the main block.

The six-paneled central door is beneath a portico and flanked by simple pilasters and by sidelights in double rows. Six Doric columns support the front corners of the portico with stick style lattice work between the columns. Five 2 x 8's form the roof of the portico which is topped off with squat balusters and paneled railing. The use of columns and railings on the side porches is much the same as on the portico. The low pitched hip-roof has projecting eaves which are decorated with rafter brackets.

RELATED STRUCTURES AND CONTEXT: A large hipped roofed 4 x 4 bay garage/horse stable to the north of the main block, is also Colonial Revival and an important part of the complex.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Evaluation & Historical Associations):

The Merrill house is a handsome example of Colonial Revival architecture, not usually found in such a rural setting. The house reflects the urban taste of its original owner; a wealthy furniture maker from Boston.

Viewed with the earlier Georgian and Federal houses which surround it, the Merrill house completes a fascinating composite history of American architecture which culminated in the Colonial Revival style. It is a major visual anchor in the Jewell Town district.

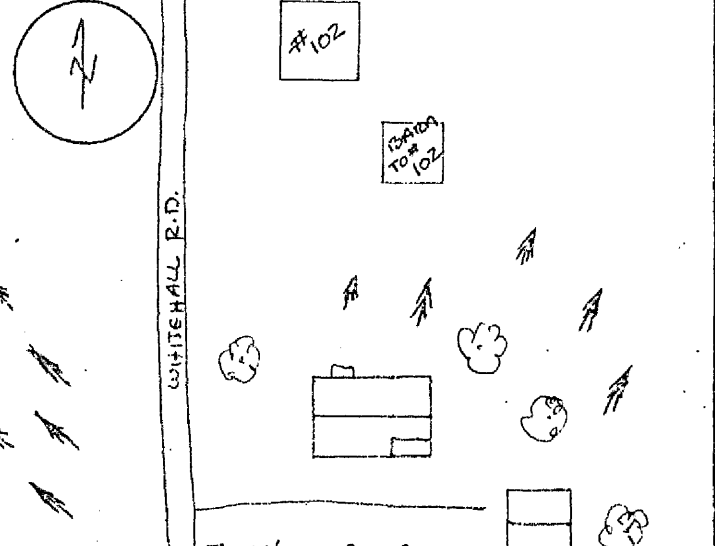

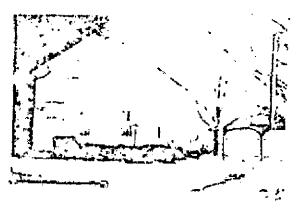

Although retaining few period details, the house is remembered by residents as being the rear ell of the Oldak Home (survey #101) built by the descendants of Thomas Jewell. Oral history suggests that a solution to the Jewell sisters' (Elizabeth and Sarah) problem of not being able to live under the same roof due to constant quarreling was resolved by moving the south ell to the west of the main block, behind what is now the Rice home (survey #103). From there it was moved once again to its present location on the Amesbury border where a second story and rear ell were added in the 1930's.

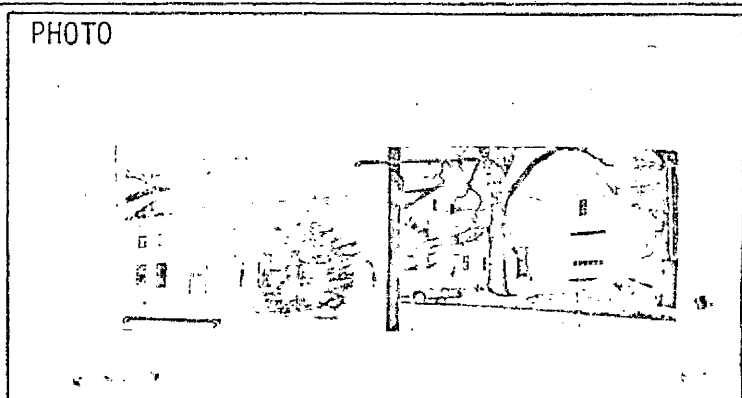
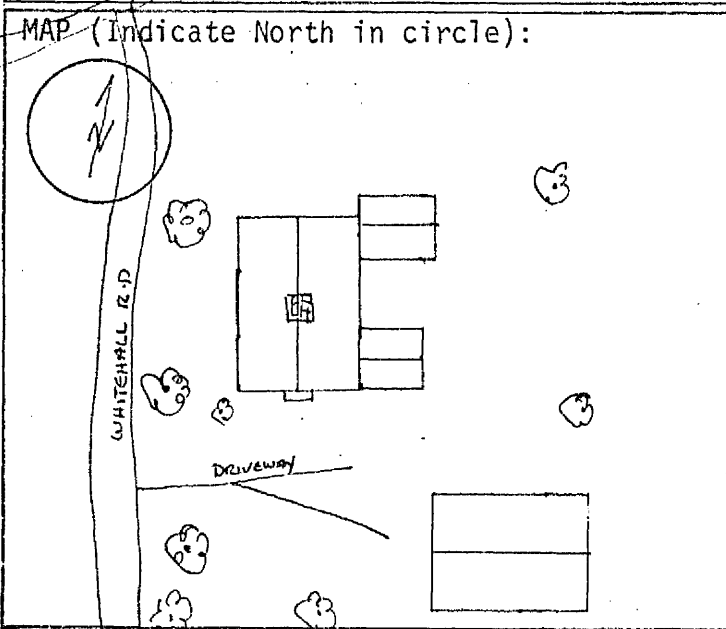

The Miller house is an excellent example of Georgian style architecture. It features a central entrance with a six over six window sash with architrave trim; and a central entry. The central door is flanked by five rectangular lights and simple pilasters which support an entablature. The door in the south gable is topped by transom lights, over which a hip-roofed portico is supported by turned columns. A one story ell on the northeast corner is of post and beam construction. ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

A prime example of the Georgian/Federal style, features of this early Jewell family house include; symmetrical fenestration, a massive central chimney, six over six windows with architrave trim, and a boxed cornice with quarter round molding between the soffit and frieze. Details of the central entry include a six panel door flanked by sidelights which are flanked by pairs of half round moldings with small caps, and plain pilasters supporting a simple semi-elliptical Federal arch and a partial entablature. An interesting interior detail is a large chimney arch which allows the hallway to run from the front to the back of the house.

The importance of the Oldak house is determined by its location; its architectural detail (both interior and exterior); and its historical associations. Situated on the banks of the Powwow River the house acts as a visual anchor in the area of South Hampton known as Jewell town. Built during a transitional period, the house contains elements of both Georgian and Federal architecture. The most unusual feature being the arched center chimney which allows a center hallway. The center hallway is a feature found in most Federal houses, but it is usually made possible by building two chimneys near the end walls rather than incorporating an arch into the center chimney as is done here. Historically this is an early home in the Jewell town section of South Hampton. This area was settled in 1687 by Thomas Jewell, whose direct descendants built and lived in this house.

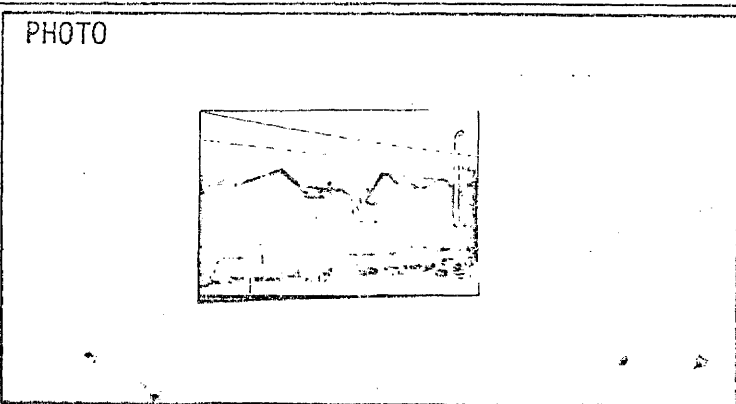
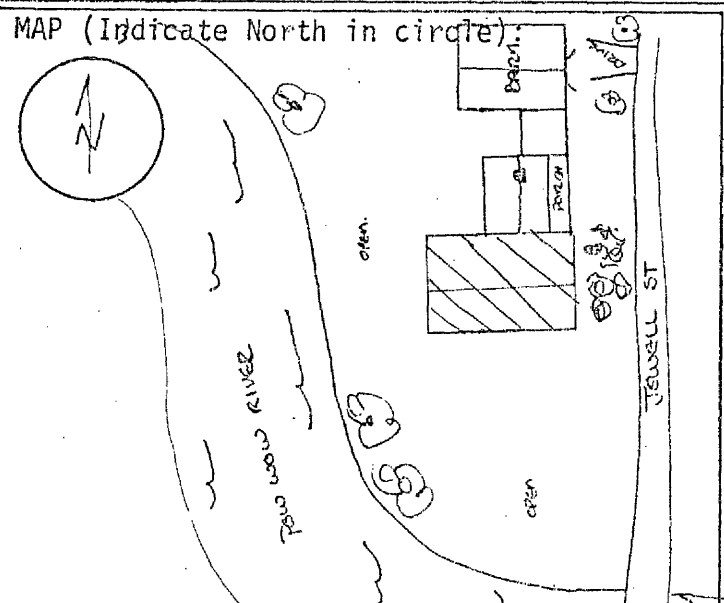

ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

The main block of this traditional Georgian "I" house is two stories tall and one room deep. Its main features include: symmetrical fenestration; a boxed cornice with sloping soffit; wide corner boards; and simple window surrounds. The two picture windows, that flank the main entry have replaced the original six over six sash. The home originally had the classic Georgian massive center chimney, which was later removed and replaced by two stove chimneys also since removed. Attached to the main block is a three-bay, two-story ell which has six-over-six windows and a six paneled side-hall entry. A one story shed connects a "drive through" barn to the ell. An interesting feature of the barn is the north gable window which is covered by a flat bracketed hood.
