Architectural Description and Significance: This 1 1/2 story Flagg System house has limestone exterior walls and dimensions of 45 x 71 feet. The house, which has regular window and door openings faces west. There is a hip roof with hip roofed dormers on the sides. The chimneys have distinctive round openings. There are no ridge dormers but there are two skylights on the roof. The original garage is attached. There is no basement. The laundry room is two steps below the level of the kitchen and garage. There is a fireplace in the living room and casement windows open inward over tile sills. There is a beam and

girder ceiling. An additional bedroom and bathroom were added in unfinished storage space on the second floor in 1977.

The house is architecturally significant because it is one of a group of stone masonry houses built by Arnold F. Meyer & Company, Inc. according to Ernest Flagg's methods of construction. It is also significant because it is similar in plan to a house illustrated on plate 26 in Flagg's book on small houses. This house was built for Rufus Arndt, a draftsman in the Meyer office. This is one of Flagg System houses in this neighborhood.
