DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Dowling House is located on Main Street in Lawrenceburg, Kentucky, just south of the downtown area of this small community of approximately 3500. Lawrenceburg, approximately 15 miles south of the state capitol at Frankfort, is the seat of government for rural Anderson County situated in the western section of the Bluegrass.

Facing westward, the Dowling House is an imposing 2 1/2-story brick residence constructed in 1886 (see photo 1). The central pavilion is the most notable feature of the facade. Three stories tall, the pavilion contains the main entrance and paired windows on the second and third stories. Brick quoins accentuate the pavilion which is capped by a mansard roof with concave profile. The cornice reveals dentils and paired brackets. Several rows of corbelling encircle the pavilion beneath the brackets, and medallions are interspersed between the brackets above the corbelling. The same cornice treatment is given the main block of the house. To the right of the pavilion is a gabled section of roof containing a round arch window. Windows on the first and second floors are single-pane with bracketed cornice heads. The half-hipped dormers are a 1915 addition. Panelled chimneys with corbelling dominate the roofline. A one-story porch and port-cochere were also added in 1915.

The large, two-story porch on the rear was enclosed on the first floor, and a one-story brick wing was appended to it after 1930 (see photo 2).

The interior has been maintained in excellent condition. The wide central hall contains a broad flight of stairs and a heavy square newel enriched with colonnettes. A large arch window lights the landing. Two rooms flank the hall on each side, and like the hall, they contain attractive panelled wainscoting, crown molding, and panelled door jambs.

On the south side, sliding doors connect the front parlor and the dining room. The dining room contains a projecting bay on the south and a small, stained glass window in the east wall (see photo 3). Fireplaces throughout the house consist of small rectangular openings covered by ornate grates. The mantels are marbelized, and many display gold stencilling and incised designs (see photo 4). The front door retains the original bevelled glass, and at the rear of the hall is the original back entrance which now opens into the enclosed porch area. The complete door enframement including stained glass sidelights and panelled, oval aprons remains (see photo 5).

An attractive wrought iron fence borders the sidewalk in front of the house, while a semi-circular drive surrounds the house on the north, east, and south. A carriage house, contemporary with the Dowling House, is located at the northeast corner of the lot.

The nominated property (1.12 acres) encompasses the house, carriage house, and lot presently under single ownership.
