DESCRIPTION

The isolated park consists of gentle rolling mountain grasslands surrounded by spruce and ponderosa pine. The area was originally envisioned by Frederick Law Olmsted, Jr. as part of the Genesee Mountain Tract and was included in his Mountain Park System Plan of 1914. "The proposed boundaries starting at the head of Mount Vernon Canyon follow the road to the top of the ridge." From the highway, a gravel road meanders through the park past a ball field to a cluster of buildings. Picnic tables are scattered throughout the park. As with the construction of other buildings within the park system, advantage was taken of the magnificent natural setting.

Shortly after the city acquired the land, the area was chosen as a CCC camp site in 1937. The buildings and foundations that remain on the park grounds date from this period. The buildings within the park include the following:

Restroom - a 13'x20' wood frame building with a 6'x8' porch. In 1976, it was moved from another location within the park and placed on a concrete foundation which incorporated modern plumbing.

South Barracks - a 175'x21' wood frame building with a gabled roof entry set on concrete caissons. Sometime between 1965 and 1970, green asphalt shingles were added to the exterior walls.

North Barracks - a 104'x21' wood frame building sitting on concrete caissons. There is an indoor/outdoor fireplace on the east wall that provides heat in the winter and outdoor cooking in the summer. In 1965-70, the exterior walls were covered with lap siding using rough lumber.

Administration building - a 33'x21' wood frame construction with a 14'x6' porch set on concrete caissons. It also has an indoor/outdoor fireplace. Originally twice its current size, in 1965-70, half the building was removed and green asphalt shingles added to the exterior.

Garage - 29'x35' structure with original clapboard siding and a concrete foundation used to house vehicles and equipment. Visible nearby is a concrete loading dock.

DESCRIPTION

While its association with the CCC is recognized, most of the buildings at Katherine Craig were removed and Camp Mount Morrison in Red Rocks Park (listed in the National Register in 1990) remains the better example. Due to alterations to the few remaining camp buildings after the period of significance, these buildings are considered noncontributing. However, the significance of the 40-acre site is not adversely impacted by the five noncontributing buildings that play an important role in the recreational use of the property.

SIGNIFICANCE

Katherine Craig Park, as a part of the Denver Mountain Park System, meets criterion A for its historical significance to Community Planning and Development, Conservation, and Entertainment/Recreation. The Denver Mountain Parks were an extension of the Denver Parks and Parkways system, which was created in response to the City Beautiful Movement. Essentially, the Mountain Park Systems represented the extension of the City Beautiful Movement into regional planning.

As a continuation of Denver's Park and Parkway system into the Rocky Mountains, the Mountain Parks are significant for their association with the conservation movement in this country. Conservation and preservation of both natural and visual resources was a priority from the beginning in developing the Mountain Parks. The Mountain Park system was designed to construct scenic drives and parks in an effort to preserve mountain views. Prime visual resources were preserved through these land purchases.

Unlike the other Mountain Parks, Katherine Craig was never used as a public park. The city chose to lease it to the Denver Council of Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts. The park maintains a high recreational use with these two Denver organizations.

Olmsted's 1914 Mountain Park study used several criteria for choosing land. These included the natural charm and scenic value of the place, the fitness for park use (i.e., gently sloping or flat mountain land for recreational use), and the ease of access (i.e., relation to main thoroughfares). Because Katherine Craig Park met these criterion, it was chosen as part of the Genesee Mountain Track and was included in the original park system plan.

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SIGNIFICANCE (continued)

Although envisioned by Olmsted as part of the Genesee Mountain Tract, the land was not acquired by the City and County of Denver until 1935 when 66 acres were donated by the will of Katherine Craig. The will provided that the City and County of Denver receive the land in Jefferson County to become part of the Denver Mountain Parks System and to be known as Katherine L. Craig Tract. (The park now encompasses 40 acres as 26 acres are included in the right-of-ways for U.S. Highway 40 and Interstate 70.)

Ms. Craig was an author and for five consecutive terms, Colorado Superintendent of Public Instruction. She was an active participant in the women's movement as a member of the Denver Woman's Club, the Woman's Relief Corps, the Nonpartisan Women's Voter League and the Rebekah Lodge. She was born and raised in the vicinity of the donated land.

In 1937, a Civilian Conservation Corps camp was constructed on the property to house the workers who were responsible for making extensive improvements in Genesee and Stapleton Parks, as well as in various mountain parks during the depressed years prior to World War II. It remained a CCC camp until the program was discontinued in 1941.

In 1943 the City and County of Denver entered an agreement with the Denver Council of Boy Scouts of America for the use of the existing facilities in the park. Then in 1965 the city was notified that the Boy Scouts no longer needed the facilities and were withdrawing their agreement. Some time after the retraction, the Denver Girl Scouts of America entered into a lease agreement with the city until 1995.
