

44. Site Plan (and boundary description and justification for N.R. sites):




Beginning at A, south 225' along a fence to B, thence west 100' along a fence to C, thence north 225' along a fence and tree line to D, thence east 100' along a fence and tree line to the point of origin. The boundaries were chosen to encompass the house and its domestic-related space which includes the remains of an orchard, a vegetable garden, and a cellar, as well as three non-contributing sheds. Although these sheds are of mroe recent construction than the house, they could not be eliminated from the nominated area without disrupting the relationship of the house and its setting.

STATE OF STATE

Point A is at the intersection of two fences in the northeastern corner of the yard, and is 43 ft. northeast of the northeastern corner of the ell.

Exterior

l-story, 4-bay wood frame center-passage, single-pile plan, coursed rubble foundation gabled roof, asymmetrical principal (west) facade, original windows in outer bays replaced with paired 1/1 sash, 3-pane transoms over the two central doors, doors are late 19th century replacements, exterior slope-shouldered coursed-rubble stone chimneys at east and west gable ends flanked by enlarged 2/2 sash garrett windows, house clad in asbestos siding, l-story-gabled porch shelters entrance, original l-story-ell with exterior stone chimney on east gable end, enclosed porch on north side of ell, 2 additions in south

two of which are 1-story structures. Frame center-passage houses appear to be extremely rare from this period as compared with the number of brick examples found in the county from the same period. This house is unique among those identified in Shelby County in that its plan appears to represent a transition from the hall-parlor form to the center-passage form. 8 4-bay hall-parlor plans were recorded in the county, and this one differs only in that a narrow center passage has been inserted into what would have been the larger of the two rooms in a conventional hall-parlor plan. However, the woodwork appears to indicate that the south partition is not an addition. The many changes to the house do not abolish its signicance as a rare survival of plan, form, and building material. 45. Description and House Plan: (continued)

angle of ell: a shed-roofed extension on the rear (east) of the house (brick foundation) with a later jalousie porch of concrete block appended to it.

Interior:

South door opens into passage, north door opens into larger of the two rooms, this north room has simple federal woodwork, chairrail, low beaded baseboard, mantel with bull's eye corner blocks, cupboards flank fireplace, enclosed stairs in southeast corner of this room open into east end of passage; south room and passage have more elaborate woodwork: reeded door and window surrounds with corner blocks, high molded baseboards, chairrail, mantel in south room has central tablet \bigcirc , bathroom added in northeast corner of south room; ell original but largely re-worked as modern kitchen.

Outbuildings:

The property includes a contributing stone circular cellar, typical of food storage structures at houses where there was no cellar on the interior. It is significant as it demonstrates early spacial relationships within the domestic space around the house.

The nominated area includes two contributing buildings and three non-contributing buildings (sheds).
