7. Description

Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Polson Feed Mill, situated on the southeast corner of 5th Avenue and Main Street, Polson, Montana, is of wood frame construction. The building consists of multiple sides and roof levels. Originally the grain warehouse was a long, one story structure with a false front. Before 1927, a two story addition was attached to the main building on the eastern side to house the feed mill. Later, another small shedroofed addition was built to abutt the two story addition.

The foundation of the building is made of concrete piers, with concrete piers every ten feet along the west side. The concrete structure under the grain dump in the center of the building is caving in and structurally unsound. The flooring of the main section of the building is of wood planking, nailed on 8×8 girder beams. The beams are spaced on approximate six foot centers. The girder beams are held up by 6×6 posts, on concrete pads. Some of the pads in the center of the building have shifted, causing the floor to sag about six to eight inches in the center of the building.

The exterior construction of the building is mainly 2 x 4 framing, with 1 x 8 shiplap siding, with the exception of the three sides of the grain storage room, and the east side of the office. It has 2 x 6 framing, with the 1 x 8 shiplap siding on the inside of the walls. The exterior of the north side of the office has a squared off false front extending to the top of the roof. The wall height of the building is 9 feet, with a 26 foot height in the main hopper area. The roof construction is mainly of the rafter type, with 1 x 8 sheathing nailed directly to the rafters. The roofing material is of wood shingles, which covers all six of the roof levels. Through the roof on the northeast side of the office is a single stack chimney.

The windows and doors of the building are as follows: On the north side of the office there are two large windows with a door centered between them. On the north side of the grain dumping roon are two windows on the main floor. On the north side of the main grain elevator upper room, there is a small window. On the east side, on the main floor are two windows and one door. On the upper level above one of the two hoppers is a set of three windows. On the south side of the main section is a large sliding door, 9'x9' with a 9'x9' loading dock. On the south side entering the grain dump is a set of doors, 9'x12'. On the east side of the office there is one large window. On the east side of the office there is one large window. On the east side of the main floor, is a window.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Polson Feed Mill, built ca. 1910, is significant for its historic associations with the development of Polson and early commerce in Lake County. The building is a fine example of a wood frame and shiplap siding building once common to this area.

The people of Polson petitioned Flathead County in 1905 for incorporation, and with the opening of the rich agricultural and grazing lands of the Flathead Indian Reservation for homesteading a few years later in 1908-10, the increase demand for a local feedmill by the growing population of farmers was provided by the Polson Feed Mill. From the time of the first petition for a new county was submitted to Flathead County in 1911 to the time that technological progress closed the mill in 1964, the feed mill played an integral role in the early commerce of Polson and Lake County.

Today it is used for storage. No other building of this early period survives in Polson and still retains it original machinery and equipment, architectural shape and historical character.


