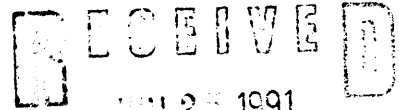

Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Reid House is a one story, frame, side gabled roof Victorian Vernacular cottage with a rear ell oriented to the right. It sits back from West Eastport Street at the western end, behind a picket fence copied from the original. (See Photo #1.) Three interior chimneys pierce the roof -- two at the ends of the side gabled section and one between the two additional rooms in the ell. The foundation is brick piers with brick infill.

The facade of the cottage is three bay (W,D,W), with large 9/6 double hung windows flanking an entry surround with a four panel single leafed door, multiple overlights, and four light sidelights over paneled aprons. The most interesting exterior feature of the house is its full length front gallery, which retains six sets of slender posts for support, a shallow shed roof, and an abundance of cutwork detail. Cutwork in the tulip pattern runs full length above the porch, and is used in supporting brackets. Vine-patterned cutwork twines between the posts. The posts are paired except at the corners, where they are tripled.

Though the interior of the house has undergone some alterations, and rooms have been added on the western and northern elevations, the remaining historic materials are probably the truest to their origin of all the cottage examples. The ceiling in the central hall has been lowered and covered with acoustic tile, but the original doors and moldings are in place everywhere that's visible. Simple wooden mantels, chair rails, doors and surrounds remain in both front rooms. A primitive cupboard door is "let in" to the space beside the interior chimney breast in the parlor. The floors are original heart pine in all but the add-on sections.

A one-room gabled extension has been made to the western elevation, and a large, shed roofed extension is under construction to the rear (north). A reference in the local history book "Down Memory Lane" says that a barn and smokehouse were located to the northwest. These outbuildings no longer survive.

The Reid House is locally significant architecturally and historically because it is one of a very small number of buildings in the town of Iuka that survive from the early settlement period (see cover documentation for the Historic Resources of Iuka). The house was built about 1860.

It is the most ornate and intact of three antebellum cottages in Iuka that have picturesque detailing on their porches instead of the vernacular Greek Revival styling more typical of the surviving antebellum houses of the area. (The other picturesque cottages are the Stone-Reid House at 503 West Eastport and the Coman House at 202 East Quitman.)

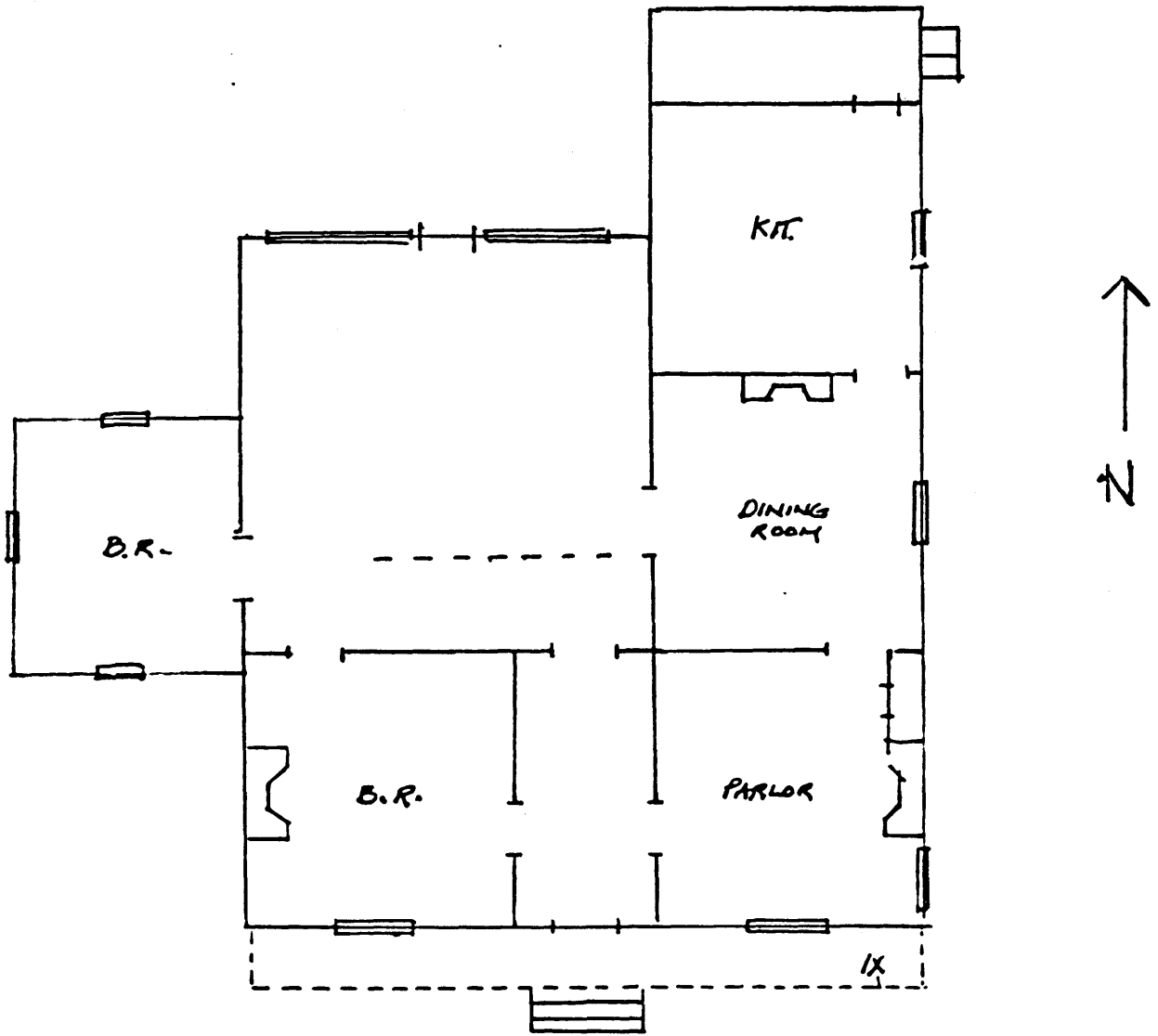
