The Octagon Post Office is located on the southerly side of Route 173 in the town of Liberty.

The building is small with the entrance facing the road. In each of the other seven sections of the Octagon is a double hung window.

The original underpinnings of the building are 6" X 18" beams cut with an "up and down" saw. These beams are still present.

The sides are done in clapboards painted white and the roof is done in asphalt shingles.

The greatest significance of this small building lies in the fact that of the very few Octagon buildings in the United States this one is the only Octagon Post Office in the country.

The building was constructed around 1870 by Rufus A. Carter, a local harness maker, who used the building for that purpose. In 1878, after passing through another owner, the building was bought by G. H. Cargill. At this time, part of the building came into use as a Post Office while remaining a harness shop. From that time on, it was used as a Post Office until 1960 by the last postmaster, Arthur Sprague.

This small part of Maine's history is going to be restored by the present owner with all the original Post Office equipment put back into the building.
