Bloomfield Street Historic District is a densely-developed residential area of Athens dating from the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Bloomfield Street, the principal street in the district, runs approximately north and south through the area, intersected by several other streets which run east and west. Lots in the district are small and predominantly rectangular, and houses are uniformly set back from the street on them. Wood is the principal building material, used both structually and decoratively, although brick and stucco finishes and detailing are also found among the later houses. Architectural styles represented include modest examples of the Victorian Eclectic, American Foursquare, and Bungalow/Craftsman styles. Tudor Revival detailing is evident in several houses. At the northern end of the district along the east side of Bloomfield Street and scattered elsewhere are the earliest, Victorian Eclectic houses, dating from the 1890s. These wood-framed houses have modest period detailing including gable ends with decorative vents, bay windows, and wrap-around porches. On the west side of Bloomfield Street and in the southern portion of the district which were developed in the 1910s and 1920s are predominantly Bungalow-Craftsman-style houses interspersed with a few American Foursquare and Tudor Revival influences structures. Among these are some excellent examples of the Bungalow style with such typical features as low-pitched roofs, front dormers, wide eaves with exposed rafters, a variety of exterior wall treatments, and massive front porches. Along Mell Street in this area are some fine local interpretations of the Craftsman style designed by local architect, Fred Orr. Two small historic wood-framed stores, now converted to residences, are located near the center of the district. Terrain in the district is relatively flat. Landscaping is extensive, consisting of front yards abundantly planted with grass, large shade trees, shrubs, and hedges; some large street trees; and a triangular green near the south edge of the district. A few 1950s apartment buildings are the only intrusions.

Boundary

The Bloomfield Street Historic District represents the intact portion of a historic in-town neighborhood. To the west is the proposed Milledge Avenue Historic District, which is distinctly different in scale from the Bloomfield Street Historic District. To the east is the University of Georgia campus, and to the north and south are a high concentration of vanant lots, intrusions, and non-residental structures.

The Bloomfield Street Historic District is located in Athens, Clarke County, Georgia. It consists of an area along Bloomfield Street and along some of the side streets leading off it to the east and west. It is bounded on the north by Peabody Street, on the east by the University of Georgia campus, on the south by Rutherford Street, and on the west by the proposed Milledge Avenue Historic District.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Bloomfield Street Historic District is historically significant in terms of architecture, landscape architecture, community planning and development, and local history. These areas of significance support the district's National Register eligibility under National Register criteria A, as an example of one type of residential development that occurred in small towns in Georgia in the late 19th and early 20th centuries; B, for its association with industrialist Robert L. Bloomfield who developed a portion of the district; and C, for its typical examples of late 19th and early 20th century architecture and landscape architecture in Georgia.

In terms of architecture, the district is significant for its collection of modest middle-class housing dating from the late 19th and early 20th centuries. The residences in the area document typical building materials and building technologies used in small Georiga towns of the period, and they illustrate how styles of the period, popular nationally, were interpreted for Athens' middle-class by local builders and architects. Victorian Eclectic, American Foursquare, Bungalow, and Craftsman style houses are represented in the district along with a few houses with Tudor Revival and Neoclassical detailing. Of particular note are some of the houses associated with local architects and members of the building trades. The Calvin Parr House at 227 Bloomfield Street (individually listed in the National Register) is an elaborately detailed Victorian Eclectic cottage with sunbursts in its gable ends, a porch with sawnwork trim, and interior wall stenciling unique in the state. 145, 163, and 193 Mell Street are interesting interpretations of the Craftsman style, designed by Fred Orr, a local architect who designed a number of residences in Athens during the early 20th century. In addition, there are a number of fine bungalows in the district, built using a variety of materials and illustrating most of the typical features associated with the Bungalow style.

In terms of <u>landscape architecture</u>, the district is significant for providing an example in Athens of the type of naturalistic landscaping popular nationwide during the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Front yards informally landscaped with large shade trees, shrubs, and grass visually flow together to create a park-like setting. Occasional street trees and a small triangular green suggestive of the irregular, landscaped dividers found in planned subdivisions of the period add to the park-like environment.

In terms of community planning and development, the Bloomfield Street district is important for documenting a type of piecemeal development that occurred in certain residential areas of many towns and cities. In addition, the district documents a period of growth and development in Athens' history during which a number of new middle-class residential areas were created to house the town's expanding population. In the late 1880s, Robert L. Bloomfield, a prominent Athens industrialist and landowner, subdivided a portion of the land he owned along the east side of Bloomfield Street, and a few houses were built on the lots. In 1912; his son-in-law, John E. Talmadge, Jr., had the Hall Street area divided into lots. The land on the west side of Bloomfield Street was originally used as a cow pasture and as lots for the large houses on Milledge



Avenue; it was not sold off and subdivided until the 1920s. The south portion of the district was surveyed and subdivided in 1890 but was bought up by one man, John Mell, whose house on Milledge Avenue backed onto this land. It was not built on until 1900-1920. Thus, this area which grew to be a modest middle-class neighbrohood was developed piecemeal by a number of individuals. Its growth was stimulated by its location near the Milledge Avenue streetcar line.

In terms of local history, the district is significant for its associations with a group of middle-class citizens of Athens who resided in the neighborhood. district housed an interesting mix of merchants, tradesmen such as painters and contractors, and, because of its proximity to the University of Georgia campus, a number of professors.

Period of Significance

Based on documentation compiled by the Athens-Clarke Heritage Foundation (the local sponsor of this National Register nomination) in 1983 and updated by the Historic Preservation Section in 1985 just prior to nomination, the Bloomfield Historic District began its development in the mid- to late 1880s with a series of land transactions and subdivisions and was essentially complete by the onset of the Great Depression in 1929-1930. However, some building activity continued in the area into the early 1930s, although at a severely depressed level. By the mid-1930s, historic development of the area was essentially complete, although a few small "in-fill" houses may have been built on vacant lots later in the 1930s.

In consideration of this information, the period of significance for the Bloomfield Historic District should be 1885-1935. Development of the neighborhood began after 1885 with land purchases and subdivisions; development was essentially complete by the mid-1930s so the 50-year cut-off at the time of the original nomination serves as an appropriate end to the period of significance.

It should be noted that at least two major houses were built on West Rutherford Street just outside the historic district in the early to mid-1940s. Neither of these houses is currently 50 years old, and neither appears to warrant an exception to the 50-year rule for National Register eligibility. However, their National Register eligibility and potential for contributing to this historic district could be reconsidered in a few years. At the same time, other properties in and adjacent to the district could be reassessed for their potential to contribute to the district at that time.
