Description:

Completed in 1914, this two story commercial building of reinforced concrete in the Italian Renaissance style is representative of the generation of major structures built in Hilo between 1910 and 1915 during the emergance of the city as the second largest commercial center in the Hawaiian Islands.

Measuring approximately 60 feet by 90 feet fronting on Waianuenue Avenue, the structure occupies the site of the former Volcano Stables. Three retail spaces occupy the ground floor fronting the street, along with the entry stair to the second floor office spaces which is located between the first and second retail spaces at the East side. Three separate full basements are located below these spaces.

On the street level, large show windows set above a bulkhead and capped by transoms are spaced between concrete columns and punctuated by pairs of tall glazed doors leading to the retail spaces and stair entry. On the second floor the fenestration is marked by five large round-arched windows. The upper comice is divided into five segments, the arched center panel of which features the building name and date in bas relief. Below this upper comice band and above the windows are two large circular grilles venting the attic space.

The exterior of the Volcano Block is in nearly original condition with a characteristic metal roofed canopy over the sidewalk supported by wrought iron brackets. Below the plate glass store windows the original bulkhead has been faced with a lava stone veneer behind which the original cast iron basement vent grilles are still in place. At some as yet unknown time subsequent to its original construction a fire sprinkler system was installed, probably after 1923 and before 1950 as evidenced by the type and manufacturer of the main control valve. Air conditioning was installed sometime after 1950 and prior to 1966, again judging from the type and manufacturer of the equipment.

The interior, while retaining most of the original configuration, has been altered by tennants over time with the addition of mezanine levels in two of the ground floor spaces, the addition of a vault in the ground floor and second floor spaces at the East end of the structure, and the reconfiguration of some of the partitions on the second level. The original stair to the second floor is intact, as are most of the major partitions creating the upper lobby area.

Historic record and examination of the construction indicates that the vault on the ground floor may have been constructed by the first tennant in the space, the Peoples Bank of Hilo, at the time of their opening in 1916. The date and reason for the vault on the second floor (located directly above the one below) is unknown at this time. United States Department of the Interior National Park Service

Statement of Significance:

The Volcano Block Building is historically significant as an excellent representative of a group of structures built in Hilo at this city's transition into the second most important commercial center in the Hawaiian Islands. The architectural style is also significant as an example of a quality reinforced concrete commercial building of the period with its attractive facade design, large plate glass show windows and characteristic canopy roof over the sidewalk.

Since it s completion in 1914 there have only been four owners of the structure.

In 1929 the building was purchased from it's original owners by C. Brewer & Co. who housed their wholly owned subsitiary Hilo Terminal and Transportation Co. (HT&T) there until 1953 when the HT&T operations were moved to the Hilo Pier and the parent company moved it's Hilo corporate offices into the building. During this period the offices of the Hilo Chamber of Commerce were located on the second floor of the building (exact dates unclear). In 1961, upon completion of new corporate offices, C. Brewer & Co. offered the building for sale and it was purchased by Mr, Irving Melnick, a clothing manufacturer, who owned the structure until his death, when it passed to the Irving Melnick Trust who held it until it's purchase by the present owners in 1992.

The completion of the Hilo Bay Breakwater (1910) and the extension of the railroad from Hilo along the Hamakua Coast as far as Paulio (1910) set the stage for the rapid expansion of Hilo's commercial center in the following five years and the Volcano Block Building was a prominant part of this expansion.

In the period from 1910 to 1915 seven major "fireproof" concrete structures were constructed in Hilo's business district (1910- Hackenfield Building, Masonic Temple; 1912- S. Hata Building, Von Hamm Young Building, Hilo Union School; 1913 - Hilo Library; 1914- Volcano Block Building; 1915- U. S. Post Office/Federal Building.) forming the core of the "new" downtown center.

The Volcano Block Building is further important in that it was not constructed to house its owner's business, but rather for lease to other-commercial enterprises (such as the People's Bank) which were emerging in the community. The ground floor arrangement, with three distinct retail spaces fronting the street, but divided from one another, provided for independant occupancy. This focus indicates that in addition to the established business capable of funding the construction of their own structures there was a need for quality space for smaller commercial and office occupancy in the community and the Volcano Block Building represents one of the first to address such a need.

The later occupancy by HT&T and C. Brewer corporate offices continued the history of the building as a major address in Hilo's business core and has reinforced its place in the commercial past of the community.
