Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Leiper-Scott House is a one-story structure located two blocks east of the State Capitol. It was built on a lot which slopes abruptly to the rear. Therefore its basement on the rear or west elevation is exposed. The building has a cottage-style plan, combining hip and gable roof forms, an asymmetrical front facade, and one floor of usable living space. It is an adaptation of a plan that was popular between 1880 and World War I for modest, low-cost housing. While its contemporaries were commonly frame buildings, this is a solidly-constructed brick structure.

The Leiper-Scott House is transitional in style, with both Queen Anne and Colonial Revival characteristics. The massing of the building, the steep pitches of the roof and the use of slate infill in the south elevation pediment are characteristics of the Queen Anne style. Colonial Revival elements include tracery windows, round Roman arches, hipped dormer, Tuscan columns and gable returns.

The most striking design elements of the building appear on the principal (east) elevation. Centered on the east projecting bay is a round Romanarched window. The opening has a tracery transom above a single-pane window. Above the arch is a tracery window. Adjacent to the entrance is a small arched tracery window. The hipped dormer on the front elevation provided yet another space for tracery work. The shed porch, which wraps around the northeast corner of the home and protects its two principal entrances, is supported by Tuscan columns mounted on brick piers. The main entrance is an ornamental door with transom. The gable has returns.

The kitchen opens onto a porch which is hidden by lattice-work. An interior staircase leads from that porch to the partially-finished basement. A wooden box cornice finishes the house and porches. Sash layout is one-over-one (1/1) and two-over-two (2/2). There are three chimneys: front slope, rear slop and straddle ridge. Brick bond is common. The roofing is slate.

There has been remarkably little alteration of the original structure, inside or out. Original lighting fixtures, molding, beaded wainscoting, hardwood floors, tile fireplace and shelf-mantel, and lath and plaster walls remain.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

In 1975, the Arkansas State Legislature incorporated the area surrounding the State Capitol into a zoning district. By that date the area was well advanced into a major transition from residential neighborhoods dating from c. 1880-1910 and associated with the suffering railroad industry, to a variable-use commercial district. When the Capitol Zoning District Commission conducted a survey of the 200 surviving buildings in 1978, there were only three structures that merited a "priority one" rating for their architectural and/or historic significance. The Leiper-Scott House is one of those three buildings. The Leiper-Scott House is an architecturally significant brick cottage built for a turn-of-the-century Little Rock businessman, George A. Leiper. From 1884-1893, Leiper served as manager of the Arkansas State Penitentiary, which was privately-controlled under the state's "prison lease" system. As manager, Leiper presided over a giant brick-making operation which employed hundreds of convicts. In 1893, Leiper left the prison to establish his own brick factory. As was common with the entrepreneurs associated with the state prison (which occupied the site of the present State Capitol), Leiper invested in lands in west Little Rock, near the prison. In 1902, he constructed the Leiper-Scott House, apparently as a rental property. Five different families had occupied the house by 1933 when Richard Scott, an airbrake mechanic for the Missouri Pacific Railroad, purchased it. Scott and his wife raised a family in the house and lived in it until 1978 when they both died.
